The INDOT Cultural Resources Office is implementing new measures in an effort to reduce our response times for submissions, and ultimately to reduce our overall turnaround times for reviews. Most of these changes are internal and will not affect current procedures.

However, we are announcing a significant change in the procedure for new submissions: the esdcro@indot.in.gov email address.

Starting immediately, all new document submissions (MPPAs, ECLs, HPRs, Phase Ia reports, etc.) should be sent to esdcro@indot.in.gov. Please note that it is no longer necessary to copy the Team Leads or the CRO Manager on new submissions, as all will monitor the inbox.

The <u>esdcro@indot.in.gov</u> email address is strictly for initial submissions and should not be copied on follow-up correspondence.

Since esdcro@indot.in.gov is an inbox only, you will not receive responses from that address. All responses from CRO, including our comments on review documents, will come from CRO staff as usual. All inquiries and project related correspondence should be addressed to the assigned CRO staff as usual.

Again, the <u>esdcro@indot.in.gov</u> email address is for <u>initial submissions</u> only and should <u>not</u> be copied on any other correspondence. Failure to send new submissions to the <u>esdcro@indot.in.gov</u> email address may result in delays in new submissions being assigned to CRO staff for review.

Subject: Limited Vertical Clearance Bridge Warning System Study

INDOT-CRO is pleased to announce that a Limited Vertical Clearance Bridge Warning System Study has been completed in compliance with the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) for the US 41 Southbound Bridge over Pigeon Creek project. The bridge was a Parker through truss that required immediate closure and eventual replacement due to the severity of damage sustained from a vehicle collision. The study was developed as part of the MOA to mitigate for the loss of that historic bridge.

Vertical clearance through and below bridge structures is a statewide asset maintenance issue. Even when the vertical clearance meets standards but is limited, vehicle collisions remain a risk for these structures because of the potential for human error, such as oversized vehicles traveling without permits or off the approved route. The intent of the study is to provide general guidance to bridge asset owners and an escalating menu of available additional warning measures, to alert motorists to the presence of limited vertical clearance. The study examines the means available to Indiana bridge asset owners to alert drivers to limited clearance bridges with the goal of reducing or eliminating vehicle bridge strikes. It is up to the asset owner to weigh the benefits, drawbacks, installation costs and maintenance of each additional measure that may be suitable to the individual site conditions.

The Indiana Department of Natural Resources-Division of Historic Preservation and Archaeology (DNR-DHPA) has updated the "Minimum Architectural Documentation Standards." Please see below the message from DHPA below regarding the updated Standards. The Standards are attached.

Please let your CRO reviewer know if you have any questions about the Standards, if applicable to your project.

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The attached "Minimum Architectural Documentation Standards" are utilized to record significant buildings and structures that are either listed in or eligible for inclusion in the Indiana Register of Historic Sites and Structures or the National Register of Historic Places. DHPA staff may recommend consultants follow these standards to create a record of a resource in the event that it is altered or demolished as part of an environmental review or as mitigation for adverse effects.

Since the last Standards were adopted in 2011, changes in technology and the increase of digital submissions have necessitated adjustments. DHPA has removed references to film photography as digital images are widely accepted by DHPA, NPS, and the Indiana State Archives. Providing hard copy prints of digital photography remains an option, but DHPA has added electronic transfers of digital images as the preferred method. The general description has been expanded to account for the increased amount of bridge documentation, requirements about a photo log and photo key are clarified, and noted the updated digital requirements of file type and size. The Cultural Resources Office is pleased to announce that INDOT has a new Historic Bridge Information application available through INDOT's Technical Application Pathway (ITAP). It is an upgraded version of the database that was developed by INDOT's consultant as part of the Indiana Historic Bridge Inventory. The original database was created and developed in Microsoft Access 2000 format between 2006 and 2010. It was used as a tool to apply the National Register criteria and to apply the methodology to identify Select and Non-Select bridges. INDOT migrated the database information in 2021-2022 to an Oracle-based application with a web-based interface accessible via ITAP for better long-term maintenance of the information and easier access.

If not already an ITAP user, to gain access to ITAP, follow the instructions in the Quick Start Guide found at the Doing Business with INDOT page: https://www.in.gov/indot/doing-business-with-indot/. Within ITAP, you must request access to the Historic Bridge Information application via the Enroll New Application function (found under the Menu in the top left corner and/or under the Action Links on the right side of the page). After enrollment, the Historic Bridge Information database will appear in the list of applications on the ITAP dashboard as "Historic Bridge." Hitting the "Launch" button to the right of the application name will open the database. Upon entering the Historic Bridge Information database, you will see the Dashboard page from which you can search for bridges. A user manual is located within the application via the Help button in the top right corner.

ProjectWise is a suite of software provided by Bentley Systems which is used to transfer, share, and store files associated with various INDOT projects. ProjectWise is being used by INDOT as a project lifecycle tool and is the location of all active project data, including email communications, project-specific files, Geographic Information Systems (GIS) layers, maps, permits, and approved reports.

