MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Floyd County Health Department is to promote, provide, and coordinate public health services. We will endeavor to integrate and collaborate with key community service providers and emergency service agencies to present a cohesive defense against both terrorist attack and natural disaster response for Floyd County, Indiana.

HEALTH FIRST INDIANA (HFI)

Health First Indiana is an initiative created by Senate Enrolled Act 4, legislation passed by the 2023 Indiana General Assembly that transforms public health. The legislation provides funding so counties can determine the health needs of their community and implement evidence-based programs focused on prevention. Health First Indiana establishes a public health infrastructure through a state and local partnership where services are delivered at the county level. Counties decide whether to opt-in to the new funding and providing the core public health services, including trauma and injury prevention, chronic disease prevention, maternal and child health and more.

At Least 60% of HFI funding must be spent on these core services

Success Story

Floyd County Health Department (FCHD) used Health First Indiana funding to offer a car seat safety program. On the first day the program began, the Floyd County WIC office referred a local family. The family had a young baby and their car seat had recently been involved in a car crash. The trained car seat safety technicians at FCHD checked the car seat and found signs of damage. Because of HFI funding, they provided the family with a new car seat and car seat check.

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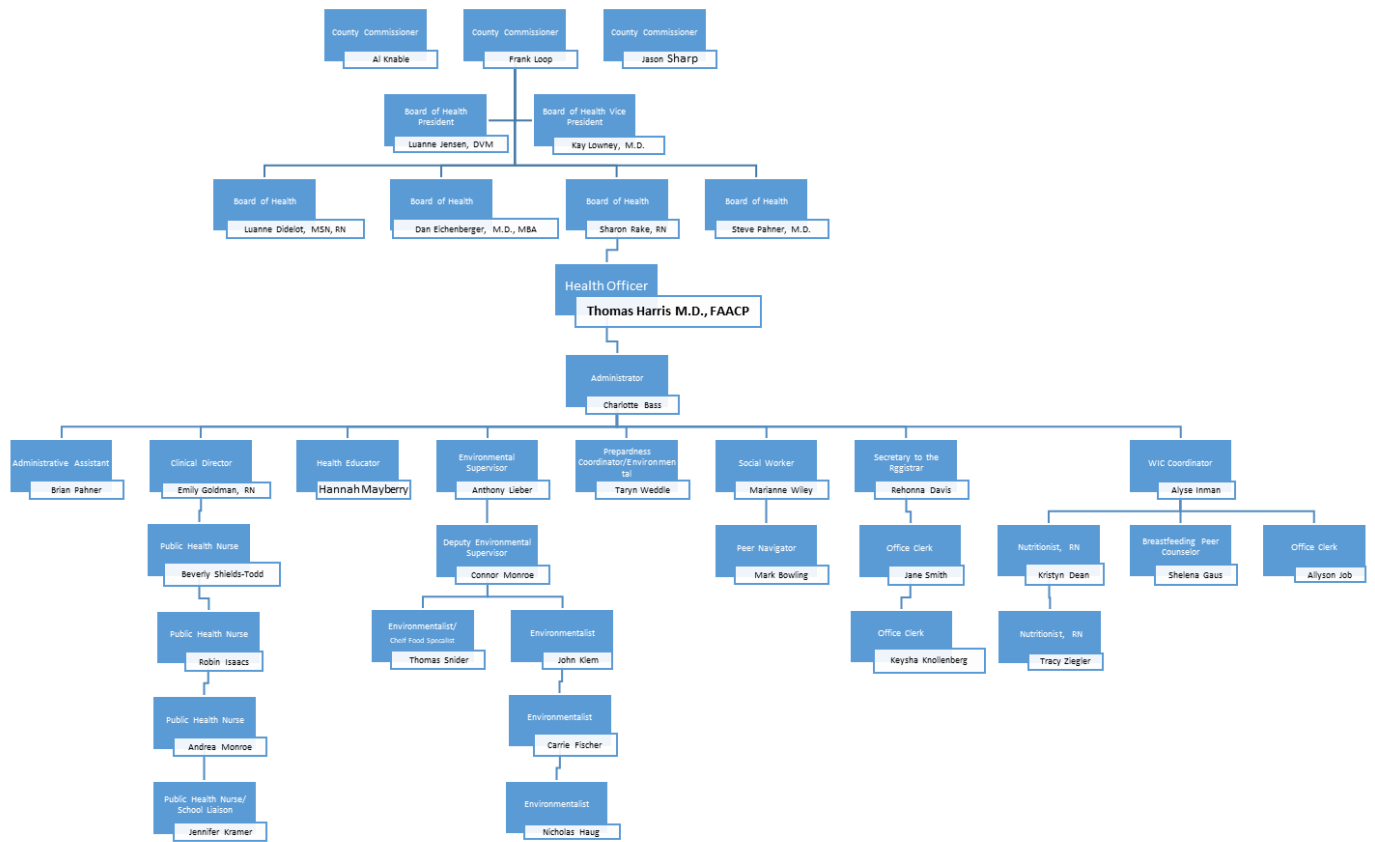

VITAL RECORDS

IC 16-20-1-17 Vital Records and Birth Records. The local health officer serves as the registrar for births and deaths. Upon recording a birth or death, the local health officer must submit the original record to the state department by the fourth day of each month. At the FC local level, this responsibility has been assigned to Rehonna Davis by Thomas Harris, MD, FACEP, Health Officer.

REGISTRAR

The registrar at the Floyd County Health Department manages vital records and ensures the accurate issuance of birth certificates. Over the past year, they have provided essential customer service to the community, assisting individuals with their vital record needs, including processing and verifying paternity affidavits. They maintain compliance with state and local regulations, ensuring the integrity and confidentiality of all records handled. Their role also involves responding to public inquiries, verifying documentation, and streamlining processes to improve efficiency and accessibility for those seeking vital records. Through their work, they contribute to the department's mission of providing reliable public health services to Floyd County residents.

