CHAIRPERSON SLASH: All right. It is 1:03. We'll go ahead and call this meeting of the Indiana Civil Rights Commission to order.

Okay. We clearly have a quorum today, so thank everyone for making it, and guests for joining us.

Would you like to announce the agenda?

MS. RYKER: Thank you. So, we have several different motions and other agenda items starting --

(Discussion off the record.)

MS. RYKER: For those who don't know, my name is Caroline Stephens Ryker. I'm the Administrative Law Judge for the Indiana Civil Rights Commission. I am new to that role, was recently hired by Executive Director Wilson and appointed by Chair Slash.

As far as the agenda items today, on Old Business we do have one appeal. We have New Business, appeals as well, eight different appeals there. We will discuss the appointment

of the Administrative Law Judge as well. motions presented, we have a number of motions. There are three different notice of elections that have been filed, one motion of withdrawal, and then four different procedural motions that we'll discuss at length. And then, of course, the announcements as well. CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay. Thank you I'd like to now call for an approval very much. of the previous meeting's minutes. COMM. EDWARDS: So moved. COMM. BLACKBURN: Second. CHAIRPERSON SLASH: All in favor? COMM. RAMOS: Aye. 14 COMM. EDWARDS: Aye. 15 COMM. JACKSON: Aye. 16 COMM. HARRINGTON: Aye. 17 COMM. BLACKBURN: Aye. 18 CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Aye. All right. 19 20 Motion carries. Now I would love to hear your report. 21 MR. WILSON: Okay. Good afternoon, 22

and I believe it's 1:05, so it's afternoon.

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Well, we're real excited. We just finished up our first -- for those who don't know, and I think most of you do, because we did discuss and invite you to attend, but we just finished our Region V Conference. It's the first that we've ever done here in Indiana. It was a huge undertaking by our team. You know, I think they tried to do it before, but it didn't work, it didn't happen.

And so, last year myself and Doneisha

Posey, Deputy Director and General Counsel, as we were talking about what could we do to kind of fix things that were broken, we felt that was one of those things that didn't happen and we wanted it to happen. And so, I mean it was a great Conference. We had people coming from Rhode Island, from California, from --

COMM. EDWARDS: Great.

MR. WILSON: -- Wisconsin, Illinois, you name it. And we had Tennessee and partners in Kentucky, and again, it was -- it was a great Conference.

It was well put together. We had great

speakers, probably some of the top in their fields, speaking there. We had all of HUD's leadership there, from Secretary Carson to Joe Pelletier, so everybody in the HUD chain came, and they all thought that this thing was put together.

And they couldn't have done it without this great team that we have here, who worked extremely hard and continue to do our job.

That's one thing people have got to realize. The cases don't stop, the work doesn't stop, the work keeps going.

And then not just planning for the Conference all year, but we also had finished up, you know, the other events that we did, and then we had to prepare for the next day after the Conference to do our ILE, which is Indiana Latino Expo. We did a program there where we talked about civil rights.

We hired a new Commissioner of ICHLA, and so we did a program where we did it in English and Spanish, where we could talk to the audience about what we do and their civil rights, because

we know that's a community that we want to engage with more because of the different barriers.

We're trying to work our way and find ways of communicating what we do, and I think we saw you,

Chair Slash, there --

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: It was a great program.

MR. WILSON: -- as well.

So, anyway, like I said, I gave you kind of an overview. I won't go through it all because we've got real cases and things to get to, but I just wanted you to know, I kind of gave you an overview -- you each one have one -- of the Conference and kind of some of the things.

And if you -- this doesn't really tell the story. You can go on-line and you can look, you'll see a lot of the pictures and things that we did, but everybody said that it was a fantastic Conference, and the thing about it is it fits right into what we're trying to do with education. Remember, informing and education is what we're trying to do so people will know what we do, and they know that this office exists and

why it exists.

And so, with that, I'm just going to let

Doneisha go with the September Agency at a

Glance. It's a short one, because, again, is we

just made the decision on our new External

Affairs person. We won't make the announcement

until they go through the background and we

actually get them approved. So, until then,

they're -- we did make a selection, and now we're

just waiting on the approval process.

