#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The William Bedford, Sr., House faces south on Washington Avenue, a tree-lined residential street. It is set back on the lot which carries through the entire depth of the block, so that the rear of the house is easily visible from Blackford Avenue. A dependency is adjacent to the house on the east side; a connected garage, probably of a later date, is entered from Blackford Avenue.

The house is basically rectangular in plan with a small projecting one-story bay on the west side and a two-story polygonal bay on the rear (north). It is a two-story structure of red brick bearing walls laid in common bond. The three-bay facade has a one-story open porch extending across the entire front, with four white columns on brick piers and a central double entrance (probably a later addition). A projecting clapboarded bay, also possibly a later addition, is centered over the porch on the second story. Front windows are broad with stone sills and lintels, doublehung with single lights. Rear windows are narrow with stone sills and flat arches, and are doublehung with six lights over six.

The roof is gabled, of medium pitch, with a steep gable on the central front bay, and conical roof over the rear bay. The present roofing material is asbestos shingling although, considering the trade of the owner and other houses of the period, it was probably originally slate. Compound chimneys are of brick with corbeled caps. The central chimney has two flues; two interior chimneys on either side have three flues each.

The dependency is also of brick construction. One end of the gabled roof is parapeted with raking bond coursing along the roof line. It has a single end chimney.

It is apparent that the house was altered at some time, but the dates and nature of the alterations are not known. Architects Wood and McKennon were hired in 1877 to design improvements to the house, but their plans do not appear to have been carried out. A fire in 1879 did some damage to the "cornice" and roof, according to a newspaper account.

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The significance of the Bedford House stems from its design--unusual in this area -- and its owner and probable builder, William Bedford, Sr.

The Bedfords came to Evansville in 1853 from Ramsey, Huntingdonshire, England. William, Sr., was a bricklayer, plasterer, slater and stonecutter. Together with William, Jr., also a bricklayer, he began contracting in 1856. Over the course of several years they worked on many prominent local buildings together and separately, including the old U.S. Post Office and Custom House, the Grein Building, the Viele house, the Carpenter Street School, the St. George Hotel, and the Baptist church at Cherry and Third. Bedford Avenue was named after them.

In 1873 the senior Bedford purchased land on Washington Avenue, then east of the corporation line, and the house was completed by 1874. The English influence is quite evident, particularly in the rear, and seems closer in origin to the architecture of Virginia than that of the Midwest. Another Bedford home at 20 E. Chandler Avenue (now demolished) may also have been built by its owner. Its compound chimneys and flat brick arches closely resembled those of the house on Washington Avenue, suggesting the same English derivation for both houses.

In 1879 William Bedford, Sr., constructed a racetrack, which no longer exists, across Washington Avenue from his house. The horse races held there were well publicized.

In 1887, William, Jr. was a co-founder of the firm that since 1901 has been known as Bedford-Nugent.
