with several more libraries expected to be added in the coming weeks.

The passport includes stops at the Allen County Public Library, which features the new Rolland Center for Lincoln Research; the South Whitley Community Public Library, which features the Shultz Gem Collection; the Bartholomew County Public Library, which features architectural design by I. M. Pei and the Large Arch statue by Henry Moore; and much more. New additions include the Vigo County Public Library, the West Lafayette Public Library, the Argos Public Library and four branches of the Johnson County Public Library.

Patrons can visit a <u>dedicated mobile</u> <u>passport landing page</u> where they can sign-up for the Indiana Library
Passport by providing their name, email address and mobile phone number. A link is then sent to their mobile phone, which opens the passport and directs the user to add the button icon to their home screen, where they can access it any time.

When participants check in to libraries on the Indiana Library Passport trail, they will be entered into a quarterly drawing for a prize package, including, but not limited to, historical tour tickets, architecture books and gift cards from local and national merchants. Once users sign up for the passport, they only need to use their phone to check in while physically at each location. Participants are eligible to check in to each location on the passport once per week which will enter them into the prize drawing. The beginnings of Millersburg in Warrick County started in 1817 when James Anthony received permission to dam Pigeon Creek and built a mill near a settlement in Campbell Township. By 1824, there were two mills in operation; one owned by Philip Miller. Its proximity to the Wabash and Erie Canal made the settlement prosperous while the canal was in operation.

The town of Millersburg was platted on Oct. 1, 1850 by Ann Cox, executrix of John Cox and Phillip Miller, guardian of Hiram Miller, John Cox's stepson. In 1859, a Methodist Episcopal church opened. The first coal mine in the area was in operation by 1862. By 1885, the town had three dry goods and grocery stores, two blacksmith shops, a grist mill, a lodge for masons and one for Odd Fellows.

The first Millersburg school opened in 1874. It was replaced by a larger school that opened Sept. 25, 1922. The new Millersburg school had indoor plumbing heating and a Lalley light plant providing electricity to the combined elementary and high school. The new school also consolidated some of the other small rural schools in the area.

The Millersburg school closed in 1965, a victim of consolidation. The town declined after the closing of the school and by 1987 there were only 50 residents in the town. The coal companies in the area purchased land around and in the town over time eventually buying and razing the town.

## Powering a State that Works

The Indiana State Library would like to send a reminder that a <u>law was</u> <u>passed</u> in 2021 that requires state agencies and local government entities, including libraries, to report cybersecurity incidents to the Indiana Office of Technology within two business days of an incident. Additionally, all libraries are required to designate a point of contact/cyber incident reporter for their organization before Sept. 1 of each year. This could be a director or someone else who oversees a library's technology. New directors, or those have not already signed up, please complete the contact form here.

## Lois Lenski Covey Foundation bookmobile grant applications due Sept. 1



The Lois Lenski Covey Foundation awards grants to organizations that operate a lending bookmobile that travels into neighborhoods populated by underserved youth. The grants are for purchasing books published for young people preschool through grade eight. Bookmobiles operated by charitable 501(c)(3) and other non-taxable agencies, including public libraries or schools, are eligible. The Foundation provides grants to organizations that serve economically or socially at-risk children, have limited book budgets and demonstrate real need.

Grants range from \$500 to \$3,000 and are specifically for book purchases, and cannot be used for administrative or operational uses.

Applications must be postmarked by Sept. 1. Applications postmarked after that date will be evaluated early the following year. The last grant within a given year will be awarded by Oct. 30.
