
RETURNING USERS SINCE JULY 1ST




INTERACTIONS SINCE JULY 1ST



ALL TIME NEW USERS




ALL TIME INTERACTIONS

Overview/Duties

The overall purpose of the Juvenile Justice and Cross-System Youth Task Force is to serve as a focused, accountable structure to promote interagency communication and collaboration to improve prevention, outcomes and address the unique and complex needs of Juvenile Justice and/or cross-system involved youth. The Task Force is responsible for implementation of objectives identified in the CISC's Strategic Plan.

- Are there statutory/regulatory concerns in the delivery of services to children/family?
- What is the awareness and or training offered with regard to the availability of services across Indiana?

- 2.5 Study and evaluate whether "status offenders" should be removed from Delinquency code and moved to CHINS code (in collaboration with Child Safety & Services Task Force)
- Task Force is examining the following:
 - Gathering information regarding other states and how status offenders are being addressed:
 - Contacting Vera Institute, National Conference of State Legislatures, Casey Family Foundation, Annie E. Casey Foundation, National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges, National Juvenile Detention Center and the Praed Foundation.
 - Still in exploratory process with goal for Commission recommendations in the fall of 2018.

- The group received two documents one was a draft list of evidence based programs, curriculums and approaches that are currently being provided through contract with DCS; secondly a list of evidence base addiction prevention programs and the counties they are currently being implemented.
- IN-BeHAPY Indiana University was awarded a grant to develop, launch and conduct a preliminary open pilot feasibility trial of the Indiana Behavioral Health Access Program for Youth (IN-BeHAPY) to boost Hoosier families access to quality behavioral healthcare, increase support to primary care clinics, and establish a solid foundation for a program of innovative, externally funded pediatric behavioral health research.

- The group has focused on identifying and providing a "guidebook" of effective evidence-based substance abuse programs to be completed by December 2017.
- The group has prioritized identifying data resources to aid in identifying and mapping gaps and need across the state for services (Bowen Center/MPH)
- Data is being reviewed on Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) and social impact bonds.
- The subcommittee has identified possible guest speakers for upcoming task force meetings to gather more information before making recommendations.

Summary of Policy Recommendations

- 1. Require licensure surveys to improve efficiency in health workforce data collection process and quickly identify areas of shortage
- 2. Implement State Loan Repayment Program
- 3. Establish an entity to review health professions statute and pilot project proposals (for new delivery or reimbursement models)
- 4. Ensure prescribers are up-to-date on current best practices for opioid prescribing

Mental Health and Substance Abuse Task Force Social Impact Bonds and Formularies

Social Impact Bonds

 Data is available detailing programs, domestic and international, that are funded by private investors

Drug Formularies

- Drug formularies are option for states to combat rising costs associated with prescription pain medications
- Texas, Washington, North Dakota, and Ohio have established some degree of formularies or preferred drug lists for workers' compensation
- More states are beginning to see a savings and decrease in the abuse of prescription pain medication