So, with that, Doneisha, you can go over the At the Glance.

MS. POSEY: Thank you.

Good afternoon, everyone. As he said, our Region V Conference was a tremendous success. We were so very busy putting that Conference together, but as he also said, work doesn't stop. You know, everyone in our agency had a hand in the Conference, but we all have our other jobs to do here, which helps the Commission to keep moving forward.

So, we'll talk specifically about -- I'll talk specifically about enforcement, what we've

been doing for the month of -- what we did for the month of September. So, in September, the leading protected class that we had in terms of inquiries filed with our agency was Race.

When we look at Inquiries by Enforcement Area, Employment is always our leading Enforcement Area, with 127; housing was next, with 56; 28 Public Accommodation inquiries; 14 education; and zero Credit for the month of September.

So, again, just to reiterate, inquiries are just when people call us inquiring about filing a complaint; they didn't necessarily finish the complaint process. So, they called us, we talked to them, we might have even drafted a complaint for them, or during that conversation they decided they weren't ready to file a complaint or maybe it was past the statute of limitations or something happened.

But we all -- we definitely want to keep track of how many inquiries we receive, because even if they don't turn into complaints, we still need to know what's going on around the state,

what people are experiencing.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Uh-huh.

MS. POSEY: So, when we go right below that to Complaints by Protected Class, these were actual complaints filed with our agency in the month of September. So, we are looking at 37 race-based complaints; zero color; five national origin; 28 disability; three religion; 20 sex; one familial status; zero veteran status; five age; and three retaliation complaints.

So -- and typically, month by month, it's a toss-up between the race and the disability protect classes, to see, you know, which protected class we're going to receive the most complaints on.

And we also look at the top five count -the largest counties in the State of Indiana to
see what the complaint -- or what -- how many
complaints we're receiving from those areas. So,
Marion County, the biggest county in the state,
81 complaints -- or these are actually inquiries,
I'm sorry -- 81 inquiries from Marion County; 16

Lake; three Allen; six Hamilton; and 12 St. Joseph.

So, we always look at that every month to see: Do we need to do more outreach in these big areas? These are the areas that have the most diversity, not only in terms of race, but, you know, disability, religion, all of the different protected classes, and obviously with population as well. So, do we need to go to Lake County? Do we need to be in Allen County? Where do we need to be focusing our outreach efforts?

And then looking all of the way on the other side of the page to -- it just says

September and the Change from August, so this is something that we do every month as well, to see what has been the difference from month to month in terms of enforcement. So, Number of Calls, in September, we received 824. There was a drop from the month of August, 75 less calls in September.

Calls, it could be anything. Someone just could be calling to speak to Greg, or someone could be calling to file a complaint. So, we

just want to keep a full record of just the calls that come into our agency, because someone has to field all of those calls, so we have to determine do we have enough staff on hand to handle all of the calls that we receive, not only just the inquiries and the complaints, but just in general.

Number of Inquiries, 231. That was 22 less from the month of August.

Thirty-nine Inquiries Drafted, so that's less -- 16 less than the month before. What has been going on in our agency, as you all know, with Intake staff, we lost a couple of Intake staff members a couple of months ago.

We got brand new Intake -- or two awesome Intake staff members within the last month or two, but they have to learn the process, they have to understand the law. So, when you see that decrease, it's because of the training and the time that's been taken out to get our new Intake members on board, and I'll introduce our new -- a couple of our new staff members when I finish this.

Number of Formalized Complaints. Awesome. We had 106 for the month of September, and that's an additional 48 from the month before. So, that means in the month of September we had 106 formalized complaints, people filed their complaints. Those complaints go directly to our investigators to begin new investigations for the

And we closed 134 cases in the month of September. That's also an amazing feat. That's up 79, so that means we investigated the cases, they were reviewed by the director of the different investigative units, and finally signed by either Greg or I for final resolution.

