DCS celebrates life-saving efforts by Hartford City police officers

INDIANAPOLIS (Sept. 5, 2025) – Indiana Department of Child Services (DCS) Director Adam Krupp and Blackford County Local Office Director Ryan Jacobs recognized Hartford City Police Sergeant Tyler Capper, Captain Joel Allred, Lieutenant Lucas Phillips and Patrolman Cory Shepherd for their valiant efforts in locating an endangered juvenile.

"Community collaboration is the key to child welfare, and in this case, which is just the latest example of how Hartford City law enforcement and DCS work together, a child's life was saved," said Director Krupp. "All involved are community heroes and Indiana celebrates them for their bravery."

Director Krupp presented Sergeant Capper with a challenge coin for his outstanding work and commitment to protecting vulnerable children. Captain Allred, Lieutenant Phillips and Patrolman Shepherd were given certificates of honor for their vital role in ensuring a child's safety during a high-stress situation.

"I couldn't be more proud of our officers for their relentless effort to find and save a child in need. Their dedication and determination reflect exactly what it means to serve and protect," said Hartford City Police Chief Cody Crouse. "As Chief, my job is made easier because I am surrounded by people who not only make me look good, but who make this entire department shine. This was a true team effort, strengthened by the strong working relationships we share with our partner agencies. Today, together, we once again proved what can be accomplished when it matters most."
