The year 2024 was marked with a lot of exciting opportunities for the Porter County Health Department, our community partners, and our residents.

On January 2, 2024 we received a deposit of \$1,753,072.76 into our newly created Local Public Health Services Fund as a part of the Health First Indiana Initiative, created by Senate Enrolled Act 4 passed by the 2023 Indiana General Assembly. The purpose of this initiative is to transform public health in the state of Indiana by providing state budget funding to local health departments so that they may work with their local communities to address the specific needs of their residents. There will be a lot to report about Health First Indiana in this publication, but to me the most exciting aspects are working with our county residents to determine the most pressing public health issues where they live, working with our community partners (10 existing and 15 new partnerships so far) to implement programs addressing these needs, and seeing the excitement and dedication of our staff as they realize the impact their work is having on the community where they live and work.

In 2022, the health department was awarded ARPA funding from Porter County Government in the amount of 1 million dollars to expand and remodel our department for more efficient use of space and to provide enhanced service to our customers and patients. In October of 2024, construction began on our project, and we are currently preparing to move into the next phase. Construction is expected to wrap in the Spring of 2025.

In November of 2024, we said goodbye to our beloved health officer, Dr. Maria Stamp who retired after selflessly leading our department since 2011. Dr. Stamp saw Porter County through many seasons, most notably the COVID-19 pandemic, and never wavered in her commitment to the public health of our community. Dr. Stamp will always be remembered for her humble, patient, and compassionate leadership, and her mark will remain on this department for years to come. On November 19, 2024, Dr. Stamp was awarded a Sagamore of the Wabash from Governor Holcomb, presented by Senator Ed Charbonneau, for her distinguished service to the state of Indiana and Porter County.

With each ending, comes an exciting new beginning and I am thrilled to announce that on October 8, 2024, Dr. Rodney L. Guimont Jr's appointment as the 4th health officer of the Porter County Health Department was confirmed by the Porter County Board of Commissioners. Dr. Guimont comes to us with both global and community health experience as well as experience as a local family practice physician and in insurance compliance. He is already well integrated into the culture of our department, busy innovating with the staff, our board of health, and our community partners as we look forward to 2025 and beyond.

It is my hope that as you review the information found in this report you feel the same sense of pride for all of the amazing organizations that we have in Porter County and all of the amazing works that they are doing, as well as the same excitement for the opportunities, innovations and new program implementations that are to come. Together we can build better health for a better future.

In late 2023, the Porter County Find Help site was created with sponsorship from CoAction, Northwest Health, and Valparaiso University. The Porter County Health Department now covers the cost of the site. Carrie Honeycutt, our Care Coordinator, and Sam Burgett, Social Worker with the Porter County Sheriff's Department, are the administrators of the site. They receive valuable input from the Porter County Community Resource Network (CRN).

By having a Porter County-specific page, we can include programs without cost restrictions, providing a comprehensive guide to the community's offerings. *We aim to prevent residents from reaching a crisis before finding the services they need.*

The custom navigation bar includes categories like Basic Needs (food and housing), Addiction & Recovery, Mental Health & Support, Families & Children, and Community Connection (parks, social clubs, and senior activities).

The vision for the Porter County Find Help page is to provide a single, accurate, and current resource guide for residents of all ages. This is a community effort, and everyone is encouraged to help keep the site up-to-date as it will continue to grow. Anyone can suggest a program to be added, and organizations can claim their program listings to manage and update their information.

Care Coordination



To address the core service of “connection to care,” the Porter County Health Department hired a full-time *Care Coordinator* in December of 2023. Our care coordinator works to develop and strengthen community partnerships and provide our residents with the following services:

On December 1, 2024, Porter County submitted our *first 4 county-level key performance indicators* for use in tracking the progress of specific core public health delivery goals over the next 3 to 10 years.



Trauma and injury prevention and education

Decrease the rate of suicide deaths in Porter County from 16.0 per 100,000 in 2023 to 14.0 per 100,000 by 2027.



Chronic disease prevention and reduction

Decrease the adult obesity rate (>20 years old) from 42.6% (2018-2023) to 40.3% (2028-2033).

