#### **CHAPTER 207**

## **Cybersecurity Incident Reporting**

#### 207-1 Definitions

"Attack vector" means one of the following categories of methods or ways for attacking, infiltrating, or otherwise compromising a computer network system:

- (A) Ransomware;
- (**B**) Business email compromise;
- **(C)** Vulnerability exploitation;
- (**D**) Zero-day exploitation;
- (E) Distributed denial of service;
- (**F**) Web site defacement; and
- (G)Other sophisticated attacks as defined by the chief information officer of the Office and that are posted on the Office's Internet web site.

"Office" means the Office of Technology of the State of Indiana.

- "Cybersecurity incident" means a malicious or suspicious occurrence that consists of one (1) or more categories of attack vectors that:
- (A) Jeopardizes or may potentially jeopardize the confidentiality, integrity, or availability of an information system, an operational system, or the information that such systems process, store, or transmit;
- **(B)** Jeopardizes or may potentially jeopardize the health and safety of the public; or,
- **(C)** Violates security policies, security procedures, or acceptable use policies.

### 207-2. Designation of Primary Reporters

The following employment positions within Monroe County Government are designated as "primary reporters" for purposes of this Chapter:

- (A) Chief Technology Officer of the Monroe County Technical Services Department;
- (**B**) Commissioners Administrative Assistant; and,
- (C) County's Cyber Insurance Carrier.

The name and contact information of each primary reporter shall be provided to the Office before September 1<sup>st</sup> of each year.

# 207-3. Reporting Requirement

A primary reporter shall report any cybersecurity incident using their best professional judgment to the Office without unreasonable delay and not later than two (2) business days after discovery of the cybersecurity incident in a format prescribed by the chief information officer of the Office. Nothing in this section shall be construed to require reporting that conflicts with federal privacy laws or is prohibited due to an ongoing law enforcement investigation
