


AUSTIN BOTTOMS CONSERVATION AREA

- Eight key objectives have been identified for HRI:
 - Provide a model that balances forests, farmed lands and natural resources conservation.
 - Connect separated parcels of public land to benefit wildlife.
 - Restore and enhance areas of land along the Wabash River, Muscatatuck River and Sugar Creek.
 - Protect important habitat for wildlife.
 - Open land to the public for recreational activities such as fishing, hunting, trapping, hiking, canoeing, bird-watching and boating.
 - Protect important rest areas for migratory birds.
 - Establish areas for nature tourism.
 - Provide clean water and protection from flooding to landowners downstream.

HISTORY



The Healthy Rivers Initiative, the largest land conservation initiative to be undertaken in Indiana, was announced in June 2010. It includes a partnership of resource agencies and organizations who are working with willing landowners to permanently protect more than 43,000 acres along the Wabash River and Sugar Creek in west-central Indiana, and more than 26,000 acres of the Muscatatuck River bottomlands in southeast Indiana.

The project area stretches across three counties: Scott, Jackson and Washington.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

In addition to state and wildlife laws, this property is governed by posted regulations affecting the public use of lands and facilities owned, leased or licensed by the DNR.

Posted Areas

Safety zones, refuges, waterfowl resting areas and other restricted areas are marked with appropriate signs.

Violations

Violation of any law, rule or regulation governing this property may be cause for forfeiting your hunting, fishing or visiting privileges on this area.

Responsibility

The DNR will not be held responsible for any accidents or deaths occurring from the use of these facilities.

Permits

A hunting and/or fishing license is required to hunt or fish on the property.

Collecting permits are required for the collection of anything except nuts, berries and mushrooms.

Trespassing on Private Property

Please be courteous to neighboring landowners. Watch for the property boundary and safety zone signs. Stay inside boundaries. Do not trespass on private property.

Traffic

Traffic on public roads throughout the area is governed by state and county laws. No motorized vehicles, horses or bicycles are permitted beyond county roads. Traffic over service roads and trails, except by authorized vehicles, is restricted to walking. Parking is in designated lots only.

Target Shooting

Target shooting is prohibited.



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- Stucker Fork Fish & Wildlife Area offers 1,528 acres of bottomland forest for hunting. It is north of Scottsburg on Finley-Firehouse Road and Thomastown Road.
- Crosley Fish & Wildlife Area offers 4,228 acres of rolling hills and ponds for hunting and fishing. It is located south of North Vernon on S.R. 3.
- Clifty Falls State Park offers camping, picnicking, playgrounds and Clifty Inn. It is located near Madison, with entrances off S.R. 62 and S.R. 56.

NEIGHBORING LAND

The Muscatatuck River bottoms is a great place to view a wide variety of birds and waterfowl. River otters, beavers, deer and other mammals are also common.

ADDITIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

Gathering berries, nuts, and mushrooms is allowed; however, spring mushroom hunting is restricted to after 1 p.m. daily during the spring turkey season.

TRAPPING

- All hunting seasons and bag limits apply.
- No check-in is required to hunt or fish on the area.
- The area is mainly bottomland hardwood interspersed with wetlands. Hunting is available for deer, turkey, squirrel and waterfowl.

HUNTING

- The area is mainly bottomland hardwood interspersed with wetlands. Hunting is available for deer, turkey, squirrel and waterfowl.
- No check-in is required to hunt or fish on the area.
- All hunting seasons and bag limits apply.

FISHING

Camping, campfires and swimming are prohibited.

FUNDING FOR HEALTHY RIVERS INITIATIVE

Funding for HRI land acquisition comes from several conservation agencies and organizations. These include: the DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife-Lifetime License Trust Fund and Game Bird Habitat Stamps*, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service – Wildlife Restoration & Sport Fish Program**, Natural Resources Conservation Service, The Nature Conservancy, North American Wetlands Conservation Act, Indiana Heritage Trust, and the revenue from the sale of hunting, fishing and trapping licenses.

*This fund contains revenue from the sale of lifetime fishing, hunting and trapping licenses, which the DNR stopped selling in 2005. The Game Bird Habitat Stamp includes revenue from the sale of Game Bird Habitat Stamps, which is required to hunt game birds in Indiana.

**This program is administered by the USFWS. Funds come from excise taxes paid to the federal government, by manufacturers of sporting arms and ammunition, fishing equipment and motor boat fuel. These user-based funds are returned to Indiana according to a formula based on licensed hunters and anglers, then used to manage fish and wildlife resources. By buying a hunting or fishing license in Indiana, you contribute to fish and wildlife conservation.
