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CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: If I could have your attention, please. First of all, welcome to our Indiana Horse Racing Commission meeting. My name is Tom Weatherwax. I want to introduce to you a new member of our commission before we get into our protocol and the day's events. And that is Susie Lightle.

(Audience applause.)

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: Susie has a background that's pretty darn perfect for being on this commission. She's married. She has four children, ten grandchildren, and ten great-grandchildren. But her claim for fame is back in another time in her life, she and her family had a family harness racing business where they actually raised sulkies.

COMMISSIONER LIGHTLE: Standardbreds.

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: And were in that business as a family business. Of course, we realize this is not far from being a family business. But, nevertheless, she has a real appreciation for what you folks do, the hard work, the sacrifice. So we welcome you.

COMMISSIONER LIGHTLE: Thank you very much.

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: In her spare time she was the congressional district rep for Congressman

Burton, a Head Start coalition officer director,
State Attorney General's legislative liaison, which
I know that. And she has stories to tell about the
Indiana Senate, which she swore that she will not
repeat. She was the engrossing clerk. This is the
gal that made things happen behind the scenes that
took all of our great ideas and tried to put them
into law and presented them. Susan, we welcome
you.

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COMMISSIONER LIGHTLE: Thank you so much. I'm glad to be here.

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: I thought today, since this is my first meeting as Chairman, I thought it proper that I publicly announce and maybe mention some truly outstanding gentlemen. I would like to recognize Chairman Bill Diener and Commissioner Steve Schaefer. I would like to publicly thank both of these gentlemen for their many years of service and dedication to our Indiana horse racing industry.

The heritage, the depth of understanding both of these individuals brought to our commission is truly outstanding. I'm sure that they both have forgotten more than I will ever learn about this business. I want to say thank you to both of them.

As a recently added member to our commission, I have come to appreciate and respect what other states feel and see in Indiana's horse racing business. Much of this is also due to the outstanding effort of our executive director, Joe Gorajec, Lea, and our counsel, and all of the horse racing staff because I think we are blessed to have a very good staff.

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Each member of you folks out here, the horse industry, I want to say thank you for a job well done. Sometimes we do not mention -- the observation in my opinion is we don't thank you enough for what you do. We are all guilty of not recognizing people and say thank you for the job you're doing.

As an industry you know, and you need to know, that what you stand for and how you conduct yourselves is very important and critical to our future. Other states are trying to be better than us every day. The competition is real. And we must always try to improve.

My role as commissioner, now as your chairman, is different than what I've done during the days in the General Assembly. I also believe that the team that Bill Diener and Steve Schaefer put together is

a team that I am proud to be on.

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I welcome Susie Lightle, George Pillow, Greg Schenkel to this team. We have some big shoes to fill. That's my opinion. What each of you do as fellow commissioners to help make our Indiana horse racing community the best in the country is also noticed and appreciated by our governor.

I just want to welcome Susie and thank each of you commissioners for your role, as I believe that I have a lot to learn. And I look forward to the challenge.

With that, any other comments?

COMMISSIONER SCHENKEL: I'd offer just a general comment. I think this is the first time that there has been a commission meeting without a Schaefer or a commission without a Schaefer. So there's no question it's not just Steve Schaefer but his family. His dad was the original chairman. And so the Schaefer family have made valuable contributions.

There is no question I would echo your comments about the contributions that Bill Diener has made to this organization and to racing in general. I have never known anybody -- I knew him in the utility business and some other ways

And we will try to carry on. 8 9 Thanks to all of you for making this what it is. 10 We will, hopefully, move forward together. 11 COMMISSIONER PILLOW: I'd just like to say 12 that all you veterans out there, you know we are 13 new so we don't want any shenanigans. That's why 14 we have Susie here to help guide us along. 15 COMMISSIONER SCHENKEL: How long will that 16 word new last? COMMISSIONER PILLOW: We are still new. 17 I am 18 Thanks everybody for all your support and anyway. 19 just doing the right things that will make Indiana 20 a great, great racing state. Thank you. If we could call the 21 CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: 22 meeting to order, first on the agenda is approval 23 of the minutes from September 4th. 24 COMMISSIONER SCHENKEL: Move acceptance.

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: Moved and second. All those in favor say "aye."