IMMUNIZATION PROGRAM

The Floyd County Health Department (FCHD) provides immunizations to all people, regardless of ability to pay. We are a member of the Vaccines for Children (VFC) and 317 (immunizations for un- and under-insured adults) programs. In addition, the FCHD has an inventory of vaccines for those with health insurance, as well as those who want to pay out of pocket.

The FCHD travels out of the office multiple times a year to health fairs, schools, businesses, and government offices to provide immunizations to our community.

In 2024, FCHD administered 4167 vaccinations. While the majority were administered within the walls of the HD, the nursing department also administered vaccines in the following venues:

- Business vaccine clinics--Baptist Health walk-in flu, Beehive Assisted Living, Insulated Roofing, Servpro
- Health Fairs--Floyd County Employee Health Fair, Harvest Homecoming, Caesar's, Georgetown Optimist, IUS, St. Mark's, Walmart, Silver Street, Housing Authority
- Government offices—NAHA, City Hall, jail vaccine clinics
- Homebound visits (29) for vaccines
- School vaccine clinics—OLPH, NAHS, FCHS, Hazelwood, Floyd County HeadStart

SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED INFECTION PROGRAM

The Mission of the STI Prevention Program is to intervene in the spread of sexually transmitted infections (STIs) and reduce the complications of these infections. STIs include chlamydia, gonorrhea, trichomoniasis, Hepatitis-C, Hepatitis-B, syphilis, HIV, herpes, HPV. These infections are more than irritating; they can lead to chronic diseases including cancers, pregnancy loss, fetal abnormalities, and if untreated, death.

The Floyd County Health Department (FCHD) follows the Indiana Codes (35-31.5-2-292.9, 16-41-8-1, 20-30-5-13) for testing, treating, case management, referral for treatment, and reporting.

The FCHD provides education to our community in the form of 1:1 teaching to clients visiting the HD, billboards advertising the testing availability at the HD and education about STIs, and written information available at health fairs and to persons visiting the HD.

Syphilis is on the increase in the United States, including Floyd County, in which there has been a 300% increase in case identification from 2019 to 2022. HIV is also increasing.

In 2024, FCHD tested:

- chlamydia and gonorrhea---235 clients
- HIV—96 clients
- Hep-C---41 clients
- syphilis---80 clients

In 2024, FCHD treated 120 clients for chlamydia and 82 for gonorrhea. Positive HIV, Hepatitis-C, and syphilis cases are referred to a Disease Intervention Specialist for treatment and case management.

TUBERCULOSIS DISEASE

- Tuberculosis (TB) is caused by a bacterium called *Mycobacterium tuberculosis* (*M. tuberculosis*).
- TB bacteria usually attack the lungs, but TB bacteria can attack any part of the body such as the kidney, spine, and brain.
- If not treated properly, TB disease can be fatal.
- People with latent TB infection are infected with TB bacteria, but they do not have TB disease.
- Latent TB can develop into active TB disease if this bacterium becomes active and multiplies.
- Treating people with latent TB infection substantially reduces the risk that latent TB infection will progress to TB disease.
- TB and latent TB infection are reportable to IDOH.

TESTING AND DIAGNOSIS

- There are two types of tests that can determine if a person has been infected with TB bacteria:
 - ✓ TB blood test (Interferon Gamma Release Assay [IGRA])
 - ✓ TB skin test (Mantoux tuberculin skin test [TST])

TUBERCULOSIS STATUTES, CODES AND REGULATIONS

Section 410 IAC 1-2.5-141 - Tuberculosis; specific control measures

Authority: IC 16-19-3-4; IC 16-41-2-1 Affected: IC 16-41-2; SEC. 141.

The specific control measures for tuberculosis disease (called tuberculosis or TB) (infectious agent: *Mycobacterium tuberculosis*) are as follows:

- All suspected and confirmed cases of pulmonary, extrapulmonary, and miliary tuberculosis must be reported to the local health officer or the local health department.
- All suspected and confirmed cases of multiple drug-resistant tuberculosis require consultation with the health department for appropriate and adequate treatment.

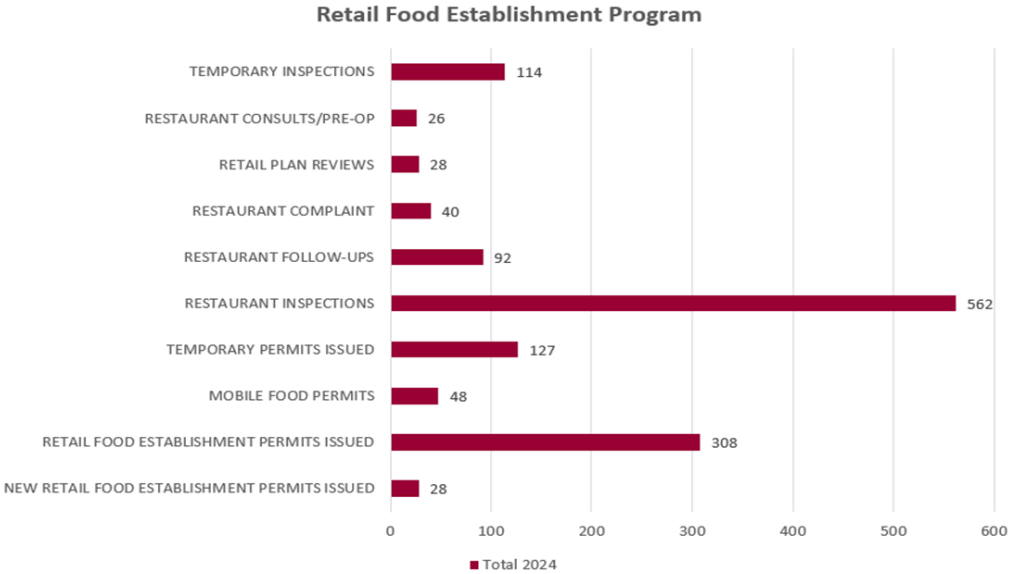

ENVIRONMENTAL

The Environmental Department consists of seven full-time employees and two part-time internships. Our mission is to assist in the prevention of the spread of disease and to improve the quality of lives for the residents of Floyd County. Our staff provides these services through a myriad of educational and inspection programs. The following provides an overview of the services provided in 2024.

