STATEMENTS OF PURPOSE

The Department of Child Services (DCS) will verify and document the [age](#) and [citizenship](#) of a child to determine eligibility for Title IV-E Foster Care (Title IV-E) funding.

PROCEDURE

The DCS Central Eligibility Unit (CEU) will:

1. Review the eligibility information in the case management system; and
2. Make a determination of whether the age and citizenship criteria are met.

PRACTICE GUIDANCE

Age

In order to be eligible for Title IV-E, the child must be under 18 years of age at the time of removal or entering the Collaborative Care (CC) program. See policy [11.18 Eligibility for Collaborative Care](#) for information on CC eligibility criteria and [Related Information](#) for examples of supporting documentation to verify a child's age.

Citizenship

In order to be eligible for Title IV-E, the child must be either a citizen of the United States or an alien lawfully admitted for permanent residence. See policy [2.23 Verifying Citizenship or Immigration Status](#) for additional guidance and examples of supporting documentation to verify citizenship.

RELATED INFORMATION

Supporting Documentation to Verify Age

Examples of acceptable supporting documentation that may be used to verify the child's age include, but are not limited to:

1. Birth certificate;
2. Bureau of Vital Statistics;
3. Public Assistance records;
4. School records;
5. Hospital records;
6. Physician records;
7. Passport;
8. Driver's license;
9. State Identification Card (ID);
10. Naturalization papers; and
11. Immigration papers.
