Overdose Lifeline Expands Youth Drug Prevention Program

Local not-for-profit organization Overdose Lifeline provides an array of services to address the opioid epidemic in Indiana. This month, it announced plans to expand the Aaron's Place: Exchange Youth program. Overdose Lifeline CEO Justin Philips emphasized to <u>WISH-TV</u> that programming for youth is critical. "Some of these kids have experienced the loss of a caregiver. Some of these kids have been removed from their parents. All this compounds on their experience of trauma," he said.

With synthetic opioids like fentanyl taking the lives of more people each day, it is important to expand services to youth. Aaron's Place is designed for children and teens aged 9-12 who are affected by a family member's substance use. It is a camp provided on 6 different weekends per year and includes traditional camp activities and support sessions led by mental health professionals. Drug prevention programs like Aaron's Place have been proven to prevent substance use in later life. So far, 45 young people have been through the program, and Overdose Lifeline is currently accepting referrals to the program. For more information about Aaron's Place: CLICK THIS LINK

Narcan Added at Kokomo Library

Mental Health Program Expansion Proposed

A bipartisan group of Indiana legislators revealed on Dec. 9, new details about their plans for mental health legislation. State Representative Ann Vermilion, State Senator Michael Crider, State

Senator J.D. Ford, and State Representative Greg Steurwald all attended the Mental Health America of Indiana's Mental Health and Addiction Symposium and participated as panelists. Attendees asked questions about the state's new crisis system.

State Rep. Ann Vermilion acknowledges that the mental health agenda is a top priority, noting that "the tides have turned, and I feel like my colleagues now know that they are only one degree of separation from a loved one that's walking this journey". State Senator Michael Crider is supporting a bill that would create a \$1 surcharge on cell phone bills to fund the new 988 mental health crisis lifeline. Another bill, backed by State Rep. Greg Steurwald, would divert Hoosiers facing incarceration into mental health treatment centers if they are deemed in need of treatment. Overall, lawmakers are considering longterm solutions to expand accessibility to treatment.


