

- Edinburgh had two successful events: 2nd Volunteer Banquet, and 2nd Year Recovery Event.
- Indiana State Prison's volunteers are excited about the changes in the volunteer forms, and are accepting the new changes as they come.
- Indiana Women's Prison held two ICAN graduations, and filled the Community Engagement Coordinator position.
- LaPorte Juvenile had several TASC graduates.
- Madison was accepted by the Magic Yarn Project—the wigs they make will be used around the world.
- Miami's avid readers enjoyed the class and discussion with Novels at Night The Walls.
- New Castle hosted multiple Special Guests including Brad Stine and Bill Glass Behind The Walls.
- Pendleton Adult hosted students from IUPUI, Ivy Tech, Huntington College, Ball State University, and Wesleyan University for discussions on criminal justice with select offenders.
- Plainfield's Creative Writing Class was featured on the local news (FOX 59) in addition to the Indy Star.
- Putnamville has created an Art Program under the direction of Ms. Nicole Richey which focuses on giving the offenders a positive and safe way to express their feelings.
- Rockville supported the Indiana Veterans Home in West Lafayette, Indiana by crocheting 225 Christmas stockings and making 225 Christmas cards for the veterans living there.
- South Bend accomplished a great partnership with the South Bend Civic Theatre which has
 permitted residents to participate in the design and construction of sets for public
 performances.