Decrease the asthma-related emergency department visit rate from 23.25 per 10,000 in 2022 to 22 per 10,000 by 2027.



Child and adult immunizations

Increase the immunization rate in Porter County for children < 3 years old completing required vaccine series from 64.3% in 2023 to 66.0% by 2027.



Public Health Day 2024



Nursing Report

Ensure that residents have access to essential healthcare, disease prevention programs, and health education.





As part of the *Health First Indiana* Initiative, the Porter County Health Department tracks Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) to measure the effectiveness of our programs. Our nurses play a direct role in achieving these KPIs by:

- Ensuring proper tuberculosis management to prevent drug-resistant infections.
- Enhancing maternal and child health by implementing evidence-based strategies for reducing infant mortality.
- Providing accessible immunization services, improving county-wide vaccination rates, and disease prevention.
- Reducing the spread of communicable disease through timely investigation and outbreak response.

Core Services & Impact

Tuberculosis Prevention & Case Management

Lisa, our Tuberculosis (TB) Coordinator, ensures that patients with active and latent TB receive the necessary healthcare, treatment, and support.

40 patients treated for latent TB infection

723 TB tests provided:
ensuring early detection and prevention
of TB spread in the community.



Lead Case Management

Hayley, our Lead Coordinator, is responsible for addressing elevated blood lead levels in children. In 2024, she investigated:

308 lead cases, working directly with families to identify lead exposure sources and reduce health risks through education and intervention.

Maternal and Child Health

As the leader of Porter County's Fetal Infant Mortality Review (FIMR) team, *Hayley* has built a multidisciplinary group of over 40 healthcare providers. This team:



- Conducts case reviews of fetal (20+ weeks) and infant deaths in Porter County.
- Implements evidence-based strategies to lower the mortality rate and improve maternal-child health outcomes.

Immunizations

Crystal, our Vaccination Coordinator, oversees immunization efforts to ensure accessibility for all residents, regardless of insurance status. In 2024 she:

Manages the Vaccines for Children (VFC) program, ensuring compliance with vaccine handling, storage, and distribution protocols. She also investigates all animal bite reports received by our office.

6,191 vaccines administered

397 animal bites investigated



Infectious Disease Prevention & Control

Shannon, our Communicable Disease Coordinator, plays a critical role in monitoring and investigating reportable diseases in Porter County. She also offers guidance and recommendations. In 2024, she investigated:

385 cases of communicable diseases, ranging from Salmonella to Ebola.



Amy, our Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI) Coordinator, ensures timely investigation, follow-up for STI cases, and teaches about transmission/prevention/treatment. In 2024, she conducted:

266 STI tests at the health department, improving access to early diagnosis and treatment.

Investigates ALL positive STI lab reports and follows up with patients regardless of their testing location.



Outreach Initiatives

Our nursing outreach program is dedicated to enhancing the health and well-being of Porter County residents through education, prevention, and direct care.

Our team is committed to meeting the community where they are. We aim to reduce barriers to healthcare by offering accessible services, promoting health education, and responding to emerging public health needs.

Did you Know?

We are an AmeriCorps HeartCorp Host!

HeartCorps is a service initiative of the American Heart Association, designed for individuals passionate about supporting their communities' health and wellness. The program's mission is to improve blood pressure control and overall health in communities across the U.S.



In 2024, *Terra*, a dedicated HeartCorps service member, joined the Porter County Health Department to provide vital health services, including:

- Conducting blood pressure screenings for community members at local food pantries, soup kitchens, community centers, senior centers, recovery centers, libraries, and local VFWs.
- Offering & teaching hands-only CPR to community members & youth to increase the survival rates of cardiac arrest in Porter County.
- Assisting Porter County Hospitals and Medical Clinics to enroll into the American Heart Association's "Target: BP" program, helping residents better manage their blood pressure.
- Supporting community members with tobacco cessation efforts by connecting them with free services through QuitNow Indiana.
- Educating and assisting residents with cardiovascular health.
- Distributing resources and educational materials tailored to individual health behaviors, risk factors, and overall well-being.





School Health Liasion

The School Health Liasion helps coordinate support services, physical resources, health information and education, and professional development opportunities to Porter County school students, faculty, staff, and administrators.