So, with 134 closings, you all as
Commissioners may receive an uptick of appeals;
right? Depending on if they got cause or no
cause or whether there's an administrative
dismissal or whatever, more closings may equal
more appeals. Food for thought.

And finally, ADR Monetary Settlements.

So, in the month of September, we had 40 -- about \$43,000 in monetary settlements for the

month of September.

complainants that we have here at the agency. In addition to that, policy change and training as always. And that was up almost 27,000 from the month before.

So, our ADR Unit is going very strong. We do have a new Director of ADR. She started 30 days ago yesterday, I think she said.
Unfortunately, she's not here today, she's sick, but she is dynamic.

We've also created a new position -- well, kind of just matched up a different position.

So, one of our investigators who's in the Employment Unit, she is now an investigator slash mediator, so she'll be able to help the Mediation Unit, which has been traditionally just two members in our Mediation Unit, to include kind of a half of a person, to do more of our precost mediation.

So, the cases, before they even go all of the way through the investigation or before they receive a notice of finding of cause or no cause, we have someone that's able to intervene earlier in the process. So, that means our investigators

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may have less time -- or spend less time doing investigations, so they'll have more time to do other investigations.

Also, it means that the parties are coming to an agreement early in the process, so not too many resources are being expended, you know, from the respondent, maybe they're not engaging their legal counsel yet in the process and they're able to come to an agreement with the complainant earlier. So, we're always very excited about that.

Our number one goal here is to eradicate discrimination, but we're also here to make sure that the parties are educated on what their rights and responsibilities are, and if the parties can come to an agreement, then that's what -- that's also super important for us, that the parties are happy with what they're receiving, but we're also making sure that the state's interests are being protected as well, that they're having these policy changes and trainings.

> So, just so you know, MR. WILSON:

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again, as I said, even during the Region V we still did the work. We have to keep doing the work. It doesn't stop.

As Doneisha said is one of the big things has been mediation. I mean the numbers of participants have been tremendous, since we had -- at the beginning, when we had Allisondra and how she kind of changed that whole area around, because if you go back, and historically you won't see the type of mediation that we've been doing this last year.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Uh-huh.

MR. WILSON: So, we're really happy with that, that we're bringing parties together and we're actually getting some resolution before we have to go through this long, drawn-out process, and people are getting out of it what they want. So, we're happy about that.

So, with that, do you have any questions? Under COMM. BLACKBURN: Yes. Monetary Settlements, would you elaborate on policy change?

> Uh-huh. So, depending on MS. POSEY:

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the type of case it is and depending on the parties, if there was an issue in which the policy that the company used is what was in violation of the law, then we will make sure, "Okay. You guys, obviously your policy isn't working or it isn't being -- it is not being effective for your organization. So, we want you to change your policy. So, maybe we want you to change your antiharassment policy in the workplace. You need to have these additional criteria for, you know, how you're going to do that policy."

Or for housing, the homeowner association, you don't have a good policy on reasonable modifications or reasonable accommodations, so we want you to add these certain things to your policy."

And we don't really budge on those. You know, for pretty much every single case, we want to make sure that we are reviewing your policies and that we believe that they're adequate, and if we don't, we want you to change them, and we will gladly do that for you.

COMM. BLACKBURN: What kind of follow-up?

MS. POSEY: Yes. So, our ADR
Director is also our Compliance Director, so
depending on whether it was a settlement or a
final order, she receives all of those final
decisions for our agency and she makes sure that
the company or the landlord or whomever is
complying.

So, she keeps them on her kind of compliance log, and every so often, depending on the language of the settlement, we may have to go in six months later to see if they've complied.

Maybe if there's training, we give them 60 days to get their training done, but they have to comply pretty much forever with whatever it is.

So, we will go back periodically to see:

Do they have notices still posted? Are they

still following their policy? And we make sure
that they're still being compliant with the law.

COMM. BLACKBURN: Do we keep records to inform you of how frequently there are issues around compliance?

MR. WILSON: This program really just started. We just started this with the people.

That's a good question.

MS. POSEY: Yeah.

MR. WILSON: But we'll do it.

