### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Palace Lodge building is the cornerstone of the small business district of the Town of Winslow. Situated on the southeast corner of Main and Center Streets and facing west, the building shares walls with commercial buildings both to the south and to the east. Main Street is also Indiana Route 61.

Italianate in style, the Palace Lodge is a two story, common bond brick commercial building with a composition roof. In plan, it is a 23' (Main Street facade) by 90' rectangle with a 45° angle at the northwest corner of the building. The west facade is two bays wide; the angled corner, one bay; and the north facade, six bays wide.

On the west facade and the angle, the first story has retained the original cast-iron storefront. This is composed of two large, transomed display windows on Main Street and a double door in the angled section. Each door has a small panel directly above, probably due to the addition of later, shorter screen doors. The actual glazed entry doors extend above these panels. Above the panels is a two-light transom window. Framing these openings are pilasters surmounted by an entablature. There is a canvas awning with "Brown's Groc." in block letters between the windows and transoms.

First story windows on the Center Street side have small rectangular openings, single sashes, and limestone sills and lintels. They are placed high above the street. Also on the Center Street side are two additional entries. One, in the easternmost bay, is a four panel, transomed door with a limestone lintel. The other, in the adjacent bay, is a double transomed door which opens to a stairway that provides access to the second floor.

Second story windows have tall, rectangular openings, are double-hung with one light in each sash, and have limestone lintels and sills. There are two identical chimneys, one each between the second and third bays, and the fourth and fifth bays of the Center Street side. They are located at the edge of the roof and extend about two feet above it, projecting slightly beyond and corbeled back to the facade near the bottom of the first story windows.

The building has an elaborate cast-metal, bracketed cornice over the Main Street side and angled entrance. There are four small attic lights between brackets. Incorporated above the cornice on the angle bay is a pediment surmounted by a finial.

The cornice on the Center Street side consists of corbeled brickwork designed to resemble brackets. Also on this side of the building, between the two front bays on the ground floor, is a painted sign reading, "Brown's Grocery/Nunn-Better Enriched Flour/Milled by Chas. Nunn & Sons, Evansville, Ind."

The main floor of the Palace Lodge is undivided. The second floor is divided into six rooms. Ceilings on both floors are 13 feet high. Interior walls are plastered. The flooring is tongue-and-groove, oil-treated oak and pine. Floor joists are solid, 23' long, oak beams, two inches wide and 14" high. These joists are set 12" apart.

**Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)**

The Palace Lodge building is the oldest extant commercial building in Winslow. Virtually unaltered since its construction in 1892, the building is also significant as a good example of small-town, 19th century commercial architecture.

The Palace Lodge was constructed jointly by the International Order of Odd Fellows and the Knights of Pythias. The lodges used the main floor for meetings and the second floor for offices. They fell into debt and, in 1898, were forced to sell the building to Logan Robling.

Robling's son, Monroe, had been associated with a peddling wagon business. After one of his partners retired and the other moved away, the business became a store known as L. Robling and Son. It was housed in the Palace Lodge Building after purchase of the building by Logan Robling. This general store was operated until 1946, when the building was purchased by Neil and Winifred Brown (Monroe Robling's daughter), and changed to a grocery store. Brown's Grocery was in business in the building until 1981. During the time the first floor of the building was used as a store, the second floor was used variously as offices and as apartments.

The owner of the building currently has plans to renovate it for use as offices, apartments, and a small shop in the front.


