The LCC will reduce drug use amongst youth, ages 11-17, and adults by 1% within a one-year period. This will be known by supporting community efforts in awareness on prevention and education on drug misuse to the **youth and adults** along with family awareness within our community. Data will be documented from the CDC, FSSA Drug Facts Sheet, and Fulton County Statistics. If a 1% reduction is not achieved within one year, the LCCs approach will be reevaluated.

Goal 2

The LCC will reduce drug use amongst youth, ages 11-17, and adults by 3% within a one-year period. This will be known by supporting local schools with programs and technology to continue their efforts in reducing drug use in schools. This will also be known by supporting local programs in efforts to reduce adult drug use in our community. Data will be documented from the CDC, FSSA Drug Facts Sheet, and the Fulton County Statistics. If a 1% reduction is not achieved within one year, the LCCs approach will be reevaluated.

- 2. Intervention/Treatment- Support schools with items needed to be proactive on youth drug use
- 3. Justice Services/Supports- Fund government agencies for items to provide to students on local youth drug use statistics and juvenile court statistics

Goal 2

The LCC will increase the awareness of alcohol and drug prevention and education amongst youth ages between 11-17 within a one year. The awareness, education, and prevention among **youth within Fulton County** will increase by 1%. This data will be supported by the Fulton County Statistics according to the IU County Profiles on Children Removed From Home Due to Parent Alcohol and/or Drug Abuse in Fulton County. If a 1% reduction is not achieved within a year, the LCC's approach will be reevaluated.

- 1. Prevention/Education- Fund community prevention and education programs for youth awareness on alcohol and drugs
- 2. Intervention/Treatment- Support families with providing awareness to their children and support counseling agencies for families
- 3. Justice Services/Supports- Support law enforcement agencies on their involvement with youth in our community

Problem Statement #2

Goal 1

The LCC will reduce the alcohol related occurrences in our county by 1% within a one-year period. This will be supported by prevention and education programs through the jail and community. This will be known by following data on the Fulton County Statistics according to the IU County Profiles. Data will also be documented regarding drinking and driving arrests within our county from law enforcement agencies. If a 1% reduction is not achieved within one year, the LCCs approach will be reevaluated.

Steps

- 1. Prevention/Education- Support and/or fund law enforcement with updated training and education on alcohol related driving offenses
- 2. Intervention/Treatment- Support intervention and/or treatment efforts on alcohol abuse within our community. Support programs within the jail.
- 3. Justice Services/Supports- Support law enforcement with their efforts in removing impaired drivers from the roadway.

Goal 2

The LCC will reduce the alcohol related occurrences in our county by 1% within a one-year period. This will be known by supporting intervention and treatment programs within the community to prevent future alcohol related offenses. These programs may be within the jail. Data will be documented from law enforcement as well as from the Fulton County Statistics and FSSA Drug Facts sheet. If a 1% reduction is not achieved within one year, the LCCs approach will be reevaluated.

- Prevention/Education- Fund prevention and/or education programs focused on alcohol abuse and relapse
- 2. Intervention/Treatment- Support intervention and/or treatment programs for alcohol abuse. Support programs in the jail.
- 3. Justice Services/Support- Fund justice services in ways to prevent alcohol abuse.

Problem Statement #3

Goal 1

The LCC will reduce drug use amongst youth, ages 11-17, and adults by 1% within a one-year period. This will be known by supporting community efforts in awareness on prevention and education on drug misuse to the **youth and adults** along with family awareness within our community. Data will be documented from the CDC, FSSA Drug Facts Sheet, and Fulton County Statistics. If a 1% reduction is not achieved within one year, the LCCs approach will be reevaluated.

Steps

- Prevention/Education- Fund prevention and/or education programs focused on awareness of drug use in youth and adults
- 2. Intervention/Treatment- Support community efforts for intervention and/or treatment guidance for youth and adult drug use
- 3. Justice Services/Support-Support law enforcement on ways to become involved with community leaders in reducing youth drug use

Goal 2

The LCC will reduce drug use amongst youth, ages 11-17, and adults by 3% within a one-year period. This will be known by supporting local schools with programs and technology to continue their efforts in reducing drug use in schools. This will also be known by supporting local programs in efforts to reduce adult drug use in our community. Data will be documented from the CDC, FSSA Drug Facts Sheet, and the Fulton County Statistics. If a 1% reduction is not achieved within one year, the LCCs approach will be reevaluated.

- 1. 1.Prevention/Education- Fund prevention and/or education programs in schools and local agencies focused drug abuse
- 2. Intervention/Treatment- Support intervention and/or treatment for schools and local agencies to use in efforts to reduce drug use.
- 3. Justice Services/Supports- Fund schools and jails with programs and technology to reduce drug use in schools as well as adult treatment agencies with programs and technology to reduce drug use.