THE COMMISSION: "Aye."

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: Okay. Next we have the reason that we're here today. That is to go through the renewal of many, many rules. I think counsel has told me over 900 that were subject to be expiring this year. Lea, would you give us the update for the benefit of the Commission, sort of tell us the process you went through and the hearings and all the work that you have done and your staff to get us where we are.

MS. ELLINGWOOD: Sure, Mr. Chairman. Thank you. For those of you who don't know, very generally speaking, an administrative rule expires seven years after it's adopted by the Commission. At the end of 2003, it seemed to be a big year for us. Of the thousand or so administrative rules that we have, 900 of them were scheduled to expire. The fact that they hadn't been amended or changed means those rules have been relied upon for seven years with essentially no issue.

We began, I began the process of readopting those 900 administrative rules. During the course of that process, we received a request to treat about 83 of them separately. The result of that was that we had to adopt those rules through a regular or lengthier rule-adoption process. That process includes me putting together a number of fiscal analysis on the impact of the rule, holding a public hearing, summarizing written comments, and making any changes or making changes that were appropriate to the text of the rule.

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You have been provided with a copy of the written comments we received. In addition to those requests or including, rather, the request to treat those rules separately, there was a total of about 79 pages of written comments. In addition to that, you have been provided a copy of the transcript of the meeting that was held late last week, a summary of the written comments that we had received, and a copy of the fiscal impact statements that were done on the proposed rule.

As a result of the comments that we received, I made some changes to 15 of the 60-some rules we would be readopting. Those changes are primarily technical in nature. Staff would recommend that, assuming there are no issues with the changes that we made, that you readopt these rules as you find them in your proposed rule in front of you, at

which point I will submit them to the Attorney

General's office and to the Governor's office for
approval. The goal is these rules will become

effective by the end of the year so we have them
for 2015.

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: So are these the rules that you had to get an extension on --

MS. ELLINGWOOD: Yes.

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CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: -- because they are so voluminous you couldn't do them all?

MS. ELLINGWOOD: Right. What happens is every administrative agency receives communication from the Legislative Services Agency every year that tells them which rules are scheduled to expire at the end of the year. The agency then begins the process of readopting those rules without changes, which is usually a fairly short process. It takes maybe a total of 60 days to do.

When you get a request to treat a rule separately, that causes problems because the regular rule adoption process is approximately six months shortest to get done. For that reason, when I received a request in 2013, we asked the governor's office to extend the expiration date for these rules. So these rules will expire at the end

1 of this year if they're not approved by you today. 2 CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: Do we have questions 3 from the Commissioners? You can see there's a 4 great deal of work and time that's gone into 5 getting these rules before us. That's what you referred to as 14-230? 6 MS. ELLINGWOOD: Yes. 7 8 CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: Is there any other 9 people that would like to speak on this today? 10 quess I should ask for a volunteer and invite the 11 public to be aware of this. Hearing none, what is 12 the wish of the Commission? 13 COMMISSIONER SCHENKEL: I would move 14 acceptance. 15 COMMISSIONER LIGHTLE: Second. 16 CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: We have a motion to 17 approve these rules as reviewed. And all due 18 process and public hearings have gone forward. 19 those in favor say "aye." 20 THE COMMISSION: "Aye." 21 Those opposed? CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: 2.2 (No response.) 23 CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: The rules are adopted. 24 MS. ELLINGWOOD: Thank you. 25 CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: Thank you for your hard work.

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Now, there's an emergency rule regarding information to be submitted with registration.

That's separate. And can you explain that to us?

MS. ELLINGWOOD: Sure. In 2013, the legislature changed Indiana Code 4-35-7-12, which is the statutory provision regarding the distribution of slot funds. The change in that cite, the change that the legislature made amended

some of the cites in that statute.

And we have, I ran across an administrative rule that refers to that statute, but because the statutory cites had been changed, our rule needed to be updated to refer to the appropriate cite.

This is not a substantive change at all. This is simply a technical correction to make sure that when we have a licensee or member of the public reading the rule, they are referred to the correct statutory cite.

I think this rule is appropriate for our emergency rule writing, under our rule writing policy as a housekeeping matter so we can get this rule filed with the Legislative Services. And it will become effective immediately.