The Porter County Health Department is dedicated to helping our 69 schools meet the needs of our community's students so that *each child is healthy and ready to learn*. The role of the School Health Liaison is to connect each school in Porter County with the services and resources of the Porter County Health Department, the Indiana Department of Health, and our local community partners.

With a solid clinical foundation in place, the goal became to branch out in further directions in the schoolhouses. The priorities became to develop and source educational materials and curricula, curate lists of contacts for resource and support services, gather physical resources, and develop new relationships in our schools to spread the word that we are here to help and provide support.

Environmental Health Report



Our staff is dedicated to reducing the risk of contracting disease or experiencing other adverse health effects from environmental pathogens. We aim to provide prompt, courteous, and professional information concerning environmental public health issues.

2024 Key Events

- Attended a Pest Training Seminar in Elkhart County.

Septic Duties

Includes on-site sewage permits, repairs, inspections, on-site soil, and land inspections, plan reviews, and complaints.

Indiana Residential On-Site Sewage Systems Rule 410 IAc-6-8.3 are the requirements for a safe and healthy residential on-site sewage system. Some of the duties that our Environmental Health Specialist are responsible for include:

- Analysis and interpretation of Soil Reports by Indiana Registered Soil Scientists
- Specification provision for onsite sewage systems for residential dwellings
- Plan reviews for proposed septic systems
- Inspection of onsite sewage systems during installation for compliance with Rule 410

Legislation **HEA 1402** went into effect July 1st, 2023, and rendered a number of PCHD ordinances & policies unenforceable. In 2024, the environmental division created the **Porter County Onsite Sewage System Ordinance #24-16** to reinstate some of these policies.

- Allowed for on-site septic installer registration again
- Put in rules for permanent residential sewage holding tanks.
- Guidelines for connection/reconnecting to an existing on-site sewage system.

Other Impactful Legislation Includes:

- **SEA 414 (IGA 2023)**: Allow permanent holding tanks to be allowed for wastewater disposal for residential and commercial properties as long as certain criteria is met
- **HEA 1329 (IGA 2024)**: Prohibits the ability of local health departments to require point-of-sale inspections on properties with onsite sewage systems

Between *Memorial Day* and *Labor Day* each year, the Environmental Division routinely takes water samples at various beaches in the county to ensure safe levels of bacteria (such as E. Coli).

Tattoos, Piercings, and Microblading

Indiana State Tattoo Legislation Rule 410 IAC 1-5 are the requirements for a sanitary and effective tattoo/piercing parlor.

This rule includes sections on:

- An individual/entity who is adequately trained.
- Clean and sanitary tattoo/piercing/microblading equipment and tools.
- Safe, nontoxic dyes and pigments.

Lead Risk Assessments

The Environmental Division staff is trained and licensed to conduct lead risk assessments when a child in the residence is found to have an elevated blood lead level.

During a lead risk assessment, staff checks for chipping and distressed paint throughout the residence, and takes samples of dust, paint chips, or soil for analysis.

Emergency Operations Plan (EOP)

The Division of Emergency Preparedness (DEP) completed all sections of the multi-budget period Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) required per the Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) Grant. The plan was sent to the Indiana Department of Health- Department of Emergency Preparedness (DEP) for review. *The plan was approved for implementation.* **This Plan (EOP) has been created to foster a multi-year planning approach with key community stakeholders.** By fulfilling the requirements, tasks and roles laid out within this document and subsequent annexes, the Porter County Health Department Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) serves as the County ESF-8 Annex to the Porter County Emergency Management Agency's Comprehensive Emergency Operations Plan (CEMP).

Crisis & Emergency Risk Communication Plan (CERC)

The Division of Emergency Preparedness (DEP) completed all notification sections of the Crisis & Emergency Risk Communications Plan (CERC) required per the Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) Grant. The plan was sent to the Indiana Department of Health- Department of Emergency Preparedness (DEP) for review. The plan was approved for implementation. **The Crisis & Emergency Risk Communications Plan (CERC) has been created to foster a stratified approach to communicate with key community stakeholders during a public health emergency.** *We will continue to evaluate and enhance the plans as needed.*