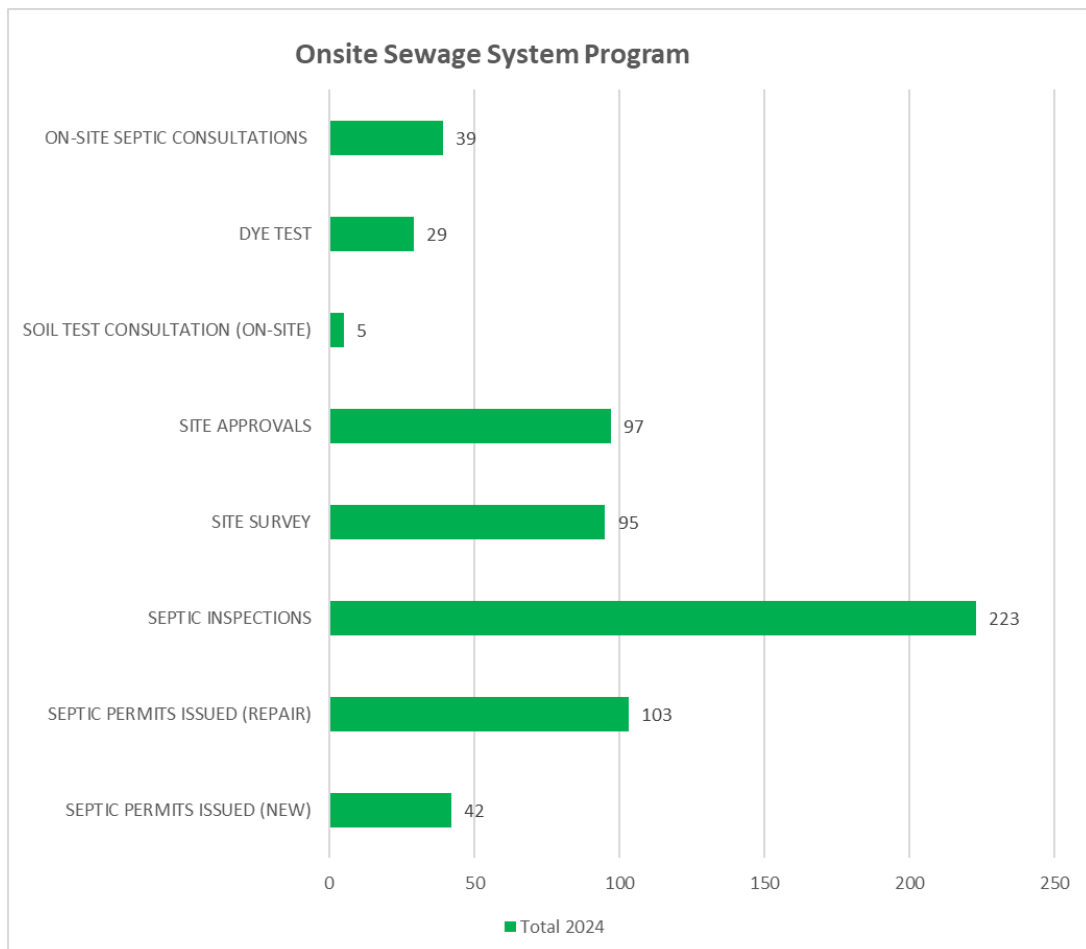
RETAIL FOOD SERVICE PROGRAM

Our department is tasked with inspecting retail food establishments, mobile food units, temporary food events, and farmers market booths, as well as responding to complaints. Retail food establishments and mobile units are inspected a minimum of twice a year. Farmers markets are inspected a minimum of once a year due to their minimal risk and lack of on-site food preparation. The majority of permitted vendors at the farmers' markets are selling premade and prepackaged food or temperature-controlled items such as freezer beef. Temporary food events are inspected the day of the event unless the vendor has been inspected previously in the same month and no serious concerns were observed. The number of retail food services inspections conducted by the department increased 12.6% from 2023 with the addition of one more full-time Environmentalist in 2022. This allowed our department to continue to do more frequent inspections of retail food establishments and provide more education. The number of follow-up inspections conducted by our department increased slightly due to the increase in routine inspections. Mobile food permits continued to increase year over year with a 50% increase from 2023. Restaurant complaints are very similar to 2023. A revised food code, 410-IAC-7-26, is expected to be released in the spring of 2025.



