October 2024 FY25 YTD Financial Report Summary

I. IAC Revenue: An increase in our FY25 Revenue, it now includes a Carry Forward from our 2023 NEA Grant that will be applied for our Pt. 1 expenses.

II. IAC Expenses*: On track and consistent with the beginning of FY25.

• Pt. 1 | Personnel, Benefits

The vacancy of the Director of Programs position caused the negative variance (surplus) in Pt.1.

• Pts. 2-5; 8 | Tech, Consultancies & Panels, Supplies/Office Equipment, Unemployment Pt. 2 has a positive variance (deficit) due to additional software and services licenses. Pt. 3 shows a negative variance as we have a few outstanding professional services contracts for FY25 that still need to be completed.

• Pts. 7 | FY24 Grant Contracts

Grant expenditures are on track and expected to be encumbered by the start of Calendar Year 2025.

• Pt. 9 | Shared Departmental Operating Expenses

- Includes memberships, mailing, and conference fees.
- Includes travel expenses: mileage, lodging, per diem, parking reimbursements, and car rentals.

• NEA & State Match Carry Forward

This number remains constant, including previous FY payments and carryover federal funds.

Subject: Poetry Out Loud program update

Poetry Out Loud overview

A partnership of the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA), the Poetry Foundation, and state and jurisdictional arts agencies, Poetry Out Loud (POL) provides a platform for high school students across the country to participate in a dynamic poetry recitation competition that is designed to improve their public speaking skills, help build confidence, and teach them about literary history and contemporary life. POL provides free lesson plans and other educational materials to teachers and organizers, including an online anthology of 1,200 classic and contemporary poems.

The program starts at the local level with a school or participating organization. Winners then may advance to a regional and/or state competition, and ultimately to the national finals. Poetry Out Loud takes place in all 50 states, American Samoa, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands. Since the program began in 2005, more than 4.4 million students and 81,000 teachers from 20,000 schools across the U.S. have participated in Poetry Out Loud.

In 2022, Indiana's state champion, Sreepadachaarna Munjuluri from Columbus, Indiana claimed the National POL champion title, the first for our state.

Indiana Poetry Out Loud 2024

As part of our annual partnership agreement with the NEA, Indiana Arts Commission hosts a statewide Poetry Out Loud program. Starting in 2023, IAC established a program partnership with Indiana Humanities, a statewide non-profit whose mission is "Indiana Humanities connects people, opens minds and enriches lives by creating and facilitating programs that encourage Hoosiers to think, read and talk." Indiana Humanities is the program lead for the 2024 Indiana POL program and is working directly with schools and teachers to support participation in the state POL competition. Indiana Humanities will also be planning and hosting the IN state finals on March 1, 2025.

Information regarding the program will be shared in the National History Day Educator Newsletter and ICTE Newsletter going forward. We will also be hosting a table at the Bloomington Book Festival (Nov. 2) and Indiana Library Federation conference (Nov. 18-19) where we will share Poetry Out Loud information.

National and Regional Partners

National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) – National (Federal) Partner

The IAC receives funding from the NEA through its State Partnership Program, the only grant the IAC is eligible to receive from the NEA. State Partnership funds support the Arts Organization Support program, staff salaries and the partnership with Traditional Arts Indiana. The IAC submitted its annual grant application at the end of September (before the deadline!) and will know funding status by mid-April.

National Assembly of State Arts Agencies (NASAA) – National Association

NASAA is our national "trade association". Many of IAC's staff attended the biennial conference at the end of October, and several staff served on panels during breakout sessions. An internal share out of learnings was held earlier in November.

Arts Midwest (AM) – Regional Partner

<u>Arts Midwest</u> is the IAC's <u>Regional Arts Organization</u>. Arts Midwest administers grant programs on behalf of the NEA and does its own granting as well – most recently providing new funding for artists with disabilities and supporting a new program for culture bearers (traditional artists). Miah continues to serve on the Arts Midwest board as one of two state arts agency representatives.

State Government Partnerships

In addition to ongoing partnerships with the Division of Aging at FSSA and the Indiana Department of Education (both led by Stephanie Haines), the IAC is engaging with the following:

Department of Health

IAC is partnering with the Department of Health's Tobacco and Cessation Division to support their efforts through an arts-based project. The project is being developed and led by their VOICE youth ambassadors and implemented statewide. Lydia Campbell-Maher is supporting that partnership.

Indiana Archives and Records Administration (IARA)

The IAC is partnering with IARA on a 'zine project featuring graphic artists interpreting key sections of Indiana's state constitution. André Zhang Sonera is heading up this partnership which will conclude in 2026.

Indiana Economic Development Corporation (IEDC)

The agency continues to partner on the state's regional economic development efforts through READI, more specifically through <u>funding made available through the Lilly</u> <u>Endowment</u>, Inc for regional arts and cultural development. Funds will support regional arts and cultural planning and subsequent project development meant to drive transformation in the state's arts and culture ecosystem. Miah continues to serve as lead for the agency in these efforts.

Other In-State Partnerships

Indiana Communities Institute

ICI is partnering with the IAC in support of the first public offering of the IAC's new Creative Convergence program for communities, spearheaded by Lydia Campbell-Maher.

Indiana Humanities

Indiana Humanities (IH) is the current state partner for the Poetry Out Loud national poetry recitation competition, a program of the National Endowment for the Arts. IH provides administration of the state program and finals competition with funding and assistance from the IAC. Additionally, the IAC will be partnering with IH on a pilot accessibility grant program which, pending Commissioner approval, will roll out in CY25.