Obtaining access and using ProjectWise will:

- Provide access to shared files
- Standardize the method of document submittals
- Reduce the number of emails containing large files
- Remove the need for file share websites
- Reduce the potential for document loss or misplacement
- Assist with document review (i.e., access to multiple document versions)

The memo, effective immediately, notes that updates have been made to Chapters 14 and 412 of the Indiana Design Manual (IDM) to clarify the requirements of Bridge Preservation Projects on historic bridges. These updates apply to both rehabilitation and preventive maintenance work types, when they are processed through the *Programmatic Agreement Among the Federal Highway Administration, the Indiana Department of Transportation, the Indiana State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO), and the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation Regarding the Management and Preservation of Indiana's Historic Bridges (Historic Bridges PA)*.

We have recently been informed by some of our Tribal partners that they would like to receive the results of archaeological fieldwork even though they may have not responded to the Section 106 Early Coordination Letter. THPOs are often inundated with requests to review Section 106 documents from several federal agencies and DOTs across many states. All too often, ECLs are overlooked or simply ignored because some THPOs simply do not have time to respond in the allotted 30 days. Based on discussions with some of our more active THPOs, FHWA and INDOT-CRO have decided to modify how they implement Tribal consultation. Archaeology reports will now be sent to all Tribes claiming an interest in the county, or counties, in which a project occurs regardless of whether the Tribe responded to the ECL. HPR's, Effect Letters, Findings, etc. will still only be sent to those Tribes that responded to the ECL. Report Distribution Letters accompanying archaeology reports will now need to list the appropriate Tribes using the Tribal Contact table available on our website. This guidance is effective immediately.

Please see below the dashed line for an update from DHPA (SHPO) regarding their document submittal policy. No changes for FHWA/INDOT document submittals, except please note the change of email address for electronic submittals-see highlighted sentence.

As a reminder for FHWA/INDOT project submittals, if it is not possible to send a hard copy at this time, then DHPA will accept electronic email copies as formal submittals under the following conditions:

- Documents should be submitted as PDFs.
- For documents over 35 MB, IN SCOPE is acceptable. In these cases, attach the DHPA submittal form and include IN SCOPE directions. One exception-archaeology reports should always be attached.
- DHPA does not consider being cc'd on emails with other consulting parties as a formal submittal. Please send submittals directly to DHPA, specifically to Miriam Burkett at dhpareview@dnr.IN.gov.
- Hard copies should be provided to DHPA for their records as soon as feasible.
- CC the relevant CRO reviewer(s) on all emails to DHPA.

DHPA's review begins when they receive the electronic copy with PDFs or the completed hard copy in the office. Please contact the relevant CRO reviewer if you have any questions.

Submission of Projects for Review - The DHPA has made some changes in the submission process for Section 106, IC 14-21-1 and other federal and state regulatory review requests. We continue to require and process paper hard copy submissions and mail as received, and we understand that in some cases electronic review may be necessary for applicants and reviewers due to mandatory actions and remote work conditions.

INDOT-CRO has an announcement regarding new guidance for historic bridge documentation. For any project processed through the Historic Bridges Programmatic Agreement (HBPA), SHPO may request photographic documentation as mitigation per Attachment B. Typically, this is in the form of color, digital images that provide overviews of the resource, along with detailed shots of character-defining features. These photos are prepared in accordance with the "Indiana DNR – Division of Historic Preservation and Archaeology Minimum Architectural Documentation Standards."

Moving forward, SHPO will also be requesting that a photo log that corresponds to the photographs, a photo key, and an overview thumbnail sheet be provided. This will help provide a more complete record of the resource, that will in turn, be uploaded by SHPO into SHAARD as part of the Historic Bridges files. PDF files of the photo log, photo key, and thumbnail sheet should be combined into one document to save space in SHAARD. Please see the link for an example.

Typically, upon approval, SHPO has requested that the documentation be provided to a local public or not-for-profit organization that is willing to accept a copy of the documentation and make it available to the public. This is still the case, and SHPO should be informed as to which organization is willing to accept the documentation.

Upon approval of the documentation, SHPO will submit a copy to the Indiana State Archives, which is different from recent years in which the bridge owner or their consultant had been responsible for submitting the documentation to the Archives. SHPO submittal of the documentation to the Archives will ensure a consistent process for these files to be grouped together accordingly at the Archives.

Draft and final copies of the documentation may be submitted to the SHPO on CD, DVD, or flash drive. Please reach out to the SHPO staff reviewer if considering an electronic file delivery site transfer to ensure it is accessible through the state system.

Although INDOT does not typically review historic bridge photo documentation before it is submitted to the SHPO and this is still the case, please copy the INDOT Historic Bridge Specialist, Mary Kennedy, on all correspondence with the SHPO staff regarding photo documentation submittals. INDOT does track compliance with this mitigation item.