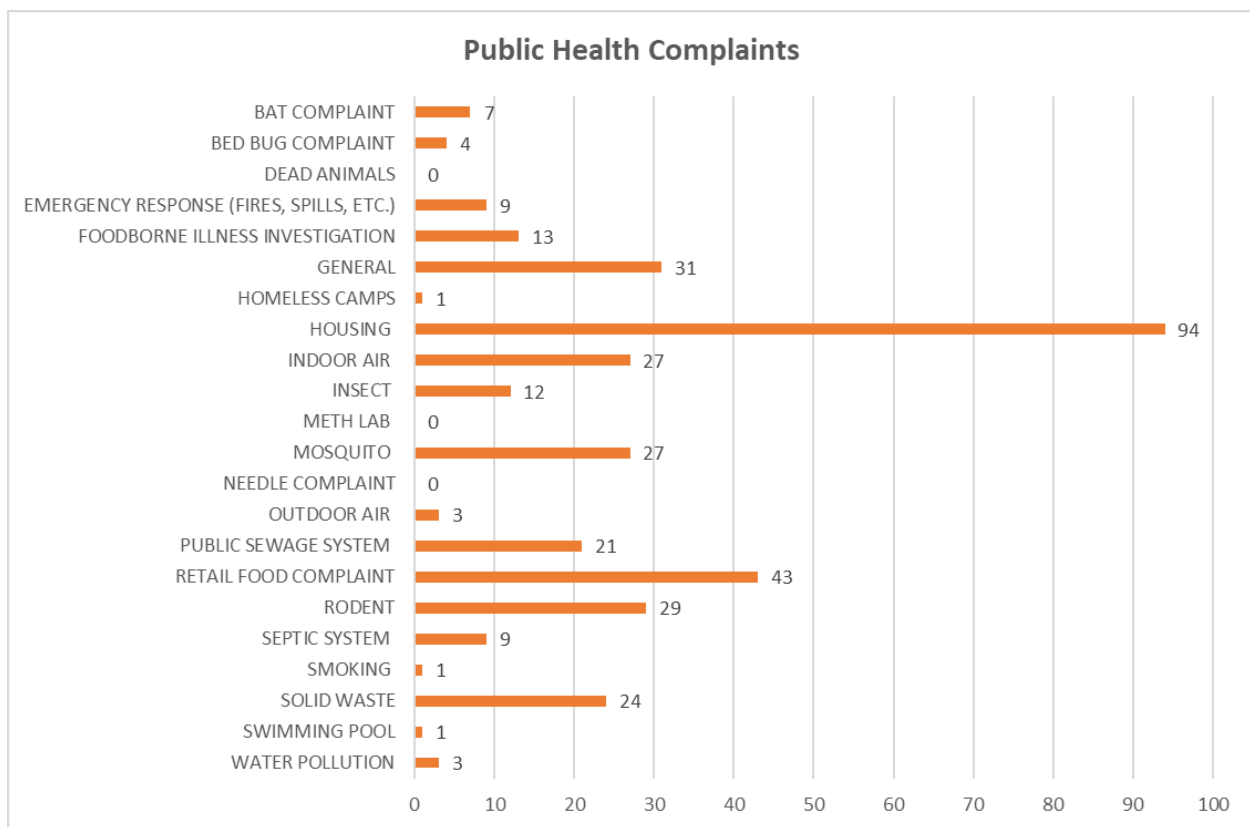
ONSITE SEWAGE SYSTEM PROGRAM

The onsite sewage system program oversees inspection and septic education for property owners connected to a residential or commercial onsite sewage system. Our department receives soil data and uses the data to provide the minimum specifications for a system that is suitable for the site and in compliance with 410 IAC 6-8.3 or 410 IAC 6-10.1. Our department conducts inspections prior to installation and after the installation process to ensure sewage is being properly treated. The program also keeps records and documentation of the location of the system as well as the soil data, design plans, and the components installed. The program was slightly decreased from 2023 in the amount of new and repair/replacement septic permits issued. The number of site approvals issued increased slightly from 2023. Repair/replacement construction septic permits were issued 2.5 times more than new construction septic permits. This trend shows a continued increase in the number of repair/replacement septic permits issued since 2020.



PUBLIC HEALTH COMPLAINTS

Our department handles a multitude of housing and environmental-related complaints throughout the year. Complaints are received, logged into the database, and assigned to an Environmental Health Specialist. If issues are discovered and corrective action is needed, an abatement order is issued. During the complaint investigation, notes and pictures are entered into the database, and a timeline is kept until the complaint is closed. Failure to comply with the abatement order will lead to a court order being obtained. Housing complaints were the primary complaints made to our department in 2024 and utilized the most staff hours and response. Housing complaints usually require multiple follow-ups and communications to ensure compliance and safety for the individuals involved.



MOSQUITO CONTROL PROGRAM

In order to monitor for the transmission of West Nile Virus (WNV) in our county, our department conducts a mosquito trapping program for the collection of adult mosquitoes. Our department sorts and identifies the mosquitoes and then ships the specimens to the IDOH lab for WNV testing. Our department also responds to mosquito-related complaints and is also trained and licensed to administer larvicide to kill mosquito larvae.

In 2024, our trapping season began in June 6th and ended on October 2nd. We continued to trap at our 12 sentinel sites, based upon previous WNV-positive locations, and trapped at an additional 4 locations after a complaint was received. During our trapping season, we were notified by IDOH of 10 WNV-positive mosquito pools at 8 of the 12 sentinel sites and 2 WNV positives at the complaint sites. WNV positive mosquitos are endemic in Floyd County and can be found consistently from July to early October each year. The city of New Albany also partnered with our department to conduct adulticide spraying of the positive mosquito locations in addition to their routine spraying program. Our department also responded to 27 additional mosquito complaints and applied larvicide dunks at seven of those sites. We have invested in mosquito dunks and cans of DEET insect repellent, which can be picked up by the public at our office. There is currently a surplus of 2,200 dunks and 122 cans of DEET insect repellent.

PUBLIC/SEMI PUBLIC POOL PROGRAM

Our department conducts both routine and complaint-based inspections for public/semi-public swimming pools in Floyd County. We also conduct pre-operational/opening inspections for any newly built pools in Floyd County. During our inspections, we assess the cleanliness of the facility and ensure that they have proper safety equipment, conduct water chemistry sampling, and ensure that proper recordkeeping is maintained for chemicals added and facility maintenance. Additionally, we receive and monitor bacteriological sampling taken weekly from each operational pool in our county to ensure compliance with 410 IAC 6-2.1 (Public and Semi-Public Swimming Pools Rule). For 2024, our county had 24 public/semi-public swimming pools that operated yearly or seasonally. Our department conducted two routine inspections for every pool in the county and conducted a total of 20 follow-up inspections when necessary. There were 40 swimming pool closures due to unsatisfactory samples from bacteriological testing, water chemistry, or Virginia Graeme Baker Safety Act (VGBA) non-compliance. For 2024, our department launched a new safety initiative to ensure compliance with federal requirements of the VGBA for all pools in the county and to protect Floyd County residents as a result. Subsequently, all 24 Floyd County pools have physically updated pool drain covers to comply to prevent entrapment and evisceration, which can cause serious injury or death. All 24 Floyd County pools have also electronically provided updated certificates of VGBA compliance to FCHD.