Remember, this is what we just started, so it's

new, so the data hasn't been built up like that yet.

MS. POSEY: And I would say additionally with that, if we find that parties are not compliant, we are -- we have a very close relationship with the Attorney General's Office, and they will enforce any final order that we have that the parties are not being compliant with.

So, we have a liaison that we are in constant communication with, and there's a case right now being addressed that there was a final order from the Commission that the party has not complied with yet, so we are working very closely with the Attorney General's Office to make sure that that happens.

MR. WILSON: Yeah, but as far as the

data, it's just -- we just started the program, so that's going to take a while for us to start really knowing what has worked and what hasn't. But if it's something that is new that we know they haven't done as far as being compliant, yes, we follow up. But we just started this, so it's going to take us a minute to build up some data and some history.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: I guess my question along that line is: Do we feel like we're staffed adequately to do that, and accurately?

MR. WILSON: Yeah, yes.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: All right.

COMM. HARRINGTON: I have a question. The closings, you talked about you're doing a lot more on mediation, so I know there's a process, so, you know, I'm still trying to learn.

MS. POSEY: Uh-huh.

COMM. HARRINGTON: You have a formalized complaint, and then you actually have a closing. Can you explain a little bit how mediation -- where it fits in, and is it

reflected in the numbers on this?

MS. POSEY: Yes, yes, very much so. So, when we have formalized complaints, those are new complaints just opened within our agency, the investigators just received it. But at any point during the process of opening a complaint through the end, the Mediation Unit has the ability to try to settle those cases.

So, that 134 number is a mixture of cases closed because of settlement, cases closed because we found no cause, cases closed because the parties decided to withdraw, and I don't believe cause cases would be in that closing, because the case would still be open, but just any case that's been closed for any reason. And then the ADR, our Mediation Unit, is really helpful and really impactful in that area, to keep cases closing at a higher rate, uh-huh.

COMM. RAMOS: A couple of questions. Number one, I like the format again. It's very helpful.

MS. POSEY: Okay.

COMM. RAMOS: One of the things that

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I'd definitely like to see in it is -- are the financials, either separately from your financial person or included in this, just so we can see rolling numbers on where we're at for the budget. You know, the good news is that we're adding a lot of people. We know there's a cost associated with that, and just keeping it all in balance.

And separate from that, but a point that you made on the changes and stuff, one of the things from an education standpoint is that there are -- you know, the state has made some changes to the policy for expulsion, since -- rule expulsion, and I don't know -- and it's education, so it's not necessarily related to this, but if you look under the covers, there is a lot of reference to that. Is there anything that anybody is involved in or looking at related to that?

MR. WILSON: Well, we market for education. We market for all of those categories of discrimination, but we don't -- I mean that would take a lot of people to go into the weeds and --

COMM. RAMOS: Sure.

MR. WILSON: -- to do that, but, you know, we try to make sure people know what this agency does.

MS. POSEY: The big thing that we are doing alongside that is trying to partner with the organizations that are more in the weeds and able to really look into that. So, recently we had a meeting with the Federal Department of Education, their Office of Civil Rights, their headquart -- or this region's in Chicago, so they came down here for a meeting.

I've been speaking with the Indiana

Department of Education and also the U.S.

Attorney's Office, their attorney for civil

rights, trying to really figure out how we can

all work together and partner for those issues

that affect education, just -- discrimination in
education.

We don't have the resources to really be in the weeds and really, you know, delve into that, so that's why partnerships are so very important for us, so that we can kind of work

together and to figure those things out. 1 COMM. RAMOS: Yeah. 2 MR. WILSON: But I understood what 3 you were saying. I'm just saying we don't have 4 5 the ability to do that. COMM. RAMOS: Okay. 6 MR. WILSON: That's what I'm talking 7 8 about. CHAIRPERSON SLASH: I'm going to say 9 can I just make a recommendation, that maybe --10 Yes, please. MS. POSEY: 11 CHAIRPERSON SLASH: -- instead of 12 just looking at state and federal level 13 partnerships, that perhaps parent advocacy groups 14 15 and --MS. POSEY: Uh-huh. 16 CHAIRPERSON SLASH: -- things like 17 that as potential great partners for getting that 18 information. 19 MS. POSEY: We actually have a 20 partnership with Enroll Indy, and I mean they are 21 kind of dealing with all of the public and 22 charter schools within the City of Indianapolis 23

to help us push out our message, just as we do
the same for them. It's just a partnership of
sharing information that type of way. But yes, I
think that's a great idea, to give it to other
folks to be our --

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Uh-huh.

