The Hominy Ridge Shelterhouse stands surrounded by large deciduous trees in a grassy picnic grove atop Hominy Ridge. Many of these trees were planted by the CCC boys, who moved them from the valley below before Hominy Lake was flooded. Scattered mainly to the north with a few to the east of the shelterhouse are a total of thirteen picnic tables constructed of stone with tabletops and seats constructed of two-by-sixes and two-by-eights, respectively. (The boards have been replaced numerous times but duplicate the original construction.) One of these tables, approximately due north of the shelterhouse, is sited on a stone platform partially surrounded by a wall into which is built a fireplace (photo 1). Northeast of the shelterhouse just at the edge of the ridgetop is a bit of stone wall, the remains of a CCC-built outhouse building. About thirty yards east of the shelterhouse is the present pit toilet, constructed in the 1950s. Southwest of this is a well with a hand pump. The shelterhouse is a contributing building, the picnic grove to the north and east (encompassing all the picnic tables) is a contributing site, the well is a contributing object, and the pit toilet is a noncontributing building.

The shelterhouse is not sited true to compass but a few degrees north northwestward; however, for ease of understanding the sides will be referred to as north, east, south, west. The building is an elongated octagon, or it may be considered as rectangular with a five-sided porch on each end, north and south. It rests on a stone foundation. The walls of the rectangular portion are of fieldstone with timber supports and framing; the ends are entirely timber (see photos 2 and 3). The entire building is 67 feet long and 23 1/2 feet wide.

The rectangular section sports five open bays on each side. The north and south portions are enclosed to window height with each end (that is, north and south) open. The hipped roof is covered with wood shingles (last replaced seventeen years ago), which approximate the original material. A notch has been cut from the overhang and a rafter slightly shortened on the south end to accommodate the growth of a large encroaching walnut tree. A stone chimney protrudes from each end of the peak. On the west side of the building (photo 4) is a stone terrace the length of the rectangular section. with a short stone wall along its west edge that flanks two steps.

The interior is intact, with open rafters and bracing of full-dimension two-by-sixes. The two main crossbeams each sport a finial. The floor is stone. Facing the center room on each end are two large stone fireplaces, nearly nine feet wide. The fireplaces (see photo 5) are each flanked by segmental-arched openings leading into the end enclosures; the opposite sides of the fireplaces extend out to form grills that serve each of the porch sections.

The Hominy Ridge Shelterhouse is in good condition and virtually unaltered but for accommodating the walnut tree's growth. Most of the stone picnic tables are intact, although the stone platform has suffered from vandalism or perhaps neglect. A photograph of the shelterhouse taken within a few years after its completion shows the building essentially as it appears today, albeit that the sparse woods of the late 1930s has matured into the beautiful forest setting as planned.

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NARRATIVE STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Nestled beneath its forest canopy atop Hominy Ridge in the midst of Salamonie River State Forest, the Hominy Ridge Shelterhouse and Picnic Grove is an especially fine example of a park rustic shelterhouse built by the Civilian Conservation Corps on state recreational land in Indiana. As such, it offers a splendid material record of an important area of New Deal public works and recreational development on Indiana state lands during the 1930s, much as described in the historic context "New Deal Work Programs in Indiana State Parks, 1933-1942." Although that context is technically limited to state parks, it notes that "there was little distinction among the kinds of resources the New Deal agencies constructed on the various types of state lands. Although there was less emphasis on recreational development in the state forests, shelters and picnic areas were among the projects on these properties as well." Such was the case at Hominy Ridge. Indeed, CCC Company 589 arrived at their new camp in what was to become Salamonie River State Forest (then abandoned farmland) in July 1935, having completed their work at McCormick's Creek State Park, where the company originated. Started the previous year, the shelterhouse was completed in 1937.

As described in the associated property type identified as "Properties associated with New Deal work projects related to recreational activities" the shelterhouse with its surrounding picnic grove is eligible under Criterion A (in the areas of recreation and in social history) because it is associated with the New Deal's work programs and park development in the 1930s. The building is also eligible under Criterion C because it is representative of the work and the style of architecture typical of the CCC. The shelterhouse and picnic grove meet all the same standards of integrity established in the multiple property nomination "New Deal Resources in Indiana State Parks." The building stands in its original location in its original setting. The design and materials remain intact, and the building is representative of and associated with typical CCC workmanship—timber construction and stone masonry.

Two shelterhouses at Ouabache State Park, formerly Wells County State Forest, are similar to the Hominy Ridge building and were constructed by the CCC around the same time. But both of the buildings at Ouabache exhibit a deviation from the original blueprints; each was built on a T plan, creating a roofed wing where the Hominy Ridge shelterhouse has an open terrace. At least one other shelterhouse exists that was built to the same plan as that at Hominy Ridge. The WPA constructed such a building in 1938 at the then—White River Land Utilization Project, which later became Grane Naval Depot. Its roof, however, has been replaced by one of metal. The integrity of the Hominy Ridge shelterhouse as well as its setting in the midst of a planned picnic grove is very much intact.

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

The following essentially encompasses the top of Hominy Ridge. an area of 3.5 acres. Just west of the small children's playground is a white oak tree 16 inches in diameter. Starting at a point 9.5 feet due south of this oak tree, proceed east northeast 90 yards, northwest along edge of ridgetop 236 yards, south southwest along edge of ridgetop 80 yards, then southeast 183 yards to point of origin. 1'=400' map enclosed shows boundaries. This is the most detailed scale map available of the site.

The boundaries encompass the Hominy Ridge picnic area and include all its historic resources.

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