We are continually updating the map, which is why we have asked for submissions to CRO to include shapefiles of project areas as well as APEs and NRHP-eligible property boundaries for full 106 projects. Please note though that the map does not represent the entirety of CRO reviews, present or historical.

It consists of four layers: Project Area, Area of Potential Effect (APE), Determined NRHP Eligible; and Determined Not NRHP Eligible.

- Project Area: general project areas for all projects reviewed by INDOT-CRO, including Excess Parcel
 reviews, Historic Bridge PAs (HBPA), Minor Projects PA (MPPA) determinations, and Full Section
 106 reviews (indicated in the Attribute Table). These are for general reference; they do not represent
 actual construction limits.
- APE: APEs for projects that have gone through Full Section 106 review. The overall Finding for the project is indicated in the Attribute Table. If this is blank, the project may be ongoing.
- Determined NRHP Eligible: individual properties or districts that were recommended eligible through the Full Section 106 process and SHPO concurred. NOTE—these determinations are only indications of eligibility and the property/district may need to be reevaluated for each project.
- Determined Not NRHP Eligible: individual properties or districts that were determined not eligible to the National Register through the Full Section 106 process. NOTE—these determinations are only indications of eligibility and the property/district may need to be reevaluated for each project

The CRO Map can be a useful reference tool in conjunction with other sources, such as SHAARD and the IHBBCM, for consultants, LPAs, and Project Managers in scoping the Section 106 process.

INDOT-CRO has two announcements:

Windshield Survey of Post-War Neighborhoods

DHPA has published a sampling of neighborhoods that have been determined to be eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. These windshield survey forms were generated and evaluated as part of the Multiple Property Documentation Form (MPDF), *Residential Planning and Development in Indiana, 1940-1973*. Per DHPA, these are not all the neighborhoods that are eligible under the MPDF, but, they provide a spectrum of neighborhoods that will be useful to evaluation efforts. The windshield survey district examples have been determined eligible based on the registration requirements set out in the MPDF. These survey forms are reconnaissance level. Boundaries are preliminary and may be revised upon receipt of additional information. DHPA concentrated on districts since determinations of eligibility for individual post-war houses are reasonably straight-forward.

The windshield forms are grouped by the Indiana regions used as an analytical tool within the MPDF: Calumet, Falls of the Ohio, Indianapolis Metro, Vanderburgh County, and Vigo County. You can access the windshield forms through SHAARD: https://secure.in.gov/apps/dnr/shaard/welcome.html. You can search for the *Residential Planning and Development in Indiana* MPDF in the NRHP files. Once the MPDF entry has been selected, go to the "Photos & PDFs" tab on the far right, and PDF documents for the five regions are available for download. You can also directly download the PDFs through the links below.

The following counties already have post-war IHSSI data available in SHAARD: Adams, Allen, Bartholomew, Clark, Daviess, Franklin, Gibson, Greene, LaGrange, Martin, Monroe, Steuben, Warrick, and Wells. The IHSSI data coupled with the new windshield survey forms provides a broad sampling of data regarding housing in the 1940-1973 period for Indiana.

This is a historic bridge that may be available for reuse. The status of the bridge is currently "pending," meaning its future is undetermined as the Section 106 review process is on-going. Depending on the outcome of Section 106 consultation, interested parties may be able to acquire the bridge. For more information, please visit https://www.in.gov/indot/2532.htm or contact: [insert contact name, phone number, and/or email address].

This new requirement is a result of recent conversations between FHWA, SHPO, and INDOT staff to address concerns expressed by consulting parties that some elements of the marketing procedures appear to predetermine bridge replacement. Incorporation of this language into the marketing signs provides a consistent message across all forms of historic bridge marketing. As part of this update, the historic bridge marketing legal notice template and the bridge marketing website data form have been revised and are linked below. Please use these revised documents effective immediately.

Those involved in the project development process for a historic bridge are reminded that the allowance of marketing activities to commence does not constitute approval of a bypass or replacement alternative. A preferred alternative is not developed until the preparation of the Historic Bridges Alternatives Analysis (HBAA), and final approval of the HBAA and preferred alternative does not occur until FHWA approval of the environmental document.

In order to clear up some misunderstanding of the Minor Projects PA and misapplication of Category A work types, INDOT-CRO is providing the following guidance:

All projects requiring new right-of-way acquisition, but otherwise meeting the conditions of any MPPA Category, must be submitted to INDOT-CRO using the MPPA Submission Form (Section 1). INDOT-CRO will determine whether Category A or B is applicable and either respond with an email--if Category A--or with a completed MPPA Determination Form, if Category B. Though new right-of-way may consist of previously disturbed soils, CRO is entrusted to review its acquisition to ensure there are no archaeological or 4(f) resources.

Part II, Chapter 3 of the Cultural Resources Manual (Minor Projects Programmatic Agreement) and the INDOT CRO MPPA Submission Form and Flowchart for Category B Projects have been revised to require CRO's review of projects in which new right-of-way is to be acquired.