Introduction

One of the services provided by the IAC, in addition to grant funding and as a general resource, is technical assistance (TA). Technical assistance is tailored support provided by IAC staff to individuals, organizations, and communities. TA topics and delivery formats vary. The time spent with stakeholders constitutes a key resource to build knowledge, capacity, and connections across the state that supports the arts and culture sector.

Beginning in September 2024, the IAC launched a pilot tracking form with two primary goals: (1) Communicate and quantify an additional area of impact for the IAC that aligns with Strategic Framework impacts and (2) Better understand recurring TA topic areas and related programs to inform future service and grant delivery. Below is a summary of the initial results from the first two months of TA tracking.

TA Tracking Results: September and October 2024

Relevant IAC staff members who provide TA filled out a form summarizing their work with stakeholders at varying cadences throughout the last two months. In total, staff reported **68.4 hours** in TA time combined in September and October. This is already about 70% of the way to the initial target for the fiscal year of 100 hours in TA. A majority of those hours occurred in October and centered around the Creative Convergence program (see Figure 1), which had a recent application deadline.

Next Steps

IAC staff will continue piloting the TA tracking form adjusting based on staff feedback and data validity. The next iteration of the form will require reporting based on single TA sessions to generate uniform data with more accurate insights. The Commission will receive quarterly updates on TA hours to benchmark progress over time. In the first two months, it is evident IAC staff are supporting stakeholders across a variety of topic areas. As more data comes in, the IAC will leverage TA insights to aid program and service delivery topics/strategies in the future.

Evaluation Plan Fall 2025

Background

As the INverse program completes its fifth year, the Indiana Arts Commission is undertaking a comprehensive program evaluation as part of a natural cycle of program evaluation and improvement.

Launched in 2019, INverse was developed as a special community initiative of the 2018-2020 Indiana Poet Laureate Adrian Matejka with the goal of celebrating and preserving the diverse range of Indiana poetry for future generations of Indiana writers and readers. Working in collaboration with the Indiana State Library and the Indiana Arts Commission, Matejka wanted to create a space in which all Hoosiers were welcome to share their poetry. Noting the history of many local Indiana poets who were overlooked for recognition in their lifetime, Matjeka had the vision that capturing pieces of Hoosier history through a poetry archive would create a time capsule of significant moments in Indiana's creative community.

INverse Program Goals

- Provide a place for Hoosier poets of all types to be celebrated and included.
- Collect important poetry from across Indiana to preserve for future generations.
- Create a new opportunity within the literary community that is important and necessary.
- Create a repository of Indiana poetry that can be utilized by educational institutions, researchers, archivers, and more now and in the future.

Current Program Framework

Every year from February 1st through April 30th the Indiana Arts Commission accepts poetry submissions to be considered for the INverse poetry archive.

Upon submission, every poem is given an internal eligibility check and then moved on to a full external review panel. The panel consists of one representative of the Indiana Arts Commission, one representative of the Indiana State Library, and the standing Indiana Poet Laureate. Additional reviewers are brought in as necessary.

Review criteria include:

- Application meets eligibility criteria
- Application supports the spirit of the program

- Applicant meets criteria of connection to Indiana

Key Elements of the Program

Some key elements of the INverse poetry archive include:

- **Open access to all:** Unlike other poetry archives, INverse will not be exclusively for 'expert' poets. Applicants do not need to provide any CV or resume to prove their expertise or previous experience to be considered.
- All poetry accepted: We cannot know which topics or styles of poetry will be of most interest to future generations, so opening the doors to a wide variety of poems is important. Poems can be in any style and any topic with exceptions for inappropriate or dangerous language or content.
- **Connection to Indiana:** To truly ensure this archive is the *Indiana* Poetry Archive, applicants must provide assurance of a meaningful connection to Indiana. The IAC defines this as having lived in Indiana for five years or more at any point in the applicant's life.

*In the first year, the archive opened early in the fall of 2019 during the program launch, and that open period lasted until May 2020.

Evaluation Plan

As part of a regular cycle of agency program evaluation and improvement the INverse poetry archive has reached a natural point to pause and evaluate. Through the evaluation process, IAC will explore the following questions.

- Has the program lived up to the goals?
- Have the participants gained positive outcomes from the program?
- What impact does the archive have on Indiana communities?
- Which elements of the INverse poetry archive have been a challenge?
- What changes to the procedures and processes of the INverse program can make it most effective? (i.e. changes to frequency of application periods, changes to the overall timeline for program, or changes to the criteria)
- How can the INverse poetry archive evolve to meet changing needs of Hoosiers?

Step 1: Internal program review

IAC staff will review past submissions, interactions with applicants, and past review panel discussions to examine the program implementation and its impact on constituents. Additionally, IAC staff will examine any similar programs in other states which may provide examples or guidance.

Step 2: Data Analysis

IAC staff will collect and analyze data from past INverse submissions including poet demographics, geographic representation of applicants, denied applications, and other information to form a full picture of the program to date.

Step 3: External program feedback

IAC will ask for feedback from community members most closely aligned with this program. This will include Poet Laureates who have been involved with the program, Indiana State Library staff who have been involved with the program, and other poets or artists who have an interest in this work.

After the Evaluation

After completion of all three steps of the evaluation process, IAC will publish an evaluation report outlining the findings and recommending next steps to maintain or evolve the INverse poetry archive. With this report, IAC staff will adapt INverse programming as needed and inform all stakeholders of the next steps of the INverse program.