MS. POSEY: -- you know, feet on the ground.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Any other questions on the Director's Report?

COMM. JACKSON: I have a question.

You mentioned in your preliminary remarks some
type of interest in getting to some of these
other counties. Are there any plans as to how we
do that?

MR. WILSON: We're doing that now with our marketing. We do that already, External Affairs groups, and then when we get our new director, we'll get re-engaged again. But we do market advertising all over the state. We have an outreach person, which is John Hawkins, that goes around. Everything's data driven where we need to go and where we -- the areas we need to

focus on. So, yeah, we do that now.

COMM. JACKSON: Have you all gotten any response as to -- because it looks like -- Allen County is Fort Wayne, so have you heard as to why it's so low?

MR. WILSON: Well, remember, some of these other areas have human rights agencies there --

COMM. JACKSON: Oh.

MR. WILSON: -- so they don't necessarily -- I mean like the Fort Wayne area and others, they have human rights agencies, so some of the complaints go directly to them. And some complaints go directly to HUD and to EEOC.

MS. POSEY: But if you look at our upcoming events, the second thing that's on there, it says, "Employment CLE." We're doing that in Fort Wayne, in partnership with the Fort Wayne Metro Human Relations Commission, so, you know, we -- we're extending our reach in that capacity, and we have John Hawkins to really thank to help move that forward.

COMM. JACKSON: So, do we know of any

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other --
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                 MS. POSEY: That's us, yes.
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                 COMM. JACKSON: -- Commissioners --
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                 MR. WILSON: Go to where?
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                 COMM. JACKSON: Some of these places,
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    like the employment -- this event.
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                 MR. WILSON: I mean it's for people
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    looking for their CLE's. You can always go and
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    visit anything that we do, but --
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                 COMM. EDWARDS: I plan to.
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                 MR. WILSON: Continue, yeah. I mean
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    it's on our calendar.
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                 MS. POSEY: We'll send you --
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                 MR. WILSON: Yeah.
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                 MS. POSEY: -- more information on
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    that.
                 COMM. EDWARDS: Good.
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                 MR. WILSON: Well, Caroline can send
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     that information to you. She can keep you in the
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     loop on those things.
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                 MS. POSEY: And that's why we try to
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     put all of these kind of upcoming events on here,
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     so if there's anything that you see of interest,
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just let us know.

We'll move along through our 5 agenda, so with Old Business, we only had one 6 appeal that was assigned last month, and that 7 8 went to Comm. Edwards. COMM. EDWARDS: Uh-huh. 9 CHAIRPERSON SLASH: How did you find 10 11 in your case? COMM. EDWARDS: Okay. On the case of 12 Mark Zak versus Lowes, I recommend upholding the 13 finding of the Administrative Law Judge of no 14 probable cause. 15 CHAIRPERSON SLASH: May I have a 16 motion for that? 17 COMM. RAMOS: So moved. 18 COMM. JACKSON: Second. 19 CHAIRPERSON SLASH: All in favor? 20 COMM. RAMOS: Aye. 21 COMM. EDWARDS: Aye. 22 COMM. JACKSON: Aye. 23

COMM. HARRINGTON: Aye.

COMM. BLACKBURN: Aye.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Aye. Okay.

Motion carries.

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And we'll go ahead and we'll move on to our New Business and assigning, and I'm basically going to go down the line from Comm. Ramos down to Comm. Blackburn, and I've already actually written them and I'll just pass the sheet.