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: So this is not -- it's a

1 technical change? MS. ELLINGWOOD: It is a technical change. 2 3 There is no substantive change in this emergency 4 rule. It simply refers to the correct statutory cite. 5 CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: Any questions from our 6 7 Commissioners? Any comments from the public? Okay. There is no comments. What is the wish of 8 9 the Commission? 10 COMMISSIONER SCHENKEL: Move approval. 11 COMMISSIONER PILLOW: I second. 12 CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: Motion approved and 13 second. Ouestion? 14 All those in favor say "aye." 15 THE COMMISSION: "Aye." 16 CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: Those opposed, same. 17 (No response.) 18 CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: Motion is passed 19 unanimously. So this was a brief meeting 20 obviously, and it's probably good because yours truly is new at this job. And it's a nice way to 21 2.2 break into the process. I have a gut feeling in 23 the future these meetings will not be this simple. 24 In fact, old business, Counsel, could you tell 25 us of brief coming attractions?

MS. ELLINGWOOD: Sure. By September 1st, every application, horsemen's association applicant is required to submit their application for approval to receive slot funds under that statute that I referenced 4-35-7-12. We have received applications from all of the applicants now. The applicants are the same from the previous year. We will begin a very intensive review of those applications to ensure that they meet all of our standards.

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In the past we have, as you may know, had some issues with horsemen's associations either not providing all the information at the time that the material was required or some issues with distribution and use of some of the slot proceeds. So for that reason, we are taking this opportunity to be very careful, very conscientious, and very thorough with respect to review of the applications.

The applications, as a general rule, need to be approved by the end of the year. So we will be considering those at the next commission meeting. I suspect there will just be one more. I would anticipate that to be in late November. So we will begin that process very shortly. That should take

up quite a bit of your time.

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CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: This is all of the horsemen's associations?

MS. ELLINGWOOD: Yes.

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: This is being done, correct me if I'm wrong, to try to do it thoroughly and right and complete. Maybe in the past that wasn't done that way.

MS. ELLINGWOOD: We received applications from the Standardbred association, ITOBA, the Thoroughbred association, and from the Quarter Horse Association. And those applications, to the extent they have not yet been distributed to you, will be distributed to you for your review. And I suspect that there will be follow-up communications to the applicants by me or another staff member to the extent that we need more information.

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: So do you believe that we have this meeting, you and I have talked briefly about maybe the 19th or 20th, sometime before Thanksgiving week?

MS. ELLINGWOOD: Ideally, I think that's when we'll have it.

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: That means will we have, you have all this information ready for us to

decide upon at that time?

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MS. ELLINGWOOD: You should have all the information next week.

COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Lea, is there any danger of any applications being turned down? I know you have to request more information. But do we have to look at something that might have some kind of?

MS. ELLINGWOOD: Well, not having looked at the meat of the application, I would be hesitant to say one way or another. That's always a concern when you receive an application. The Commission is charged with the responsibility of ensuring that the applicant is the best entity to receive slot proceeds and to do with those proceeds what is charged under the statute. So I wouldn't be -- that will be a decision for you to make. The short answer is certainly that is a risk.

COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Risk. Okay.

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: All of the horsemen associations know what you've asked. You've already given this to them. They're already working on them.

MS. ELLINGWOOD: We are in the process of contacting them.

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: They don't have it?

MS. ELLINGWOOD: No. Every applicant has submitted their application. To the extent that we need anything additionally, we may not, but to the extent we need anything, we will be contacting them very shortly to get that to us.

The Commission will also be issuing a pre-hearing order that will establish deadlines for

pre-hearing order that will establish deadlines for submission of additional material, as well as set out the time frames for each of the applicant's presentations at the next Commission meeting.

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: I don't know if there's new business, if that was new business that maybe got out of order, but is there anything else in the way of new business we should be aware of?

MS. ELLINGWOOD: None that I'm aware.

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: Any other comments from the public? Thank you for being here. Look forward to your cooperation in the future and working together. If there's no other business to come before this commission, do I hear a motion to adjourn?

COMMISSIONER PILLOW: So moved.

COMMISSIONER SCHENKEL: Second.

CHAIRMAN WEATHERWAX: We are adjourned.

(The meeting adjourned at 9:18 a.m.)