INDOT-CRO does not need to review projects that are limited to the existing road right-of-way and meet the conditions of Category A work types. Questions regarding Category A applicability in these situations should still be directed towards the appropriate INDOT District environmental staff.

The revised MPPA Submission Form and Flowchart is attached.

INDOT is pleased to announce the execution of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) regarding Section 4(f) between FHWA-IN Division, IN SHPO and INDOT. The Section 4(f) MOU establishes a programmatic approach for FHWA's determination of Section 4(f) de minimis use for historic properties. Please see the Section 4(f) MOU attached.

In summary, the Section 4(f) MOU stipulates that FHWA intends to determine Section 4(f) de minimis use on historic properties for projects in which SHPO has concurred with a finding of "No Adverse Effect" or "No Historic Properties Affected." The Section 4(f) MOU satisfies the notification requirements specified in 23 CFR 774 for all projects where there is a determination of "No Adverse Effect" or that there are "No Historic Properties Affected" associated with a Section 4(f) historic property except those that are also National Historic Landmarks (NHLs). As a result, FHWA will not have to individually approve each Section 4(f) de minimis determination on historic properties through CE document review except in the case of NHLs. In effect, the Section 4(f) MOU will reduce FHWA's review of CE documents that had previously required FHWA's approval of the Section 4(f) de minimis determination for historic properties.

Please keep in mind:

- The Section 4(f) MOU only pertains to de minimis use(s) on historic properties. No other Section 4(f) properties are included under this MOU.
- The Section 4(f) MOU will not affect the Section 106 consultation process. Section 106 forms will be updated in the near future to recognize the Section 4(f) MOU.

INDOT CRO and Environmental Policy will be releasing updated forms and guidance as appropriate to reflect the execution of the Section 4(f) MOU. In the meantime, if you have any questions about application of the Section 4(f) MOU for current projects please contact:

Historic Bridge Alternatives Analysis (HBAA) Submittals-ERMS

We have been having issues with the proper file naming convention not being used for ERMS for HBAA submittals. When this occurs, documents are not always routed to the appropriate staff, which can cause significant delays in review time. In order to readily identify HBAA files within ERMS, the following naming convention should be used: *ENV DraftHBAA 0000000 for Bridge Services*. Even though the HBAA serves as the bridge inspection (bridge scoping) report for historic bridges, please do not use the "BrInsp" naming convention. Using the ENV HBAA naming convention signifies that both Bridge and CRO staff will review the document.

INDOT's Cultural Resources Office (INDOT-CRO) is pleased to provide updates to our Cultural Resources Manual (CRM) that provide additional guidance and efficiencies to the FHWA/INDOT Section 106 process. Please see below for a brief summary of Chapter updates:

Part IV Chapters 1-3: Historic Bridges

- *Chapter 1*: Overview of Historic Bridges Program
 - Minor edits and clarifications.
- Chapter 2: Historic Bridge Project Development Process
 - Major revisions to reflect the current project development process incorporating the Historic Bridge Alternative Analysis (HBAA) process to provide consistency with Design Memorandum 18-02
 - All three plan reviews specified in the Historic Bridges PA (approx. 30%; approx. 60%; final)
 MUST be completed before approval of the Environmental Consultation Form (ECF) can occur.
 - FAQ Appendix includes revisions and clarifications to many previous questions and answers/adds several new questions and answers.
 - Examples of marketing signs in Appendix.
 - Examples of plan submittal transmittal letters in Appendix.
- Chapter 3: Procedures for Public Hearings under the Historic Bridges PA
 - Minor edits and clarifications.
 - All originally invited consulting parties should receive hearing notification.

Shapefiles for LPA Projects

- The History Unit will now require GIS polygon shapefiles or KMZ files (shapefiles preferred) for all submissions, including submissions for LPA-sponsored projects.
 - Shapefiles should use "NAD 1983 UTM Zone 16N" projected coordinate system.
 - For projects submitted under the MPPA, a project area shapefile should be submitted.
 - For projects submitted for full Section 106, a project area shapefile should be submitted along with the ECL and the following additional shapefiles should be submitted with the Historic Property Report: a polygon shapefile for the APE and polygon shapefiles for any properties that are being recommended eligible for the NRHP. If an ECL was submitted prior to this updated guidance and a project area shapefile was not submitted to INDOT-CRO, the project area shapefile should be submitted with the HPR.
 - All shapefiles should contain the following text attribute field: DES_NO. The project des. no. should be entered in this field.
- In order to reflect the above changes, revisions have been made to the MPPA Submission Form and Flowchart as well as *Part 2 Chapter 4* and *Part 2 Chapter 6* of the CRM.
- Beginning Monday, September 9th, INDOT-CRO will return any submissions for LPA-sponsored projects that do not include the above shapefiles.

Other Updates

- Part 1 Chapter 3 of the CRM has been updated to reflect staff changes.
- Other revisions to Part 2 Chapter 4
 - The local Chamber of Commerce should be added to the list of consulting parties in instances when a project takes place within a downtown commercial historic district.
 - When a consultant submits an ECL to INDOT-CRO they must provide the reason that the

project cannot meet the conditions of the MPPA.

