GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 7-1991

AN ORDINANCE DIRECTING THE PLACEMENT OF TRAFFIC CONTROL SIGNS

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of Wabash County, Indiana, under the authority of Indiana Code 8-17-1-1 et. seq. and Indiana Code 9-4-1-1 et. seq. and all acts amendatory thereto of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana;

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of Wabash County, Indiana, has determined that there is a need for stop signs to be placed at the intersection of Meridian Road and the railroad crossing on the north edge of North Manchester, Indiana, causing all traffic traveling north or south on said road to stop at the railroad crossing; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the County of Wabash shall be responsible for the placement of the sign on the north side of said intersection and the City of North Manchester shall be responsible for the placement of the sign on the south side of said intersection;

NOW. THEREFORE, from and after the erection of appropriate signs, all traffic on Meridian Road travelling toward the intersection of Meridian Road and the railroad crossing on the north edge of North Manchester, Indiana, shall be required to stop at said intersection, and said traffic shall proceed only at such time as it is safe to do so.

Further, it shall be the responsibility of the County of Wabash to place a stop sign on the north side of said Meridian Road and railroad crossing intersection.

The effect of this Ordinance shall be to make all traffic traveling north and south on Meridian Road stop at the intersection of Meridian Road and the railroad crossing.

Any person who violates any provision of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a Class "C" infraction.
