

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### 2004 Indiana Probation Report

The 2004 Indiana Probation Report is prepared by the Division of State Court Administration pursuant to Administrative Rule 1(c) of the Indiana Rules of Court and Indiana Code 11-13-1-4. The report represents an annual compilation of workload data and an overview of funds expended on probation personnel. Probation reporting requirements were initially established through legislation which was implemented by the Division of State Court Administration in 1981 when the first Indiana Probation Report was published.

Probation Services. Probation services in Indiana fall within the supervisory authority of the judiciary. The probationer remains under the jurisdiction of the sentencing court until the completion of the term of probation. This is in contrast with parole services which are an integral part of the Department of Correction, an executive branch agency.

Probation officers are trial court employees and are subject to the appointment and supervisory power of the courts which they serve. The organization of probation departments and related services reflect the diverse nature of Indiana's local court structure.

The Judicial Conference of Indiana, through recommendations of the Judges' Probation Committee and the Probation Officers' Advisory Board, sets guidelines, standards for qualification, and governing policies for probation officers. The Judicial Conference of Indiana prescribes minimum standards for compensation, serves as compact administrator of the Interstate Compact and oversees the training and education of probation officers by the Indiana Judicial Center.

In 1988, the Indiana General Assembly authorized the use of home detention, with or without electronic monitoring, as a condition of probation. Home detention may be ordered by the trial court as a condition of probation or as a direct commitment to a Community Corrections Program for certain offenders. Some home detention programs are operated under community correction agencies which function independently from the probation departments.

As of September 30, 2004, thirty (30) probation departments were supervising adult probationers and juvenile probationers through home detention, either with or without electronic monitoring. These departments collected

\$4,504,245.50 in home detention user fees between October 1, 2003 and September 30, 2004. These fees are charged in addition to probation user fees. Community Correction agencies collected over \$9,450,767.34 from individuals being electronically monitored on home detention. Home detention supervisions are counted as "Other" supervisions for purposes of this report and are included in the aggregate supervisions reflected herein. A detailed report on Indiana's home detention program is available from the Indiana Judicial Center.

By statute, the Judicial Conference of Indiana administers the Interstate Compact for the transfer of adult and juvenile probationers in and out of Indiana and serves as the intermediary for the return of juvenile runaways, absconders, and escapees. From July 1, 2003 to June 30, 2004, 1,564 probationers transferred into Indiana and 1,770 probationers transferred out of Indiana under the Interstate Compact.

Funding of Probation Services. Probation services, similar to most other trial court operations, are supported almost entirely through local expenditures. Many counties fund probation functions through the budgets of the trial courts while in the more populous counties, the probation office often submits a separate budget to the local funding authority. Some of the probation costs, which maybe defrayed by the collection of adult and juvenile probation user fees set by statute, are paid to the probation department and are used for probation services. Counties which have established and maintain juvenile detention facilities reflect this substantial expenditure as a probation expense.

Because many counties do not have a separate probation budget, non-personnel expenditures are absorbed within the court's expenditures, making it impossible to derive a complete picture of all probation related expenditures. This report does reflect probation personnel positions, a range of compensation, and such other probation expenditures as the probation departments have reported.

Fiscal Data. The 2004 data indicates that county trial courts could identify \$52,923,321 spent on probation services while the expenditures of the probation departments of the city and town courts were \$1,517,666. This represents approximately 39% of all expenditures on the operation of the courts. However, this amount was offset by the collection of adult and

juvenile probation user fees. In 2004, \$17,166,058 was collected statewide in adult probation user fees and \$2,077,980 in juvenile user fees, for a total of \$19,244,038. These revenues also represent an increase from the previous year.

As a condition of probation, many probationers are ordered to pay restitution. These funds are usually collected and distributed to the appropriate recipient by the clerk's office or by the probation department. In 2004, \$6,848,994 was paid by probationers for distribution to aggrieved parties.

Summary of 2004 Caseload Data. The probation caseload information presented in this report was submitted on a quarterly basis. It reflects the number of adult and juvenile supervisions pending at the beginning and end of the year, the number received and the number of supervisions closed during the reporting year.

Beginning in 1996, Indiana's probation departments began mandatory use of a probation classification and workload measures system. Thus, probationers are assigned to supervision based on the relative risk of committing a new offense while on probation. The statistical information reflects the relative risk levels of probationers on supervision as of December 31, 2004.

The report also reflects data on the manner of disposition by which the supervision is eventually concluded. The juvenile data provides information on the total number of juvenile referrals, preliminary inquiries, predisposition reports, and adult presentence investigations.

The number of new probation cases received during 2004 indicates an increase in probation caseload. New felony supervisions received during 2004 increased by 2,226, an increase of 7.7% compared with last year. Misdemeanor supervisions increased by 968, an increase of 1.4%. Juvenile supervisions decreased by 981, a decrease of 4%. The overall number of new supervisions increased by 2,213. In the adult category, 99,114 persons were placed on probation during the reporting year, a number which could have resulted in increased inmate population in the Department of Correction absent the probation system.