In the case of Bridget Williams versus
Intelenet Global Services, Comm. Ramos; the next
one, Jennifer Parker versus Schmitt Backhoe &
Dump Truck Inc., Comm. Jackson; Carla Burran
versus Herff Jones, LLC, Comm. Edwards; Angelique
Kelly versus Hopebridge, LLC, Comm. Harrington;
Jackie Hutchinson versus Pedigo's Auto Sales-Glen
Pedigo, myself, Comm. Slash; Tiffany King versus
National Mentor Healthcare, LLC, d/b/a Indiana
Mentor, Comm. Blackburn; Francis Santos versus
Michigan City Area Schools, Comm. Ramos; Robyn
Montgomery versus BSN Sports, Comm. Jackson.

Okay. And so, now we're at the fun part,
I suppose. I received notification that we would

like to hire Caroline Stephens Ryker as our ALJ, and so, I got the wonderful opportunity to sign off on that. And so, the Commission has the right to do that, and as Chair of the Commission, I had the ability to sign off on that.

We are very thankful and happy to have you to stay with the Civil Rights Commission, and also in your new role, and are absolutely looking forward to you in your new role.

MS. RYKER: I'm very much looking forward to working with you as well. Thank you for this opportunity.

COMM. JACKSON: Congratulations.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay. That's all I have to address there; right?

MS. RYKER: Yes. The only other
point I did want to add is, as far as the
appointment is concerned, the Commission decided,
I believe in 1997, that the Administrative Law
Judge would only preside over matters after cause
has been found, and so, my appointment is
restricted to after probable cause or reasonable
cause, and not those precause ones.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay. So, no change from anything that we've discussed before. All rules continue to go forth as they have been before.

MR. WILSON: Uh-huh.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Just for clarity, I wanted to make sure we got that on the record. Okay. Very good.

So, as mentioned during the announcement of the agenda, we have quite a bit of Notice of Elections. Do you have anything that you'd like to give as introductory remarks?

MS. RYKER: Yes. So, this month there are several different kinds of motions on the agenda before the Commission, and I do want to explain the procedural posture of at least the first few motions as Notice of Elections, because it is a little bit different than they may have been before the Commission previously.

Administrative Law Judge, and I had been a staff

have conflicts and I'm prohibited from making

those decisions by law, so these three cases come in that posture, where the Commission is the party that needs to make the decisions first, and then those decisions will immediately become final decisions.

The Notice of Elections that are presented, the first part of the agenda is just a brief statement of the law concerning whether or not to grant a Notice of Election. I will note that each of the Notice of Elections that are here, all three of them, both parties have moved for that election, so the parties are in agreement as far as wanting to go to State Court.

CHAIRPERSON SLASH: Okay. And so, with that being said, I believe we should go through each of them and make a motion on each. But as she stated, you know, I read through them, but each party has agreed to the same election.

So, I will accept or hear a motion to grant the parties in the first case, Gregory L. Wilson in his capacity as Executive Director of the Indiana Civil Rights Commission versus

And I will disclose that I am the -- or was, excuse me -- the attorney that filed that motion, and have since withdrawn from that case. The -- at the time it was presented, Respondent still had some time to file a response to that motion. Respondent did not file a response.

As far as when a Motion for Summary

Judgment can be granted, it's when there are no
facts in dispute and the law requires a certain
outcome, or as the courts have said, no genuine
dispute as to any material fact, then the movant
is entitled to judgment as a matter of law.

I will note that under Indiana Trial
Rule 56, when there is no response, it does not
necessarily mean that the motion must be granted.
Summary judgment shall not be granted as a course
because the opposing party fails to offer
opposing affidavits or evidence, but the Court
shall make its determination on the evidentiary
matter designated to the Court.

The Commission has a couple of different 1 options that it can take. It can assign the 2 motion to a particular Commissioner, or it can 3 make a final decision here today. 4 CHAIRPERSON SLASH: And so, based off 5 of the will of the body that we've kind of heard 6 over time is that we like to read things before 7 we decide on them, do I have any question to 8 that, or would you -- are there Commissioners 9 that would like to make a decision today? 10 COMM.
