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Indiana Mom Raising Awareness About Fentanyl Dangers

Indiana communities continue to be devastated by fentanyl, and according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Indiana hit a record-high for drug overdose deaths in 2021. Cammie Wolf Rice, who grew up on the southside of Indianapolis, is familiar with these dire statistics. She lost her son to drug overdose, and since his death, she has been advocating for removing stigma from substance use disorder. "The stigma in our country is so horrific that it took me two years to say the word 'overdose'", she says.

To combat stigma, she founded an organization in honor of her son, the Christopher Wolf Crusade. Currently, the organization has run a two-year pilot program inside Grady Memorial Hospital in Atlanta. The program pairs patients with care coaches who implement a personalized pain management plan. 
