#### **New Hire Training Reminder**

Staff who began working in the cafeteria after the start of the school year must receive USDA's <u>required number of training hours</u>. These staff members must be civil rights trained and must receive job-specific training as it pertains to the child nutrition programs. # Updated: Team Nutrition's "Offering Meats and Meat Alternates at School Breakfast" Training Guide

Team Nutrition's "Offering Meats and Meat Alternates at School Breakfast" training guide has been updated to be consistent with the Final Rule, "Child Nutrition Programs: Meal Patterns Consistent With the 2020-2025 Dietary Guidelines for Americans." The final rule allows schools the option to offer grains, meats/meat alternates, or a combination of both at breakfast. This 20-page training guide shows school nutrition professionals how to offer meats and meat alternates at school breakfast by providing menu planning ideas, crediting information, sample menus, and more.

#### **USDA Fiscal Year (FY) Farm to School Grant Program**

In FY 2025, the USDA will award up to \$12 million in competitive grants to eligible entities through the grant program. Each grant will help eligible entities implement farm to school programming that increases access to local food in eligible schools, connects children with agriculture for better health, and inspires youth to consider careers in agriculture. # Department of Defense (DoD) Fresh Fruits and Vegetables Allocation Requests for School Year 2025-2026

The time has come to submit your school's allocation requests for next school year. Schools must complete the appropriate form that applies to your School Food Authority. The deadline for submission is Friday, December 13, at 5 p.m. ET. Remember that DoD allocations are deducted from your school's USDA Foods entitlement before the annual pre-order survey opens.

#### **Holiday Breaks**

Please remember to put a 24-hour access phone number under the Application tab in CNPweb and crossreference your school calendars and personal calendars with your USDA Foods delivery periods under the Orders tab in FDP link in CNPweb. Schools must ensure that school staff is available to inspect, verify and accept all USDA Foods deliveries. Missed deliveries where school staff is unavailable could result in costs to the school for transportation, fuel, handling, and restocking fees.

#### Remember to Receipt in FFAVORS

Schools should be receipting their DoD produce receipts into FFAVORS within five calendar days after the produce delivery.

# Guidance for Accepting Processed Product Documentation for Meal Pattern Requirements

USDA has released an updated policy memo, <u>SP 05-2025, CACFP 04-2025, SFSP 02-2025 Guidance for Accepting Processed Product Documentation for Meal Pattern Requirements</u>. The updated memo provides important information about acceptable manufacturer documentation for meal pattern contribution crediting information. Of note, the memo clarifies the difference between the date of authorization found on the CN label and the "Valid Until" date on the CN Label Verification Report. Additionally, the memo confirms the use of the CN Label Verification System to check if a CN label is valid. Additional USDA resources:

# Fees for Electronic Payment Services in the School Meals Program - Updated Clarification

On November 1, 2024, FNS released <u>SP 04-2025, Fees for Electronic Payment Services in the School Meal Programs.</u> This memorandum clarifies the policy related to fees associated with electronic (online) payments in the school meal programs. The memo states that, effective school year (SY) 2027-2028, families with students eligible for reduced price meal benefits in the school meal programs must not be charged any fees for using electronic payment services in the school meal programs. This means that families with students eligible for reduced-price meal benefits are not required to pay any fees, even if the school offers an alternative payment option that normally doesn't require fees.

This policy is effective SY 2027-2028, or the school year immediately following the expiration of the SFA's current contract with a payment processing company, if the contract expires after SY 2027-2028. FNS is delaying implementation of this requirement to provide ample lead time to allow SFAs to modify current systems and/or establish new contracts. However, SFAs are encouraged to implement this requirement as soon as they are able and may use funds in the nonprofit school food service account to cover the fees under their current contract.

The following list provides additional clarification for schools that choose to provide electronic payment services.

- SFAs must provide all families (including families paying the full price for school meals) a free and accessible method of making deposits to the student meal account.
- 2. SFAs must provide a method of making deposits to the student meal account that does not require computer access to meet the needs of families who do not have access to a computer, do not have a bank account, or who prefer to make their payment by other means. Common methods SFAs use for families to add money to their child(ren)'s meal account(s) that do not require computer access include accepting money (i.e., cash and checks) at the school office or allowing families to mail in checks.
- SFAs must notify families of available payment options and any associated fees in ways that are easy to find and understand.
- 4. All families must have access to all payment methods made available by an SFA for adding money to their student(s)' meal account(s). Schools cannot discriminate against children receiving free or reduced price meals, including by limiting their options to pay for the cost of meals in comparison to the options available to other school children. For example, SFAs may not exclude families eligible for reduced price meals from using electronic payment services.
