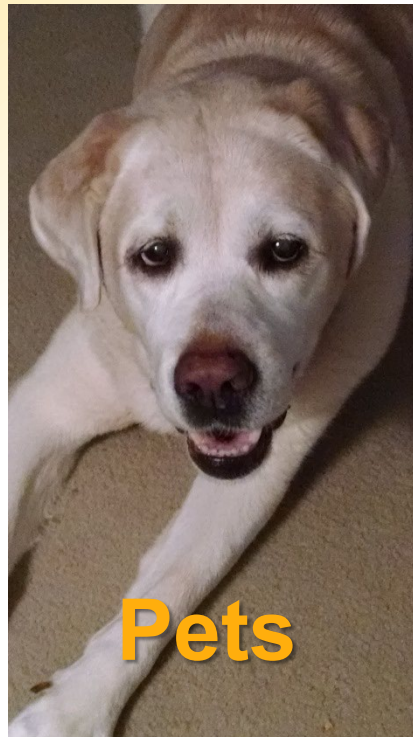
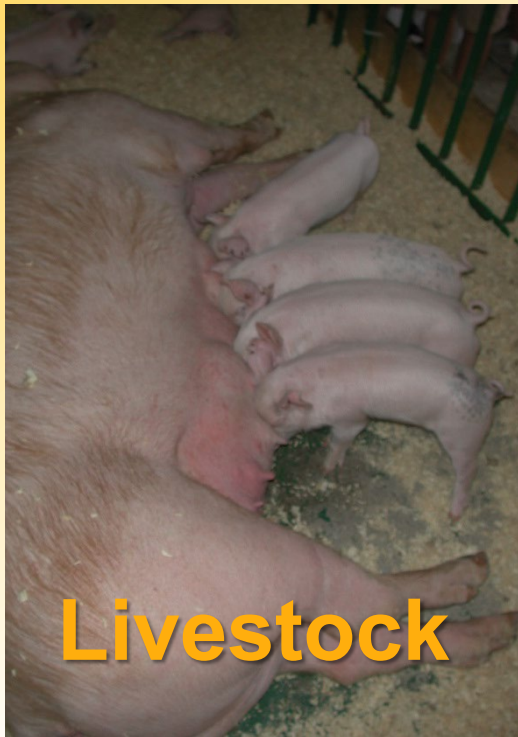

Why Plan for Animals?

Impact on our lives!

- Indiana ranks #8 in farm exports: \$6.6 billion
- ~10 million dogs & cats in Indiana!
 - At least one pet in 69% of homes
 - 33% of households own dogs = 4.8M
 - 37% own cats = 4.9M
- Other related industries: \$\$?
 - veterinary care, supplies, hunting, etc.

“Office of the State Veterinarian”

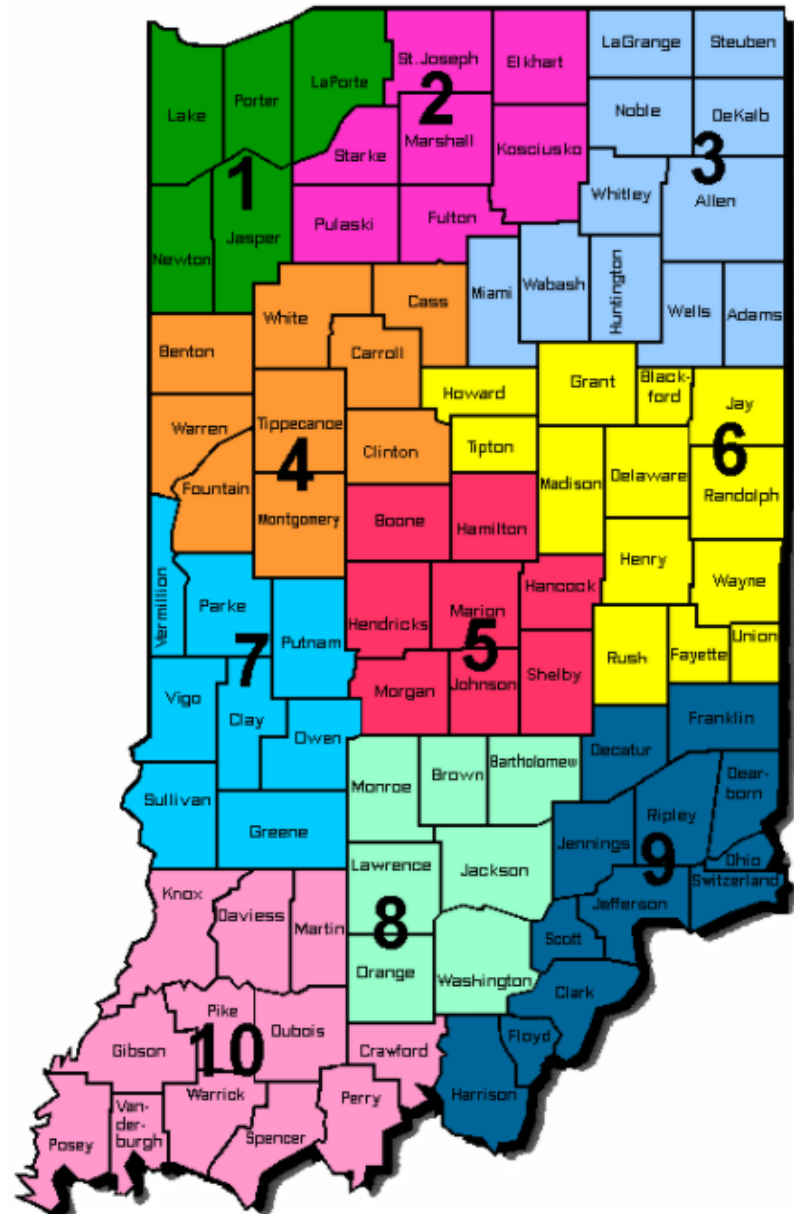
- Responsible for animal health in IN
- 11-Member Board
 - represent major commodities, industries
- 100 Staff Members
 - veterinarians, animal health, support
 - meat, poultry, dairy inspection

Indiana: Including Animals in Planning

1995: SAVE Program

- Annex to state plan
- Natural, man-made disasters

2001: Animal Health & Care ESF

- Added animal health (disease) emergencies
- Emergency Support Function

2006: Federal Plan Expanded, PETS Act

- Pet Evacuation and Transportation Standards Act adopted at federal level

2008: Emergency Support Function 11

- Addresses Food & Agriculture
- Animal diseases, general response



Planning at National Level

2006: Federal plan expanded

- Rewritten after Hurricane Katrina
- PETS Act
 - Requires accommodation of pets, service animals in evacuations



Indiana's Approach

- ESF 11: Agriculture & Natural Resources
- BOAH is lead agency
 - Aided by IN State Department of Agriculture

Two Areas:

1. Animal Health
2. Animal Care
