The Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers Region 4's Science Kits for Public Libraries Grant program is offering up to \$2,000 in funding to public libraries to establish a circulating science kits collection. Libraries must be located within Region 4, which includes all of Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, North Dakota, Wisconsin and northerly portions of Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, Nebraska and South Dakota.

The application form will be available Nov. 1 on the SKPL website, and library submissions will be accepted until Jan. 16, 2023. Libraries that have previously applied for the grant, but did not receive funding, are invited to submit again.

Public libraries have a long tradition of building stronger communities by providing life-long learning opportunities for children and teens. The SKPL Team is honored to have the opportunity to enrich the services that public libraries offer. SKPL enables children, parents and teachers the chance to borrow library kits for hands-on STEM learning at home or in the classroom.

Department of Homeland Security genealogy



There are very few folks who have worked the desk at a library and not fielded a question about genealogy. There are also likely very few who have directed the inquiring patron to the Department of Homeland Security for answers. Yet, the Code of Federal Regulations, Title 8, Aliens and Nationality, 103.38-40, explains in detail its genealogy feefor-service program and includes a list of the records available to potential patrons. These records are designated in section 103.39 and include Naturalization Certificate Files, 1906-1956; Microfilmed Alien Registration Forms, 1940-1944; Visa Files, 1924-1944; Registry Files, 1929-1944; and Alien Files numbered below 8 million.

Specifics on requesting records are as exact as the material found at Homeland Security. The Department accepts requests for deceased persons only, and it requires a separate form be completed for each request. Forms, along with more information about the program, can be found here. If one is not sure if the government has information on a person, one may submit an indexsearch request.

Though the window of records is limited in temporal scope, the material is particularly useful to those tracing family members who

At the Plainfield-Guilford Township Public Library, it's officially spooky season and Ghost Hunting Kits have been added to the library's Library of Things collection.

Director Montie Manning heard about the concept of ghost hunting kits from another library and had the idea to bring them to the Plainfield library. Each kit comes equipped with an electromagnetic field reader, two walkie-talkies, a video recorder and a flashlight. Supernatural enthusiasts will be able to check out a kit with their library card and go on all sorts of paranormal adventures.

Not only does the library offer Ghost Hunting Kits, but it's also a great resource for novice and seasoned paranormal hunters. "We have several nonfiction books, either with instructions on ghost hunting or about true hauntings and paranormal investigations. In addition to our regular nonfiction collection, we have over a dozen books about haunted locations in Indiana in our Indiana Room collection that amateur ghost hunters can read about," explained Lauren McPike, materials and acquisition services manager. "We do ask that any patron who would like to use our ghost hunting kits in any of these places please obtain permission first, though."
