Vaccines for Children (VFC) Program



Who May Participate in the VFC Program?

Your children may be able to get no-cost vaccines through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Vaccines for Children (VFC) Program at healthcare providers offices, pharmacies and health clinics that are enrolled in the VFC Program.

Children aged 18 years or younger who meet at least one of the following requirements are eligible:

- American Indian / Alaskan Native
- Medicaid-eligible
- Uninsured
- Under insured

Additional Information

Underinsured means that your child has health insurance, but the insurance policy:

- Doesn't cover any vaccines
- Covers only certain recommended vaccines
- Covers up to a certain dollar limit or cap of recommended vaccines

There is no cost for the vaccines given by VFC Program providers to eligible children. This means that no one can charge a fee for the vaccine itself.

Healthcare providers can charge what is called an "administration fee". An administration fee is similar to a patient's co-pay in that it helps providers offset their costs of doing business.