INDOT's Cultural Resources Office (INDOT-CRO) is providing additional guidance regarding Section 106 Early Coordination Letter (ECL) preparation and distribution. As a reminder-as of June 1, 2019, all Section 106 ECLs must be submitted prior to the initiation of above-ground and archaeological surveys.

The early submission of ECLs will not add time to the Section 106 timeline, but it will generally shorten the Section 106 process by:

- Reducing unnecessary work-such as the preparation of an HPR or archaeology report when the MPPA would apply.
- Allowing CRO to provide assistance during the identification phase and flagging problematic projects.
- Providing Tribes and other consulting parties with an opportunity to indicate any properties or locations of concern before the HPR or archaeology report is completed.

When preparing Section 106 ECLs keep in mind that:

- ECLs should be prepared at the early stages of project development, soon after the notice to proceed.
- ECLs do not have to be prepared by a Section 106 QP.
- A preliminary purpose and need statement should be provided with the ECL. The purpose and need statement can evolve and be updated as the project develops.

The ECL template has been updated to reflect this new policy. A new template, the Section 106 Report Distribution Letter, should be used for distribution of HPRs, archaeology reports, HBAAs, and other reports. All correspondence templates can be found at https://www.in.gov/indot/crm/2341.htm.

New ECL and report distribution guidance:

Including SHPO on emails from consultants to non-tribal consulting parties:

- Going forward, INDOT-CRO asks that consultants include SHPO on all notification emails to non-tribal consulting parties (ECL, post-ECL, 800.11, etc.). Emails should be sent to the assigned SHPO reviewers, if the project has been assigned to a reviewer. If a project has not been assigned to a SHPO reviewer yet, emails should be sent to DHPA's Assistant Director for Environmental Review. Please note, SHPO still requires hardcopies of all Section 106 documents for review.
- Please note that this not a new rule, but rather a clarification of a rule that has been in place since the Tribal MOU went into effect, i.e. that the consultant should send email notifications to all non-tribal consulting parties, which would include SHPO since they are a non-tribal consulting party.

Revised guidance for identifying consulting parties can be bound in updated CRM Pt. II. Ch. 4.

Part II Chapter 7 Historic Property Identification and Evaluation-Archaeology was updated to:

- Replace the outdated record check report policy with guidance on preparing Archaeological Assessments during early coordination;
- Revise and update standard Phase Ia methodologies and provide best practices;
- Update Phase Ia and Phase II report review and distribution policy; and
- Provide links to Roadway Treatment Plan and AASHTO Guide to Incorporating Geophysical Remote Sensing in Transportation Archaeological Investigations.

We are making a correction to the announcement sent on March 11 regarding the GIS shapefile instructions. See the revised section highlighted below.

Archaeology Shapefiles

The INDOT-CRO Archaeology Unit now requires consultants to attach separate GIS polygon shapefiles of project and survey areas and site boundaries when submitting reports for our review. Shapefiles should use "NAD_1983_UTM_Zone_16N" projected coordinate system. Project and survey area files should contain the following *text* attribute field: PROJECT_NO. The project designation number should be entered in this field. Site area files should contain the following *text* attribute field: SITE_NO. The full state trinomial number should be entered in this field in the format 12-Xx-0123.

If project area and survey area are the same, only one shapefile is needed with polygon depicting the project area. Generally, survey areas should be larger in size than project areas and be drawn as a separate polygon.

Polygons for isolated finds should be represented as a circle with a 0.5 m radius (1 m diameter).

Archaeological Assessment in ECL:

INDOT-Cultural Resources Office is providing additional guidance with regards to the content of the brief archaeological assessment (taking the place archaeological records check reports) included in the body of the Early Coordination Letter for undertakings requiring full Section 106 but limited to work in disturbed soils. Please note that the archaeological assessment must be prepared by a Qualified Professional and should include the following information:

- 1) Name of QP who reviewed the project area
- **2)** Results of SHAARD review noting the presence or absence of archaeological resources *within or adjacent* to the project area
- 3) A description of what the project area consists of and ground disturbances visible in desktop review that limit the potential for intact archaeological resources to be present.
- 4) A statement that the project has no potential to impact previously unrecorded or recorded sites within or adjacent to the project area
- 5) A recommendation for no further work;
- 6) Accidental discovery statement.

