Notes from 1932 reading—Site of old German church. Forty-two raves in small

At about the time the above church was organized, German Lutherans who lived in the township requested the services of the Reverend Friedrich Wyneken, then pastor of the Lutheran Church in Fort Wayne, to provide for their needs. Wyneken arrived in the township in 1841 and administered communion to thirty-seven people. He returned the following year and performed the marriage of Matthias Breitenstein and Margareta Doctor. In 1845, the township's scattered Lutheran residents joined together and formally organized St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church. They called Wyneken's assistant, the Reverend F. W. Husmann, as their first pastor. Full time ministers were in short supply, and Husmann divided his time among two other churches - St. John's at Bingen and St. Peter's in Root Township, Adams County. The congregation erected a log building in 1846 and the following year voted against joining the Missouri Synod. A second vote in 1853 reversed that decision, however, and in 1860 the congregation built a wood frame church, the same year that a town called "Soest" (named for a local settler Friedrich Soest) was platted in Section 2. Except for the church, however, the town was never extensively settled.

St. John's Lutheran Church was organized in 1853, when Ernst and Christina Vordermark deeded to the congregation a tract of land on Wayne Trace a half mile west of Soest. ²⁸ Unlike St. Paul's, which affiliated with the conservative Missouri Synod, St. John's membership became part of the more liberal Ohio Synod. In 1870, the congregation elected the Reverend J. Bundenthal as its pastor, and the following year he led a merger with St. Paul's

Church to form a new congregation, Emmanuel Lutheran Church at Soest, with Bundenthal becoming its pastor. Represented in the merger were William Soest, Ludwig Schlandraff, and John Felger as trustees of St. Paul's, and Magnus Rohrbach, Philip Kohlinger, and John Brick of St. John's. The new congregation affiliated with the Missouri Synod, and like the Catholics at Hessen Cassel, this congregation opened a large parochial school, which served many generations of its members.²⁹

Some members of the former St. John's Church were unhappy

with its new affiliation and withdrew the following year, reforming the old congregation. On August 10, 1872, the Emmanuel congregation sold back to St. John's a portion of its original land. The congregation struggled for a number of years and finally ceased worship in 1908. Some of its members moved to Fort Wayne and joined Grace Lutheran Church on Gay Street, depositing the parish records there. The land that had been the site of St. John's remained in the congregation's name until 1944, when one who claimed to be its last surviving trustee, John J. Oehler, declared his ownership of the property and deeded it to his son. Still another English-language Lutheran church established in the town-

ship was the Antioch Lutheran Church, which erected a building

on what is now the Hoagland Road between Brunson and Minnich roads, not far from the Madison Township line.



law restricts construction or other changes within 100 feet of a cemetery. Because nobody's quite sure where the graves are - or if they even still exist-Tim Stinson Jr. said he can do nothing until the DNR establishes the cemetery's boundaries.

Members of IPFW's Archaeological Survey took the first step in that direction Thursday, using a variety of devices to scan the subsurface for any indication that human remains rest there. Pond, R-New Haven, who lives nearby and has taken a special interest in the site, said the Allen County Commissioners have agreed to pay IPFW's \$1,670 fee. If graves are found, she added, the cemetery would be fenced off and turned over to the Adams Township Trustee's office for ongoing maintenance.

They just didn't like our timetable," said Tim Stinson Sr., who noted that his

now-gravely ill father had hoped to build a small retirement home and barn on the property in addition to cleaning up the cemetery, which neighbors say lost its tombstones when county crews leveled the site and dumped debris there years ago. Tim Jr. said he began removing some of the debris and brought in dirt and other material to fill in a water-collecting low spot, but the pile will just sit there until the DNR decides what can be done, and where.

Tim Jr., who now owns the property and said he has already spent about \$4,000 on the project so far, would like to build a home there one day, as his grandfather had hoped to do. But that too must wait on an official determination of the cemetery's boundary, since homes requiring septic tanks must have lots of at least two acres or so.

"Why didn't they just buy the property if they were so concerned?" Tim Sr. asked, referring to the auction at which his father acquired the property more than a

year ago — before severe illness complicated his plans and caused him to transfer ownership to his

grandson.

Despite the bureaucratic standoff and the hard feelings it has generated, Tim Sr. said he still hopes to erect the monument - both as a tribute to the 42 people believed buried there but also to his father, whose desire to retire there and to restore the cemetery "because it's fun and self-satisfying" was dashed by forces beyond his control.

As sometimes happens, even good intentions can produce unfortunate outcomes. Pond no doubt believes her efforts to bring in the DNR, IPFW and the commissioners will help protect a historic cemetery that may contain the remains of many of her neighbors' ancestors.

But neither can you really blame the two Tims for being just a little upset. It's hard enough to care for a very ill relative without also having to deal with an issue like this and the prospect that, depending on

what IPFW finds and the DNR decides, the land Don Stinson paid \$10,000 for may be rendered all but unusable by his heirs.

> The fact that better understanding of the laws involved or better communication along the way might have avoided the situation hardly matters now. Hopefully, a mutually agreeable resolution can still be found - one that protects taxpayers from ongoing expense to the greatest extent possible.






Concordia Lutheran Cemetery - Old