LEAD PROGRAM

Our department conducts risk assessment inspections for properties in the county, where a child with an EBLL (elevated blood lead level) is identified. The risk assessment consists of a lead paint analysis and dust wipe sampling. After the risk assessment is performed, a report is provided to the owner and tenant if applicable. A timeline is given to remediate any lead hazards identified, and education is provided to ensure proper cleaning methods and lead-safe work practices are used. After the lead hazards have been remediated, a clearance inspection is performed. The clearance inspection consists of a visual inspection of the remediated lead hazards and dust wipe sampling. Our department collaborates with the nursing department to conduct a thorough assessment of the child's home and nutritional assessment. Our department saw a slight decrease in the number of risk assessments in 2024, performing eight risk assessments.

TATTOO/BODY PIERCING/MICRO-BLADING PROGRAM

The Tattoo/Body Piercing/Micro-blading program covers inspections of these facilities to ensure compliance with the rule and ensure sanitary operation, proper handling of equipment, and prevention of blood-borne pathogens and other disease transmission. Facilities are inspected twice a year, and follow-up inspections are performed as needed. Our department licensed 23 establishments, 6 of which were new establishments, and 87 individual artists in 2024. Our department conducted 34 routine inspections and 8 follow-up inspections. Our department also permitted and inspected a temporary tattoo and piercing event with three artists. With a more proactive approach, we increased the number of staff conducting inspections and observed better compliance with the rule with more frequent inspections.

RABIES CONTROL PROGRAM

Our department has the responsibility of protecting public health in the instance of an animal bite exposure or exposure to a wild animal. Our department enforces the quarantine of domestic animals that have bitten and/or scratched a human to ensure rabies transmission has not occurred. We verify the animal's rabies vaccination status and quarantine the animal for an observation period to ensure the animal did not have rabies at the time the bite/scratch occurred. We also coordinate rabies prophylaxis with the nursing department if the animal cannot be located and Dr. Harris recommends prophylaxis or there has been a wild animal exposure, and the animal cannot be captured and/or sent to IDOH for rabies testing. In 2024, our department received reports of 186 animal bites and/or exposures. Out of which our department conducted 151 quarantine/releases, 20 rabies prophylaxis cases, 9 heads/bodies shipped to IDOH for testing, and 31 failed quarantines, which means the owner made no contact with our department or we were unable to verify if they properly quarantined the animal.

PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS (PHEP)

The CDC Public Health Emergency Preparedness Program (PHEP) has provided assistance through funding to help local health departments (LHD) build and strengthen their abilities to effectively respond to a range of public health threats, including infectious diseases, natural disasters, and biological, chemical, nuclear, and radiological events. The Division of Emergency Preparedness (DEP) within IDOH is the entity responsible for administering the Public Health Emergency Preparedness grant through a sub-recipient agreement, which requires various activities aimed at enhancing state and local preparedness to better respond to public health and health emergencies.

Through the Emergency Preparedness Grant, Floyd County Health Department (FCHD) PHEP is responsible for emergency planning, emergency operations, medical countermeasures, public health volunteers, training/exercise, and preparedness analysis.

PLANNING

Emergency Preparedness reviews and updates all LHD Preparedness Plans on an annual basis. The FCHD utilizes an “All Hazards” planning approach. A framework for emergency preparedness that considers a wide range of potential emergencies and disasters. In 2024, Emergency Preparedness focused on the MCM Plan and all associated annexes. Plans were completed and submitted to IDOH on June 25, 2024.

MOU’S AND PARTNERSHIPS

To coincide with planning efforts, Emergency Preparedness must ensure LHD plans and existing memorandum of understanding (MOU’s) between LHD and partner agencies, POD sites, along with identified community partners are maintained and up to date on a regular cadence, annually at minimum.

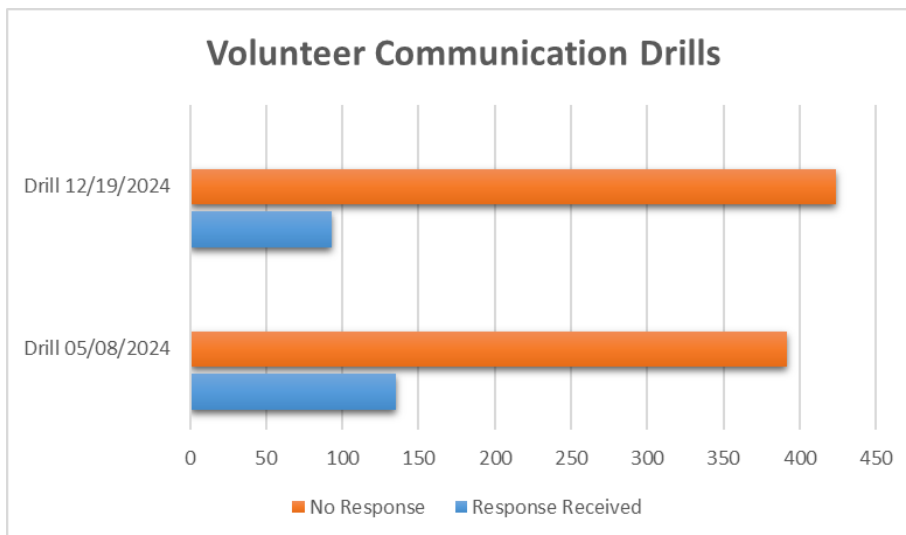
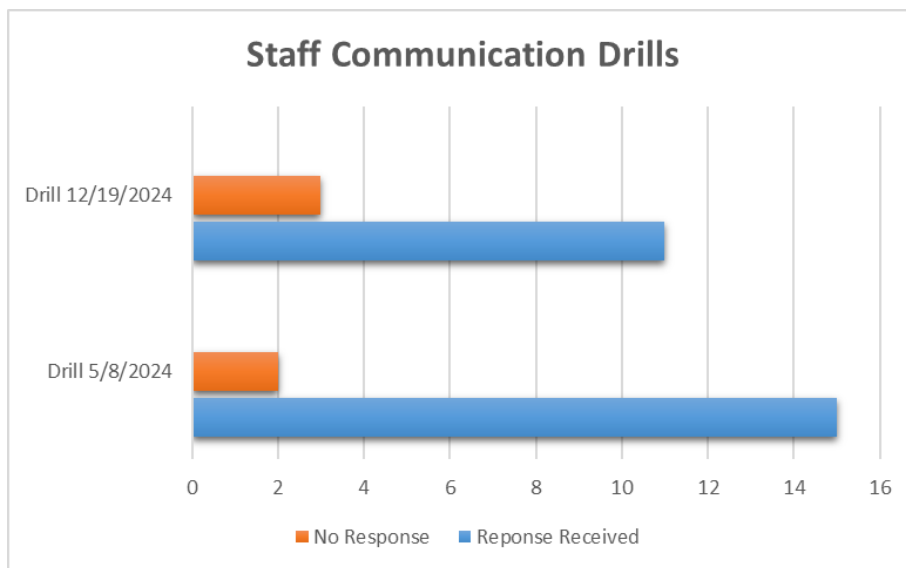