Example:

With regards to archaeological resources, Jane Doe, an INDOT Qualified Professional archaeologist reviewed the proposed project area and determined that the US 41 HMA Overlay, Preventative Maintenance project will not likely affect archaeological resources due to the project scope and setting. All work will occur in previously disturbed soils, which in the rural portions, consist of the 4-lane divided highway and paved shoulders, raised road berm, median and roadside ditches, lane tapering, and utility easements. Within Muncie, the project area consists of two traffic lanes, turn lanes, curb and curb ramps, sidewalks, storm sewers, cut soils, traffic/pedestrian poles and boxes, and utility easements. The majority of curb ramps within the project area have been previously updated and any work to improve the selected intersection curb ramps will not extend deeper than previous construction of curbs and sidewalks. According to SHAARD, there are no archaeological sites recorded within or adjacent to the project area. Since the proposed project is

confined to repaying US 41 and to excavation work in previously disturbed soils, there are no archaeological concerns and no further work is recommended. However, state law (Indiana Code 14-21-1-27 and -29) requires that if any prehistoric or historic archaeological artifacts or human remains are uncovered during construction, demolition, or earth moving activities, that the discovery must be reported to the Department of Natural Resources within two (2) business days.

Are you covered? When to perform an addendum archaeological survey.

Sometimes the scope of a project changes after the Phase Ia archaeological reconnaissance survey has already been completed, and additional right-of-way (r/w) is needed. When is an addendum archaeological survey necessary, and when can the added r/w be considered to have been covered by the previous survey?

Our usual advice is that we consider additional areas that are less than a standard transect interval in width to fall within the original survey universe. That is, you would typically only need to survey areas of added r/w that extend 15 m or more beyond the original survey limits for shovel probed areas, or that extend 10 m or more for pedestrian survey areas.

However, there are some exceptions to this general guidance:

1) Previously recorded sites

A reduced 5 m survey interval is required within previously recorded archaeological sites. Therefore, if a site was previously recorded within or adjacent to the original survey area and may therefore extend into the new r/w, then the cutoff would be 5 m instead of one standard transect interval. In other words, if the additional r/w extends 5 m or more beyond what was originally tested, then that added area must be surveyed at a 5 m interval per DHPA guidelines.

2) Areas that were not tested during the original survey due to buried utilities or other disturbance

If there is apparently undisturbed, testable land within the new added r/w adjacent to any of those areas, then it must be tested even if it is less than one transect interval in width. For example, if the original survey area was visually inspected because it consisted of a ditch and buried utility corridor, but the new added r/w extends 3 m into agricultural fields or residential yards, then that 3 m wide undisturbed area should be tested.

These general guidelines cover the most common situations, but if you should ever have questions regarding the needs for a particular project, please don't hesitate to contact CRO prior to conducting any additional survey and we will be happy to discuss the project specifics.

The INDOT-Cultural Resources Office has several announcements related to historic bridges.

Select and Non-Select Bridges now on Indiana Historic Buildings, Bridges and Cemeteries Map

In collaboration with INDOT-CRO, DNR-DHPA has incorporated Select and Non-Select Bridges into the Indiana Historic Buildings, Bridges, and Cemeteries Map (IHBBC Map). On the upper, right hand side of the screen, click on the "Layer List," and you'll find a layer is available for both Select and Non-Select Bridges. Each layer must be turned on individually for each type of bridge to be shown in the map. These layers are not displayed by default and must be turned on each time you access the map. These layers are not associated with SHAARD. When you click on the icon, it will show the basic bridge ID information, but there is not a link to learn more from the database – this is informational data only. Plan Review Requirements

Please be sure to incorporate the plan submittal requirements per the Historic Bridges Programmatic Agreement (HBPA) into the project development process for historic bridge projects receiving federal aid for which the preferred alternative is rehabilitation of the bridge. INDOT has seen issues on many recent projects with the process not being followed for the plan submittals specified in Attachment B of the HBPA at approximately 30% complete, approximately 60% complete, and final plans. Recent conversations with FHWA staff have prompted us to send a reminder that **ALL THREE** of these plan review submittals **ARE REQUIRED** for all projects for which the preferred alternative is rehabilitation of the historic bridge.

For many projects, the design does not progress beyond Stage 1 (approximately 30% complete) plans before environmental document completion. Therefore, the 60% complete & final plan submittals often will occur after the environmental document has been approved. As a result, these plan submittals must be listed as commitments in the environmental document and the Project Commitments Database. These submittals should be completed prior to the submittal of the Environmental Consultation Form (ECF). Per the HBPA, **SHPO has 30 days to comment on each plan submittal**. Before each submittal is sent to SHPO, please send them to INDOT-CRO for review. The submittal should include a cover letter to the SHPO that highlights key changes in the plans from the previous submittal(s), and answers any questions SHPO staff posed in the previous review letter(s). For state-owned bridges, project clearance under state law should also be addressed in the letter as appropriate. Example submittal letters will be incorporated into the Cultural Resources Manual in the future, but until that time, several are available in IN SCOPE when searching for the "Bridge Plan Review" document type (https://erms.indot.in.gov/Section106Documents/). All Historic Bridge Alternatives Analysis (HBAA) documents submitted to INDOT for review must be submitted through ERMS. The file naming convention and abbreviations are essential for locating specific types of submittals within ERMS. Failure to use the proper file naming convention can result in the document not being routed to proper staff, and can cause significant delays in review time. This document is intended to address specific issues related to the identification and evaluation of historic roads on Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), INDOT undertakings only. Specifically, this document will assist in accomplishing these goals by providing guidance in three key areas:

