

COMMISSION STRUCTURE & RESPONSIBILITIES



COMMISSION STRUCTURE

- ➤ Per statute, the Commission is a 14-member board appointed by the Governor and serves as the coordinating higher education agency for the state of Indiana.
- Per statute, the Commission operates as an independent agency and collaborates with the Indiana Department of Education and other state agencies.

OUR ROLE AS A COMMISSION

- The general purposes of the Commission are the following:
 - 1. Degree/Program Review and Approval
 - 2. Financial Oversight and Review NOTE: *Specific statutory responsibilities* are outlined on slides 8-9.
- This does not include statutorily required responsibilities executed by the agency's staff.

COMMISSION STATUTORY RESPONSIBILITIES



DEGREE/PROGRAM REVIEW AND APPROVAL

Vote to approve or disapprove the offering of any proposed or existing degree or program.

- ► Includes associate, baccalaureate, or graduate degrees; and programs leading to a certificate or other indication of accomplishment. (IC 21-18-9-5)
- ➤ New degrees/programs Must be voted on within 90 days of the public institution providing the Commission with all necessary information. (IC 21-18-9-5)
- ► Existing degrees/programs Includes reviewing and voting on the continuation of underthreshold degree programs. (IC 21-18-9-10.7)
 - Each degree and program must be reviewed and voted on at least once every 10 years.
 - ► For degrees or programs approved before July 1, 2025, review must occur no later than July 1, 2035. (IC 21-18-9-5.5)

COMMISSION STATUTORY RESPONSIBILITIES

FINANCIAL OVERSIGHT/REVIEW



- ➤ Capital Review and vote on capital projects, including recommendations regarding appropriations and bonding authorizations for public institutions. (IC 21-18-9-1); this is a recommendation; State Budget Committee has the final authority.
- ► Budget Review the legislative request budgets of all public institutions prior to each budget session (IC 21-18-9-1); the Commission makes recommendations to the State Budget Committee and the Governor.
- ➤ Tuition and fees Make tuition and other mandatory fee <u>recommendations</u> for public institutions within 30 days of the enactment of a state budget. (IC 21-14-2-12.5); *if an institution goes beyond this recommendation, they must go before the State Budget Committee.*
- ➤ Campuses and locations <u>Vote</u> to approve or disapprove the establishment of any new college or school, as well as any new branches, regional or other campuses, or extension centers. (IC 21-18-9-5)

HIGHER EDUCATION INSTITUTIONS' RESPONSIBILITIES

Each public institution's board of trustees maintains all powers and authority over the following related to their institution, unless otherwise outlined in state law:

- Management
- Operation
- Financing

HIGHER EDUCATION LEVEL-SET



KEY AREAS OF FOCUS

- 1. Ensuring higher education is more **affordable and accessible** to Hoosier students and families;
- 2.Increasing educational attainment for all Hoosiers to help every student achieve their unique goals and maximize their potential; and
- 3. Streamlining public higher education degree programs to better align knowledge and skills with industry demand, as well as ensure students who graduate from our public institutions are prepared to contribute positively to our communities, state, and country.





1.AFFORDABILITY

DATA LEVEL-SET

- Approximately **60,000 students** receive <u>state</u> financial aid annually, which is approximately **32% of Indiana undergraduate residents**.
- In June 2025, all 15 Indiana public institutions committed to a tuition freeze for two consecutive academic years for the first time since 2010.

Key tactics working to move the needle in this area:

- ► 21st Century Scholars Program
- **FAFSA**
- State Student Financial Aid
- Tuition and Fee Setting

2. EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

ENROLLMENT & COMPLETION ADDITIONAL DATA LEVEL-SET

- ➤ An *increasing number of students* are graduating high school with **college credit** and/or a **tangible credential** <u>currency</u> for the student!
 - Indiana ranks #1 nationwide in terms of students completing at least one college course in high school.
 - Approximately 62-64% of Indiana high school graduates earn some form of college credit; the average student leaves with 14.2 credits.

Key tactics working to move the needle in this area:

- ➤ Guaranteed Enrollment (Honors Plus Seal, etc.)
- Credentials of Value (Indiana College Core, CTE Credential)
- Stackability of Credentials Leading to Increased Completion Levels

Next Step: Establish SMART goals; understand and transparently share ROI.





3. INDUSTRY ALIGNMENT

CURRENT & FUTURE NEEDS

DATA LEVEL-SET

- Indiana is currently the **only state** to include graduate retention in its outcome-based performance funding formula.
 - ➤ 73% of Indiana resident students across public institutions were working or enrolled within Indiana one-year post-graduation, compared to 58% of all students (FY 2023).
- ➤ Before HEA 1001-2025, Indiana colleges and universities had over **3,400 degree and certificate programs**.

Key tactics working to move the needle in this area:

- ► Talent Association Development and Convening
- Qualifications Framework (Stackable Credentials)
- Degree Program Approval and Review
- Growth of Apprenticeships

Note: Additional tactics may be developed to increase the graduate retention rate (both resident and non-resident) and to adapt to the ongoing impact of AI.

Next Step: Establish SMART goals; understand and transparently share ROI.
