How to Use a Social Story

Social stories are visual ways to help explain complex processes and ideas to children and to people who benefit from concrete, visual explanations. The social stories can be modified to fit any situation.

Tips for using the social story:

Introduce the story early to help prepare the person for what is going to happen.

If possible, modify the story to fit the needs of the individual. Including specific people or places may be helpful.

Read the social story to the person several times, on several occasions before the event in order to allow the person time to become familiar and process the information.

I am here because my family needs help,
not because I am in trouble.

Sometimes kids can
talk to Judges privately.



If I want to do this, my GAL/CASA can ask
the court to arrange the meeting before
the next hearing.

If I am worried about talking in court, I
can write a letter.



I will have a Guardian ad Litem (GAL) or a
Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA),
who is someone who looks out for me, in
court with me.



My parents and others will see any letters
I write to the Judge, but it is sometimes
easier than speaking in court.

My parents may be in court. Other people
will be there too.



The Judge may ask me questions about
how I am doing in school and how I feel
about where I am living.