This overall caseload increase was accompanied by an increase in the number of probation officers and other employees and a corresponding increase in the amount of funds expended on probation services. At the end of 2004, Indiana probation departments were

supervising 143,840 adults and juveniles, a decrease of .5% from the previous year.

During 2004, there were approximately 1,140 professional probation officers and approximately 548 other employees providing probation services throughout Indiana.

It is hoped that the information reflected in this report will serve as a useful tool for the trial courts, legislature and probation departments in carrying out their duties. The successful completion of the effort would not have been possible without the cooperation and contribution of the probation officers and their staff.

### 2004 INDIANA PROBATION REPORT DEFINITIONS

The following definitions will be used throughout the 2004 Indiana Probation Report.

**Referral -** If the local child protection service determines that the best interests of the child require action in the juvenile or criminal court, the local child protection service shall:

(1) refer the case to the juvenile court under Indiana Code 31-34-7; or (2) make a referral to the prosecuting attorney if criminal prosecution is desired. (Indiana Code 31-33-14-1).

**Delinquent or Non-Status Delinquent** – a child who has allegedly committed an offense prior to attaining 18 years of age that would be considered an offense if committed by an adult (Indiana Code 31-37-1-2).

**Status Delinquent** – a juvenile who is charged with committing an act that would not be considered a crime if committed by an adult. Examples include runaways, truancy, incorrigibility, violations of curfew, and violations of Indiana Code 7.1-5-7 (minors and alcoholic beverages) (Indiana Code 31-37-2-2 *through* Indiana Code 31-37-2-6).

CHINS (Child in Need of Services) – cases where a child is alleged to be a child in need of services as a result of a child's physical or mental condition being seriously impaired or seriously endangered due to the inability, refusal, or neglect of the child's parent, guardian, or custodian to supply the child with necessary food, clothing, shelter, medical care, education, or supervision (Indiana Code 31-34-1-1).

Post-Sentence Supervisions – persons ordered under supervision after conviction and sentencing.

**Shock Probation** – persons ordered under supervision under the shock probation statute (Indiana Code 35-38-1-18) as a result of early release from initial conviction and sentencing.

**Split Sentence Supervisions** – persons ordered under supervision after commitment to the Indiana Department of Correction for a period of time, or commitment to a local facility.

Interstate Accepted – persons accepted under supervision from other states.

Intrastate Accepted – persons accepted under supervision from other courts in Indiana.


Supervision in Lieu of Prosecution – persons ordered under supervision as an alternative to prosecution.





#### **Substance Abuse Conviction Supervisions**



### JUVENILE LAW SERVICES REPORT

Pursuant to Indiana Code 31-31-10-1 (S.B. 400, 1997), the probation department for the juvenile court is required to maintain information relating to delinquent children and children in need of services who receive juvenile law services and all financial information relating to each juvenile law services.

The terms "juvenile law services" and "all financial information" are not defined by statute. In light of this, the Division of State Court Administration ("Division"), in conjunction with the Juvenile Justice Improvement Committee ("Committee") of the Indiana Judicial Conference of Indiana, have defined "juvenile law services" for the purposes of the reporting requirements of this law to mean:

The filing of a JD (Juvenile Delinquent) case, JS (Juvenile Status), JC (Child in Need of Service or CHINS), or JM (Juvenile Miscellaneous) case as defined pursuant to Administrative Rule 8 with a court. The interpretation of case types in Administrative Rule 8 generally refers to the following:

JD – cases where a child is alleged to be delinquent as a result of committing an offense prior to attaining 18 years of age that would be considered an offense if committed by an adult (Indiana Code 31-37-1-2).

JS – cases where a child is charged with committing an act that would not be considered a crime if committed by an adult. Examples include runaways, truancy, incorrigibility, violations of curfew, and violations of Indiana Code 7.1-5-7 (minors and alcoholic beverages) (Indiana Code 31-37-2-2 through Indiana Code 31-37-2-6).

JC – cases where a child is alleged to be a child in need of services as a result of a child's physical or mental condition being seriously impaired or seriously endangered as a result of the inability, refusal, or neglect of the child's parent, guardian, or custodian to supply the child with necessary food, clothing, shelter, medical care, education, or supervision (Indiana Code 31-34-1-1).

JM – cases of juvenile matters not reflected in other categories including court approval of informal adjustments.

The financial information available to the courts and probation departments is limited to expenditures made through court budgets. Expenditures made from county general fund could be made available to the probation department and the court if identified as such by the county auditor. The bulk of financial information on children receiving "juvenile law services" is collected and reported by the Family and Social Services Administration.


In light of this, the Division and the Committee have defined "all financial information" to be the monies spent through the courts' budgets and any other county expenditures that the county auditor can identify and provide to the court and/or probation department as monies spent on juvenile cases filed as either JD, JS, JC, or JM, as defined above. This includes expenditures by the Office of Family and Children for the reporting period, if the probation department can obtain information on those expenditures from the county auditor.

Because the probation departments do not maintain much of this information and yet are requested to provide it, these forms call for lump sum summary financial information.

The juvenile law services reports were advisory for 1999. They were mandatory beginning in 2000.