VOLUNTEER MANAGEMENT AND INFORMATION SHARING

Emergency Preparedness manages all FCHD volunteers through the State Emergency Registry of Volunteers for Indiana (SERV-IN). At the end of 2024, the FCHD has 499 volunteers in the Floyd County Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) and 42 volunteers in the Floyd County Radiation Response Volunteer Corps (RRVC). All FCHD staff are registered under the Floyd County MRC and are instructed to keep accounts maintained and active.

To maintain communication and information sharing, Emergency Preparedness conducts bi-annual communication drills. During the drill, participants are contacted via email, phone, and/or text instructing them to respond accordingly.

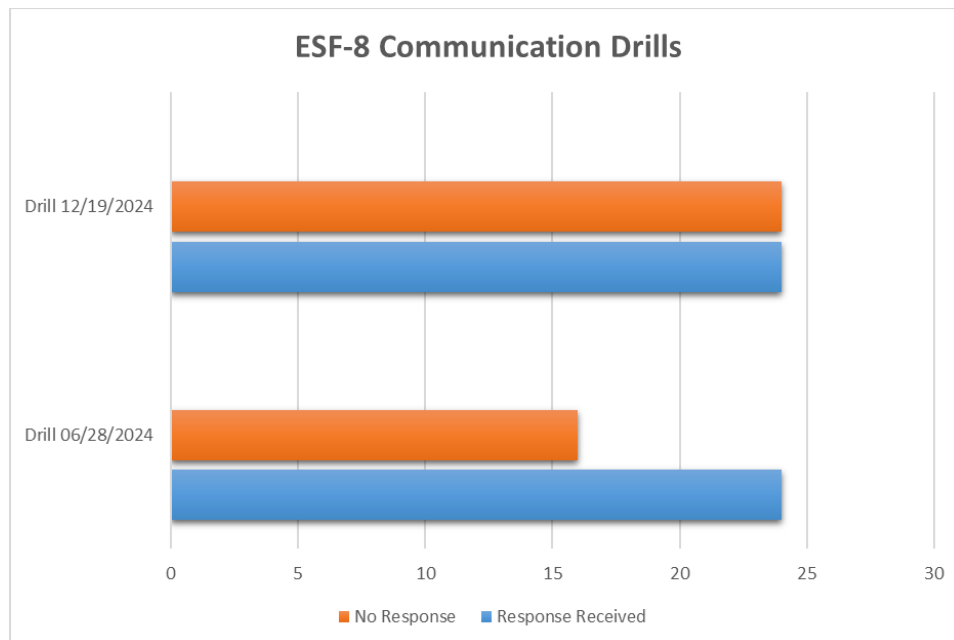


ESF-8

Emergency Support Function (ESF) #8 – Public Health and Medical Services provides the mechanism for Federal assistance to supplement local, state, tribal, territorial, and insular area resources in response to a disaster, emergency, or incident that may lead to a public health, medical, behavioral, or human service emergency, including those that have international implications.

Public Health is the lead for ESF-8. This support function is responsible for coordinating public health and medical services during an emergency. Emergency Preparedness coordinates with jurisdictional ESF-8 partners for planning efforts and information sharing.

Frequent communication and information sharing with ESF-8 partners, as well as other stakeholders, is key to the success of local level planning and response during an emergency. To enhance information sharing with partners, Emergency Preparedness conducts bi-annual meetings and quarterly communication drills. It is essential to maintain up-to-date contact information for all partners and build personal relationships. At the end of 2024, the FCHD had contact with 48 agencies/organizations in Floyd County.

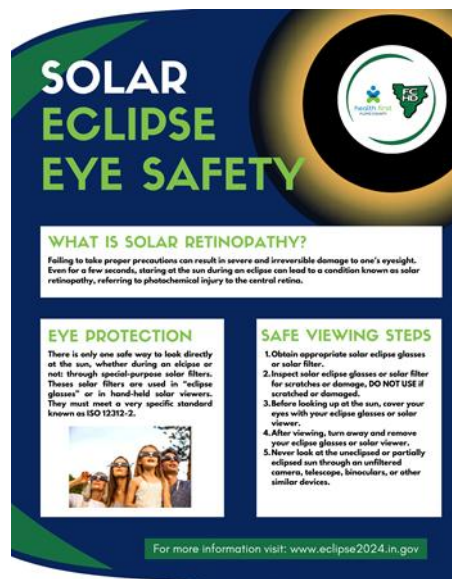


SOLAR ECLIPSE

In preparation leading up to the solar eclipse on April 8, 2024, Emergency Preparedness attended and held meetings with several entities, including but not limited to EMA, IDOH, IDHS, EMS, Hospitals, Fire, Law Enforcement, and other NGO's. Meetings discussed public safety threats, planning considerations, and lessons learned from past events.

To prepare the LHD, PHEP utilized situational awareness meetings to discuss potential threats to operations, healthcare, and public safety. In addition to identifying the LHD role in preparations for the community and collaborating agencies.

Emergency Preparedness and Health Education collaborated in executing solar eclipse planning, education, and community outreach. Through the PHEP budget, the FCHD purchased 1200 solar eclipse glasses to distribute to the community. The FCHD secured partnerships with YMCA, NAHA, Floyd County Library, and Floyd County Head Start to mass distribute solar eclipse glasses.



