The Indian school was essentially a red brick structure with the ground floor however surrounded with a sandstone wall. It was built in the form of a square, eighty feet each side, with a square courtyard in the center, it being around thirty feet each side. It consisted therefore of four wings joined together in the form of a square. Each wing consisted of four floors except for the east wing with three floors. The building was topped with a red tile roof and faced west. It was built as a boarding school for Indian boys with space for around 70 Indians together with classrooms, playroom, dormitory, kitchen, a small chapel, rooms for the superintendent and a teacher or two and for around six Sisters (nums) who ran the kitchen. An inspector's report said there were 29 rooms in all.

Although the building served as an Indian school for only eight years (1888-1896), it was not changed or altered until 1937, when it was re-modeled to serve as a dorm or residence hall for students at Saint Joseph's College. Even then the outward appearance was hardly changed at all except for the removal of a bell tower above the roof and the shutters from the windows. Internally, however, it was thoroughly changed to provide rooms for college students. The center courtyard was made smaller to allow an extra tier of rooms.

This building, now called Drexel Hall and serving as a student residence or dorm on the Saint Joseph's College campus, was originally an Indian school called St. Joseph's Indian Normal School, 1888-1896. It was owned by the Bureau of Catholic Indian Missions in Washington, D.C. Points of significance:

(1) It represents an era, i.e., just before the turn of the century when our country was hoping to solve the Indian question by such off-reservation schools where Indian pupils could be thoroughly assimilated into white man's ways and help then convert their own people in turn. It was designed in imitation of the Carlisle Indian school of Carlisle, Pa., founded nine years earlier.

(2) It was a "contract" school, i.e., one of the many private schools once supported by an annual federal per pupil subsidy to promote Indian education, therefore a relic of an era of state-church partnership now largely forgotten.

(3) It was the only Catholic off-reservation school of this type.
(4) It was one of only two such Indian schools in the state of Indiana, the other being White's Manual Labor Institute at Wabash, Indiana, also a "contract" school (Society of Friends).