- Compliance with federal and state preservation laws and regulations that include the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) of 1966; the U.S. Department of Transportation Act of 1966 and Indiana Code (IC) 14-21-1 and 312 IAC 21;
- Development of an efficient, consistent and systematic approach to identify, document and evaluate
 historic roads listed on or eligible for listing on the NRHP or IRHSS encountered on United States
 Department of Transportation Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) undertakings or state and
 local projects within the archaeological and above-ground Area of Potential Effects (APE); and
- Determine which roads in Indiana should be considered historically significant based upon the NRHP/IRHSS Criteria and how these roads will be evaluated in relation to each of the criteria based upon a general contextual framework

The basis of the plan includes the use of a flow chart initiated by the particular road type (above-ground, above-ground in a historic district or below ground [buried]) identified within the Area of Potential Effects as part of cultural resource investigations or as an accidental discovery.

Good afternoon,

As the new fieldwork season rolls on, INDOT-CRO asks that following points be kept in mind during archaeological investigations and reporting. We have noticed a developing trend in which project areas and sites are having to be revisited because adequate information to clear a project area or evaluate a site was not gathered during the initial reconnaissance. To lessen these occurrences from happening we recommend following the guidance provided in points 4-10 below. Please wear your personal protective equipment in the field and have a safe and enjoyable season.

- Reports with more than 1 or 2 oversized pages (larger than 8.5 x 11) or more than 50 pages in length will need to be printed, bound, and provided to our office after the report has been approved by DHPA.
- Photographs included in archaeological reports must be in focus, without excessive glare from sunlight or flash, and with generally natural colors (i.e. no orange tint from fluorescent lighting).
- It is not necessary or desirable to use the maximum date range possible for historic artifacts. For example, square nails are still available today, but their use is limited to a few specific activities. Therefore, in the absence of some extenuating circumstance, a terminal 19th century end date end date is better than a modern end date.

- Fill can look like disturbance in many situations. In locations like urban areas or the base of slopes it may be necessary to excavate through apparently disturbed sediments to check for undisturbed soils below.
- It is still required that no-till fields are shovel tested regardless of surface visibility. Please state whether fields examined through pedestrian survey have been plowed recently and adequately rain washed.
- For linear project areas, like road widening projects, the best practice is to work from the outside of the project area proceeding inward toward the road. This will ensure that the area with the least potential to be disturbed is examined, and therefore that the good faith effort to locate cultural resources has been completed.
 - o If the project area extends into a wooded area, then the survey transect should go into the wooded area.
 - o If the project area extends to the top of a road cut, then it is necessary to examine the top of the road cut.
- At least one shovel test is required on sites discovered through pedestrian survey. One shovel test is the minimum requirement; additional shovel tests can and should be excavated based on variables such as:
 - Site size.
 - o Landform: different topographic areas within a site should be tested.
 - o Known or suspected intrasite areas:
 - o House area vs. yard in historic sites.
 - o Artifact concentrations and possible features vs. other areas of a site.
 - o Areas of suspected disturbance vs. potentially undisturbed areas.
- When defining site boundaries, additional radial shovel probes must be excavated around positive radials near the site margins.
- Additional radial probes are recommended around any positive probe that (for example) contains an unusually high number of artifacts for the site, contains prehistoric pottery, or exhibits evidence of a possible buried horizon, even if that probe is not located at the site boundary.
- While shovel probing historical sites, additional shovel probes within the site interior may need to be excavated off of the 15 m grid in order to test foundations or cellar interiors, depressions and other surface features, and the locations of historically mapped structures that were identified during the records check.

In general, DHPA's Guidebook for Indiana Historic Sites and Structures Inventory – Archaeological Sites and INDOT's Cultural Resources manual lay out the minimum standard methodologies required to conduct archaeological investigations for INDOT. While these minimum standards are typically sufficient, it is not uncommon that additional work may be necessary. The purpose of the archaeological Phase I reconnaissance is to demonstrate that a good faith effort has been made to locate and evaluate archaeological resources that may be

impacted by an undertaking. INDOT, CRO requires that the level of effort to be equal to this goal.

Updated Section 106 Public Notice Templates

The Section 106 public notice templates have been updated and are customized according to the finding that is being made. Please choose the template for a "no historic properties affected," "no adverse effect," or "adverse effect" finding accordingly. The updated templates also include references to IN SCOPE and include the required "Americans with Disabilities Act" verbiage. Updated public notice templates for historic bridge projects are currently under development and will be distributed upon completion.

