

Plan Summary

Mission Statement: Drug and Tobacco Free Starke County, Inc. (DTFSC) mission statement is to “Reduce the abuse of alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs among youth and adults in Starke County, Indiana by developing and implementing a county wide comprehensive plan in the areas of prevention, education, treatment, and justice”.

History: Drug Free Starke County was organized on May 13, 1988 by Fred Lintner, who was at the time the director of the District One Prevention District Coordinating Office through a PDCO grant from the Division of Addiction Services, Indiana Department of Mental Health. The initial leadership consisted of Nancy Gappa, R.N. as chairperson, Reverend John Poppe as vice-chairperson and Tim Price and Habo Runkle as co-treasurers.

The LCC has met monthly since its inception and has struggled at times to maintain a viable membership base. The LCC has supported local projects and initiatives through allocation of the local drug-free community fund in the areas of prevention/education, treatment and law enforcement/judicial. One of the main projects that the LCC has been sponsoring over the last years is the Red Ribbon Placemat Contest during the Red Ribbon Week in October. We ask each of the three school corporations (Knox, Oregon Davis, and North Judson/San Pierre) to have youth in grades one through five in an anti-alcohol, tobacco, and other drug placemat-making contest. The placemats are voted on and there are winners from each school corporation. The winners and their families are invited to a ceremony in the Circuit Court Courtroom where they receive recognition and prizes for their winning placemats. The posters are also made into placemats and distributed to the local restaurants all throughout the county. Last year we had 10,000 placemats printed and distributed.

Since 1999, we have succeeded in boosting our membership. Attendance at our monthly meetings has improved dramatically. In October of 2001, we hired a paid part-time coordinator to coordinate committees, meeting notices, mailings, etc. The coordinator is paid through the local drug-free fund.

The Committee has funded education, treatment, and justice. We have done compliance checks on retail sales of tobacco to underage youth and participated in Operation Pullover for drunk drivers. In 2006 the Prevention Committee has hosted a town hall meeting dealing with underage drinking and sponsored a community Meth Workshop. As a result of the success of these two events we are creating a "roadshow" that will travel to different areas of the county to inform the public about underage drinking and meth use in the county.

Summary of the Comprehensive Community Plan:

The 2008 Starke County Comprehensive plan listed three main problems which came from a county wide focus group held in April 2008. The focus group was made up of healthcare professionals, youth, parents, law enforcement, teachers, counselors, average citizens interested in the substance abuse issues in the county, and faith based community representatives.

We took the main problems from the focus group; data collected by the LCC over the past year, data from the law enforcement, treatment facility, and schools and decided what the LCC should focus on for Starke County during the next three years.

We will focus on the issue of high amount of tobacco use by youth and adults in the county. We will try to raise awareness of the harms of tobacco and secondhand smoke. We will also work toward a clean air ordinance for the county.

The second problem the LCC will address is the need for easier access to treatment for substance abuse issues in the county. Currently there is only one treatment facility in the county and that facility is not able to handle the number of residents who need service. The LCC will continue to support the local facility and look for solutions to meet the needs of residents.

The third problem the LCC will address is the high incidence of alcohol and other drug use and abuse among the adult and youth populations in the county. The LCC will continue to promote prevention/intervention in the county and partner with other organizations to do the same. We will work with treatment facilities and try to help residents find needed treatment to address substance abuse. The LCC will continue to work with and support law enforcement in reducing illegal alcohol use in youth and encourage programs to reduce drunk driving in the county. The LCC will also continue to support the drug dog, teen court, and other justices programs in place.

This plan reflects the problems we identified in Starke County and the goals and objectives to address those problems.

As the LCC implements this new plan we look forward to positive results with decreases in tobacco use, increased treatment services, and decreases in alcohol and other drug use in Starke County over the next three years.

End of Year 1 Update:

1. We funded Tar Wars program for 2009/2010 school year.
2. No new cessation services are available in the community, only through Porter-Starke Services.
3. We sponsor Tobacco Free Day at the Starke County Fair and have a booth to give out information on the Indiana Quitline.
4. Our coordinator speaks to senior and youth groups on the harms of second hand smoke. Literature is given at community events.
5. We have materials for parents and caregivers that is passed out at community events.
6. We are not ready to pursue a clean air ordinance at this time in Starke County.
7. We work with the Chamber of Commerce to promote smoke free work places. We have 2 new smoke free restaurants in the county.
8. We were at the fair in July 2009 with a booth. We participated in the local health fair in November 2008.
9. Coordinator contacted the top 10 employers in the county about their smoke free work place policies and offered help the 2 who are not smoke free to create a policy. Offered quitline information for their employees.
10. Talked to the top 10 employers to find out if their health insurance covers cessation and/or prescriptions to help employees stop smoking. Only 1 employer stated they do not have insurance coverage for cessation or prescription assistance.

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A. Problem Statement #2: Residents in need of substance abuse treatment services face a shortage of options in general, especially affordable services.

B. Supportive Data:

1. Porter Starke Services is now showing 80% of the clients from Starke County are at or below poverty level this percentage increased from 68% in 2006
2. Probation department reports problems with court ordered clients being able to get treatment due to lack of options and costs of driving out of county for services

3. Only one mental health service provider in Starke County.
4. Porter Starke has lost two professional staff members in January 2008 and as of May 2008 have not replaced them.
5. Currently the only aftercare services available in Starke County are AA, NA, and Tobacco support groups for smokers who have quit or are in the process of quitting.
6. All youth requiring treatment, as of January 2008, must go out of the county for service, currently they go to Pulaski County, Porter County, Marshall County or St. Joseph County
7. In 2007 probation reports that 31 juveniles were referred for substance abuse evaluations, 19 were serviced in the county, 6 went to Marshall County, 2 Pulaski County, 3 Porter County and one is out of state.
8. In 2007, probation reports that 125 adults were referred for substance abuse evaluation, 58 remained in Starke County, 3 went to Porter Co., 2 Lake Co., 18 Marshall Co., 7 St. Joseph Co., 10 Pulaski Co., 1 Elkhart Co., 1 Fulton Co., 1 Marion Co., 3 out of state, and 9 information not available.

End of Year 1 Update:

1. Porter Starke Services is now showing 82% of the clients from Starke County are at or below poverty level this percentage increased from 80% in 2008
2. Probation department reports problems with court ordered clients being able to get treatment due to lack of options and costs of driving out of county for services These barriers still exist.
3. There is still only one mental health service provider. There are two private counselors in the county.
4. A new director and other staff have been added to Porter Starke. More services are available and additional services are being planned for the future.
5. This remains the same.
6. A new youth treatment program is being planned at Porter-Starke. It started in the fall of 2009.
7. No new statistics as probation is making internal changes at this time. A youth probation officer will be in place after January 2010.

1. 89% of parents want information on how to talk to their children about alcohol and drugs. (in county survey of parents by DTFSC in September 2007)
2. Over 159 alcohol related arrests were made by the Sheriff's department in 2007.
3. Of the 159 plus alcohol related arrests made by the Starke Co. Sheriff's department, 48 were minors.
4. In 2007 the Sheriff's Department made over 58 drug related arrests , 33% for marijuana, 36% for methamphetamine, 14 of the meth arrests were for manufacturing and sales, 27% for cocaine use or sales, 4% prescription drug related sales. 9 of those arrests were minors.
5. 4% of students in county reported first use of alcohol at age 10 or younger

- 6. 8% of students report first use of alcohol between ages 11 and 13.