EMERGENCY RESPONSE

Emergency Preparedness assists agencies in emergency response operations regarding public health. Typically, Emergency Preparedness will arrive on scene during an incident or will provide available resources when necessary.

Emergency Preparedness oversees all four FCHD response trailers. This includes inventory, trailer maintenance, and resource management. Trailers are organized as Mass Casualty, POD Management, Weather Incident, and Overflow.

SCHOOL HEALTH LIAISON

HEALTH EDUCATOR

In 2024, the Health Educator made significant contributions to the health department and the community through various projects, trainings, and outreach efforts. By completing essential training and continuing education, the Health Educator was able to effectively educate the public on health and safety topics. Some of the key trainings included CATCH My Breath, CPR/AED/First Aid, and Narcan, which were integral to supporting health promotion campaigns and collaboration with local partners.

A key achievement was the enhancement of the Health Department's social media presence. The Health Educator launched and managed the department's Instagram account, in addition to utilizing Facebook, to ensure that the community received real-time updates on health news, educational materials, and promotional content. Through these platforms, the Health Educator maintained a dynamic and up-to-date online presence, ensuring important health information was easily accessible.

The Health Educator also contributed to the creation of various educational materials, such as flyers and brochures, that were used both internally and externally to support health initiatives. In addition to this, the Health Educator took an active role in outreach efforts by participating in workgroups, coalitions, meetings, and health fairs. One of the most notable initiatives was the outreach to unsheltered individuals, where the Health Educator helped distribute health education, hygiene supplies, blankets, shoes, and harm reduction resources. These efforts were aimed at promoting healthier habits, such as proper hygiene and nutrition, for individuals with limited access to healthcare.

Furthermore, the Health Educator worked closely with the school liaison and staff to provide training and education on lifesaving measures like Narcan administration and CPR/AED/First Aid. Through these collaborations, the Health Educator helped ensure that both the community and schools had the knowledge and resources to respond to health emergencies.

A significant accomplishment was the development of the Floyd County Resource Guide, a collaborative effort with JRAC and the System of Care. This resource guide was designed to connect Floyd County residents with local resources and services, fostering community engagement and partnership to meet the needs of residents. The Health Educator's efforts in this project helped bring together various partners to create a comprehensive, community-driven guide that is invaluable to residents seeking assistance.

Finally, the Health Educator played a key role in bringing back Safety Town to the community, further strengthening the Health Department's commitment to health education and community involvement. Through these initiatives, the Health Educator made a lasting impact on both individual lives and the broader community in 2024.

SOCIAL WORKER

The Floyd County Health Department Social Worker (MSSW, CSW) collaborates with health department staff, applying culturally appropriate social work perspectives, theories, and models to assess individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities. This role is integral to supporting Floyd County residents through fundamental social work services, engaging with individuals referred by the nursing and environmental departments, the Peer Navigator, and walk-ins.

Utilizing person-centered approaches, the social worker conducts assessments, identifies needs, develops plans, problem-solves, coordinates care, monitors progress, evaluates resources, and connects individuals to necessary supports and services. This includes linking individuals to treatment centers, courts, other social workers, and a wide range of community resources. The social worker works closely with the Justice Reinvestment Advisory Council (JRAC) to support individuals involved in the legal system and collaborates with the local library to provide access to essential community services and educational opportunities.

Additionally, the social worker works closely with the unsheltered population, providing critical support in insurance navigation, housing assistance, and connections to essential services such as food assistance, medical care, and employment resources. The social worker also assists clients with animal arrangements and needs, ensuring their pets receive proper care and resources as part of a holistic approach to well-being.

A holistic, non-judgmental, and non-clinical approach is essential in meeting individuals where they are, fostering trust, and promoting public health. The social worker actively advances public health initiatives through grant writing, community collaboration, health fairs, partnerships, street outreach, continuing education, and advocacy. The social workers partnership with a local business successfully resulted with several shoe donations. These shoe donations were distributed throughout the Floyd County schools and for individuals living at or below the national poverty guidelines.

Additionally, the social worker assists in overseeing the Peer Navigator position, which focuses on providing recovery support to Floyd County residents. Public health strategies are promoted through harm reduction principles, education, prevention, treatment, and recovery efforts. These include naloxone distribution, harm reduction kits, and safe smoking kits, all of which contribute to reducing health disparities and improving community well-being.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

The Floyd County Health Department offers a variety of special programs made possible through funding from Health First Indiana (HFI). These programs are designed to address critical public health needs, enhance community well-being, and provide essential services to residents. Through HFI support, the department has been able to expand initiatives focused on injury prevention, health education, and access to vital resources. The following section highlights these specialized programs and their impact on the community.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS PROVIDED

- Car Seat Safety Program
- CPR/AED/First Aid Program
- Safe Swim
- Safety Town

CAR SEAT SAFETY PROGRAM

The Floyd County Health Department's Car Seat Safety Program, which is made possible thanks to HFI funding, is dedicated to promoting child safety by providing expert car seat checks, education, and resources to families in the community. Officially launched on March 12, 2023, the program has already made a significant impact in ensuring children travel safely in vehicles.

PROGRAM ACHIEVEMENTS

Since its inception, the Car Seat Safety Program has conducted 76 car seat safety checks, addressing issues such as improper installation, expired equipment, and unsafe usage. These efforts have provided parents and caregivers with the tools and knowledge necessary to keep their children safe.

To support families in need, the program has distributed 63 car seats to families enrolled in Indiana Medicaid. This service ensures that financial limitations do not prevent families from accessing safe and reliable child safety equipment.

In addition to individual appointments, the health department hosted a community event focused on car seat safety checks, expanding the program's reach and increasing awareness about child passenger safety.

EXPERT SUPPORT

The program is supported by three certified Child Passenger Safety Technicians (CPSTs). These highly trained professionals offer personalized guidance on installing and using car seats properly. Their

expertise ensures that families leave appointments feeling confident about protecting their children in vehicles.

