

School Hearing Screening FAQs for Families



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My child did not pass their hearing screening at school– what do I do now?

Hearing It is very important that your child receives a full hearing test by an audiologist. The hearing test can determine if there is temporary or permanent hearing loss present, or if your child has normal hearing. The pediatric audiologist can also provide recommendations or treatment options. Why is it important that my child receive another hearing test?

Hearing screening is often the first step in identifying school-age children who may have hearing difficulties. If your child does not receive a diagnostic hearing test, it may delay the identification of hearing difficulties and the support and services they need to listen and learn.

Hearing difficulties (even if in the mild range, in one ear or temporary) can cause the following challenges at school or in conversations:

- ⇒ Delays in reading and spelling
- ⇒ Listening and understanding speech in noise
- ⇒ Reducing social interactions
- ⇒ Difficulty following directions and understanding classroom instructions
