Benton County continues to see Meth, Heroin, Marijuana, and Alcohol as the most problematic. The school is struggling with vape pens and with vaping pens with marijuana

Currently there are two Celebrate Recovery programs, one is jail based and the other is county based. Valley Oaks center is seeing/accepting clients for a variety of treatments. There is also an up and coming facility "Borrowed Time" (owned and operated by Dr. Darcy Lash) that will offer NA/AA meetings, psychotherapy sessions and equine therapy.

Spring Weller has joined the Coalition and is working with North Node Wellness, Inc and will be providing services to Benton and surrounding counties. Lisa Werth is a member of the Coalition and is affiliated with CallaCCH

- Step 2: Ensure your problem statements are evidence-informed, then prioritize
- Step 3: Brainstorm what can be done about each
- Step 4: Prioritize your list, and develop SMART goal statements for each
- Step 5: List the steps to achieve each goal

Goal 2 – Promote community awareness by providing materials regarding the hazards of alcohol, prescription, synthetic drug misuse and other illicit controlled substances and provide funding to law enforcement and treatment facilities which will be done on an annual basis through various reporting.

Goal 1 – Increase the number of citations/arrests of impaired drivers in Benton County each year with convictions