HOW THE PROGRAM WORKS

Families can schedule appointments for car seat safety checks at the Floyd County Health Department. During these sessions, CPSTs conduct thorough inspections, provide hands-on installation assistance, and address any questions caregivers may have. Eligible families on Indiana Medicaid can also receive a free car seat, further removing barriers to child safety.

COMMUNITY IMPACT

Through education, outreach, and resources, the Floyd County Health Department's Car Seat Safety Program is helping reduce the risk of injuries from vehicle accidents. By combining personalized support with community engagement, the program is building a safer future for local families.

CPR CLASS PROGRAM

The Floyd County Health Department's CPR program is dedicated to equipping community members with life-saving skills to enhance public safety and emergency preparedness. Launched on April 24, 2024, the program has successfully trained 123 individuals through 10 comprehensive classes. Participants receive certification in Adult and Pediatric First Aid/CPR/AED through American Red Cross courses.

The program has served a diverse range of groups, including American Heritage Girls, Head Start staff, New Albany Floyd County Schools (NAFCS) teachers, community members, Floyd County Probation staff, and parishioners from Saint Mary of the Knobs Catholic Church. Classes are designed to provide practical, hands-on training to ensure participants feel confident in responding to emergencies.

Training sessions have been held at the Floyd County Health Department and various business locations, making it accessible to different groups across the community. The program's primary goal is to increase the number of individuals capable of delivering effective CPR, fostering a safer and more prepared community.

This initiative has been made possible through funding from HFI, allowing the Floyd County Health Department to extend critical training opportunities to those who need it most. By building a network of skilled responders, the program continues to make a meaningful impact on community health and safety.

SAFE SWIM PROGRAM

The Safe Swim Program is dedicated to protecting children from drowning and water-related accidents by providing essential education and skill development. This year, we have worked tirelessly to ensure that young swimmers gain the knowledge and confidence needed to stay safe in and around water.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS:

- Water Safety Education – Children learn to recognize water hazards, follow pool and open-water safety rules, and develop smart decision-making skills around water.
- Skill Development – Our progressive swim lessons help children of all abilities, from basic floating and water acclimation to learning proper swim strokes.
- Supervised Swim Sessions – All lessons are led by certified instructors and lifeguards, providing a safe and supportive learning environment.
- Emergency Preparedness – Children receive age-appropriate training in basic rescue techniques and how to seek help in emergencies.
- Drowning Prevention Initiatives – Family-oriented programs educate parents and caregivers on proactive safety measures to protect young swimmers.
- Life Jacket & Rescue Training – Children are taught the importance of flotation devices and how to safely assist others without putting themselves at risk.

PROGRAM IMPACT:

This year, we successfully reached 216 children through our swim lessons and safety initiatives. Our specialized programs, including infant self-rescue training and adaptive swim lessons, provided children of all abilities the opportunity to build water confidence. Additionally, thanks to our partnerships, we distributed 216 life jackets to children in need, reinforcing the importance of water safety beyond the pool.

As we look ahead, we remain committed to expanding our reach, enhancing accessibility, and ensuring that every child in our community has the opportunity to learn lifesaving water safety skills.

SAFETY TOWN

REVITALIZING SAFETY TOWN: A COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP

Founded in 1960, the Pilot Club of New Albany, Michigan-Indiana District, has long been committed to volunteerism, friendship, and service. As part of Pilot International, the club has focused on promoting brain safety and health while supporting caregivers in the Floyd County community. A key initiative of the Pilot Club has been its dedication to Safety Town, an educational program that teaches children essential safety skills. However, like many community programs, Safety Town faced an unexpected pause due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

This year, the Floyd County Health Department (FCHD) reached out to the Pilot Club to discuss the status of Safety Town. After conversations with Pilot Club President Connie Chenault and Treasurer Sue

Terrell, a partnership was established to revitalize the program and restore its impact on the community.

FUNDING AND FOCUS ON BICYCLE SAFETY

The Floyd County Health Department received Health First Indiana funding from the Indiana Department of Health, with a focus on core public health services, including trauma and injury prevention. Given that bicycle-related injuries and deaths in the U.S. account for over \$23 billion annually in healthcare costs, lost productivity, and lives lost, the decision was made to emphasize bicycle safety education.

COLLABORATION AND RESTORATION EFFORTS

Health Educator Hannah Mayberry took the lead in coordinating the reopening of Safety Town. Partnering with community members, local organizations, and the Pilot Club, she organized clean-up efforts, repairs, and the construction of new buildings.

The collaboration extended to multiple local departments:

- Parks, Road, and Fire Departments assisted with mowing, power washing, asphalt repairs, repainting, and bike repairs.
- FCHD Staff & Volunteers worked on cleaning, painting benches, landscaping, and pest control.
- Koetter Woodworking & The Starlight Foundation donated building kits, which were assembled by FCHD intern Dalton Davis. His craftsmanship, along with Mayberry's design work and assistance from FCHD staff and family members, brought the vision for Safety Town to life.
- INDOT Partnership secured a donation of over 300 bicycle helmets to provide to children attending the program, ensuring long-term impact on bike safety.
- Zachary Adams Home Services contributed by upgrading the stop light at Safety Town, ensuring a safe and functional electrical system for staff and children.

PROGRAM IMPACT

With the reopening of Safety Town, the program successfully reached 18 students in its first session, providing them with hands-on safety education. Through interactive lessons, children learned about bicycle safety, pedestrian awareness, and traffic rules, empowering them with skills to navigate their environments safely. That each child could leave the program with essential protective gear, reinforcing the importance of safety beyond the classroom.

A FUTURE OF CONTINUED PARTNERSHIP

Through the dedication of the Pilot Club, FCHD, and generous community partners, Safety Town has been restored as a safe, engaging space for children to learn essential safety skills. Moving forward, FCHD and the Pilot Club are committed to sustaining this collaboration, expanding educational programs, and hosting community events that reinforce the importance of safety and injury prevention.

The revitalization of Safety Town is a testament to what can be achieved when organizations and community members come together with a shared vision. We look forward to continuing this partnership for years to come.
