### 'Reimagining School Readiness' workshop slated for August



In August, the Indiana State
Library will present "Reimagining
School Readiness," a workshop
detailing a suite of research-backed
resources for library staff to help
families prepare children ages 0-8
for success in school and in life. The
free workshop will be held both
virtually and in-person.

Through an interactive presentation with hands-on activities, this training will introduce library staff to the research, practical implications and resources offered in the Reimagining School Readiness toolkit, which is available in its entirety for free online. Participants will understand key findings from current cognitive and developmental psychology research, reflect on the implications of those findings for their daily work and gain practical ready-toimplement ideas for activities, as well as resources for staff training and for parents and caregivers.

The virtual option of the workshop will be split into two two-hour sessions and will take place via Zoom on Tuesday, Aug. 16 and Wednesday, Aug. 17. ### Applications open for Judith F. Krug Memorial Fund programming grants



Each year the Freedom to Read Foundation distributes grants for organizations to support activities that raise awareness of intellectual freedom and censorship issues during the annual Banned Books Weeks celebration, which will take place from Sept. 18-24 this year. Staff at all types of libraries, schools, universities and nonprofit community organizations are encouraged to apply. Grants are awarded for \$1,000 and applications are accepted now through June 6.

Grants are evaluated based on the following criteria: imagination, schedule, promotional plan and budget.

To be eligible for a grant, organizations must not have been a recipient of an FTRF grant within the past five years. FTRF Founder Judith F. Krug was a fierce proponent of education and intellectual freedom. During Krug's lengthy career she worked non-stop to prevent censorship and protect First Amendment rights.

# All aboard the South Shore!



In the early 1900s, the Chicago and Indiana Air Line Railway began construction on an electrically powered interurban commuter rail line that ran from South Bend to Michigan City, and eventually into downtown Chicago. The line changed hands over the next several years, but eventually became known as the South Shore Line and is one of the last surviving interurban trains in the United States. Now the line is operated by the Northern Indiana Commuter Transportation District between Millennium Station in downtown Chicago and the International Airport in South Bend.

In October 1925, the company began a publication for the commuters of the line titled "South Shore Lines." These free publications to the patrons provided information about new stations along the route and offered services, such as dining and observation cars in early 1927. The May 1931 issue offers a sample menu for the dining car that included baked trout, chicken pie, broiled South Shore sirloin steak, fresh rhubarb pie and old-fashioned strawberry shortcake.

The publication also advertised popular tourist destinations, such as the <u>Indiana Dunes</u>, as well as articles about any events along the line and events in Michigan and Chicago. Passengers could read about for blossom festivals and review baseball game schedules, as well as read the latest on the Notre Dame football scene. They also included articles about businesses, manufacturers and civic organizations.

The Indiana State Library has digitized the volumes that are in its collection, covering October 1925 to June 1932. They can be found in the Indiana Historic Print Collection.

The Indianapolis Public Library is currently inviting kids and teens to sign up for its free 2022 summer reading program, Camp Read

The summer reading program, taking place from June 6-July 30, offers free workshops, programs, prizes and books for all ages.

Readers track the time they spend reading, listening to audiobooks, reading aloud to someone or having someone read to them. They use the Beanstack app or a paper tracker to measure their progress. They can read any book, graphic novel, magazine, e-book or newspaper they want. Read items from home, borrow from a friend or borrow from the library.

Prizes are earned at 1 hour, 5 hours, 10 hours, 15 hours and 20 hours of reading. Readers earn a bonus prize when they complete seven discover activities. Prizes can be redeemed at any IndyPL location. Saturday, Aug. 6 will be the last day to pick up prizes.
