## **Update on Other 2022 Behavioral Health Commission Report Recommendations**

Indiana has made significant progress on most of the Commission's 2022 Report Recommendations. The Commission recommends building upon the progress and continued examination of several 2022 recommendations. Below is a summary of the progress to date on the 2022 recommendations.

## **Progress underway**

Progress is currently underway on the below 2022 recommendations, as detailed throughout this 2024 BHC Report.

- 1. Invest in and connect 988 (see section 1.1)
- 2. Take action to establish CCBHC as the primary behavioral healthcare model statewide (see section 1.1)
- 3. Increase enforcement of mental health parity requirements (see section 1.2)
- 4. Workforce
  - a. Targeted study of Medicaid reimbursement rates and corresponding increases in those rates (see section 1.2)
  - b. Reduce administrative barriers such as a cumbersome professional licensing process to allow more qualified individuals to work as behavioral health professionals (see section 2)
  - c. Fund a long-term student loan/tuition reimbursement program for behavioral health professionals, including coordination with and help navigating existing programs (see section 2)
  - d. Increase capacity of psychiatric consultation programs for primary care providers (see section 2)
- 5. A series of criminal justice-focused strategies, including increasing the number of mental health courts and competency restoration
  - a. Criminal justice-focused strategies are not addressed in this 2024 BHC Report; however, Indiana has made targeted investments to increase the number of mental health courts and decrease the average wait time for competency restoration services.

- 6. Reducing administrative burdens and improve data- sharing capacity (see section 1, 2, and 3)
- 7. The 2022 BHC Report recommended follow up examination on the following, all addressed in the 2024 Commission meetings and section 3 of this 2024 BHC Report:
  - a. Unique challenges and complexity of components of the mental health system serving children, including the DCS-run residential care system (see section 3.1)
  - b. Addressing the increasing mental health needs of Indiana's senior citizen population (see section 3.2)
  - c. Services to individuals with dual diagnoses of Intellectual Disabilities and Mental Illness (see section 3.3)

## No significant progress to date

Indiana has not yet made significant progress on the following 2022 recommendations.

- 1. Establishing a Medicaid waiver to allow for federal reimbursement of some costs of behavioral health care for individuals while they are incarcerated
- 2. Other strategies to improve Hoosiers' mental health literacy
- 3. Using Medicaid to pay for housing supports and other Social Determinants of Health
