

WATER RESOURCE AVAILABILITY REPORTS FOR INDIANA

DIVISION OF WATER

Although Indiana is a water-rich state, few reports have summarized the state's water resource on a regional basis. Perhaps the most comprehensive treatment of Indiana's water resource can be found in a series of reports published by the Indiana Department of Resources, Division of Water. In these studies, the division summarizes the amount, location, and characteristics of surface water and ground water for regional river basins (figure 1). By comparing the supply potential of surface-water and ground-water systems with current and projected water use, the division can identify areas of potential water-use conflicts and areas of underutilized water supply.

Topics covered in the basin study reports include:

- Socioeconomic setting
- · Geological framework
- · Climatic features
- · Surface-water hydrology and quality
- · Ground-water hydrology and quality
- · Current and projected water use
- · Potential for water use conflicts

Of the twelve regional river basins shown in (figure 1), five have been completed. They include the St. Joseph(file size 831kb), Whitewater(file size 1,020kb), Kankakee(file size 1,649kb), Lake Michigan(file size 1,991kb), and Maumee(file size 1,918kb) River basins.
