

In March 2016 the first Hoosier Women at Work conference brought together students and scholars of women's history for a one-day event which featured papers, presentations, a keynote speaker, a panel discussion, and a lot of great ideas. The general consensus was that the conference was a much needed launching pad for those interested in growing the field of Midwestern women's history. In response, the supporting partners and attending scholars have made this an ongoing meeting. In 2017, the conference focused on Indiana women making history in the fields of science, technology, and medicine.

That year we also added a Wikipedia edit-a-thon to add women's stories to a platform that people use regularly. In 2018, the conference explored Indiana women in the arts and was held at the Harrison Center for the Arts. Another Wikipedia edit-a-thon at Newfields followed in 2019. In 2020, we're proud to celebrate the centennial of women's right to vote by exploring Hoosier women's suffrage work and the ongoing struggle for equal citizenship rights. Thank you for joining us.


200 YEARS