Updated Sample Format for a Section 106 Recommendation

The sample format for a Section 106 recommendation has been updated to reflect the current appropriate signatories for INDOT and FHWA. Additionally, a new Section 4(f) compliance statement option has been added to address when historic properties are present and land within a historic property is temporarily occupied. Per 23 CFR 774.13(d), a temporary occupancy of land (such as temporary right of way) that is so minimal may not constitute a use within the meaning of Section 4(f). For a temporary occupancy to be exempted, the following conditions must be satisfied:

- (1) Duration must be temporary, *i.e.*, less than the time needed for construction of the project, and there should be no change in ownership of the land;
- (2) Scope of the work must be minor, *i.e.*, both the nature and the magnitude of the changes to the Section 4(f) property are minimal;
- (3) There are no anticipated permanent adverse physical impacts, nor will there be interference with the protected activities, features, or attributes of the property, on either a temporary or permanent basis;
- (4) The land being used must be fully restored, *i.e.*, the property must be returned to a condition which is at least as good as that which existed prior to the project; and
- (5) There must be documented agreement of the official(s) with jurisdiction over the Section 4(f) resource regarding the above conditions.

The appropriate Section 4(f) compliance statement from the template should be used. The fulfillment of conditions 1-4 must be detailed in Section 4 of the accompanying documentation specified at 36 CFR 800.11(e), "Describe the Undertaking's Effects on Historic Properties." To

fulfill condition 5, the transmittal letter to the State Historic Preservation Officer should explain the temporary occupancy and ask for their written concurrence.

Project Review Updates

- Please ensure that Section 106 Early Coordination Letters and Historic Property Reports
 are sent to us simultaneously for review. Also, the public notices and the Section 106
 finding and accompanying 800.11 documentation must be sent to us for review in one
 combined submission.
- Due to current workloads and short staffing, all INDOT-CRO reviews, except those pertaining to archaeological investigations, are taking 15 business days to complete. Any

- queries regarding the status of reviews should be made only if you have not heard back from us after the passage of 15 business days.
- Any combined submission or expedited review requests either by CRO or the SHPO staff - should come to INDOT-CRO from the INDOT Project Manager, if they deem the request appropriate.

SHAARD GIS Updates

• If you find an error in SHAARD or SHAARD GIS, contact DHPA's SHAARD manager, Jeannie Regan-Dinius: jrdinius@dnr.in.gov. She can fix the error before your project is turned into INDOT so that your map or the information in SHAARD is correct. Most fixes can be done immediately, but at times, if Jeannie is in the field, it may take 2-3 days, so let her know when you find the error, not the day your project is due to INDOT. DHPA wants SHAARD and SHAARD GIS to be accurate and they are working daily to fix errors.

Correspondence/Consulting Party Updates

- For any projects with an "adverse effect" finding, consultants should now fill out the Electronic Section 106 Documentation Submittal System (e106) Form (linked below) to aid FHWA in formally notifying the ACHP of a project's "adverse effect" finding. After INDOT-CRO has reviewed an "adverse effect" finding and the supporting documentation and is ready to forward the information to FHWA for review and approval, INDOT-CRO will notify the consultant that preparation of the e106 form can be completed. The e106 form will need to be prepared and submitted to INDOT-CRO before the documentation is sent to FHWA. http://www.achp.gov/docs/e106-instructions-form.pdf.
- INDOT-CRO must be provided copies of all consulting party correspondence or responses to public notices received during the Section 106 consultation process as soon as they are received in order to assist in in formulating an appropriate response where necessary. If INDOT-CRO is not aware of this information, the completion of the Section 106 process could be delayed.
- Please note that it is not necessary to include a copy of every letter sent to every consulting party. A "generic" or template copy of the Early Coordination Letter may be uploaded into IN SCOPE that is addressed "Dear Consulting Party." To save time and reduce confusion, we recommend that one letter version be used for all consulting parties including the SHPO.
- Indiana Landmarks, an organization that FHWA requires to be invited as a Section 106 consulting party on all projects, has recently revised some of the mapping for their regional and field offices. Please be sure to check the map at the following link to find the correct office to invite: https://www.indianalandmarks.org/news/in-your-area/

Good afternoon!

Please see below for guidance on environmental review for INDOT's Community Crossings program.

Community Crossings projects funded with only state and local money are not federal actions and therefore NEPA does not apply. The recipient unit of government is the project proponent and is responsible for documenting how the project meets the requirements of the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA). Many projects will be exempted under the rule.

- Check 327 IAC 11-1-3 http://www.in.gov/indot/files/ES_2013CEManual.pdf for exemptions. If the project meets either of these requirements, document this in a memorandum to the project file. This documentation may be required later in project development.
- Projects that are not exempted or excluded will require a SEPA document. Please contact Ron Bales, Environmental Policy Manager, INDOT Environmental Services Division at rbales@indot.in.gov to discuss further.
- Compliance with NEPA or SEPA does not excuse a project's compliance with state historic preservation laws. Included here is a link from INDOT's Cultural Resources Manual that highlights those state regulations that are most likely to apply to transportation projects- http://www.in.gov/indot/crm/files/Chapter 1-Overview.pdf. Projects that are limited to existing roadway footprint, such as resurfacing or patching, would likely not impact any historic properties and therefore not require coordination. If a Community Crossings project goes beyond the existing footprint or there are questions about impacts to historic properties, the project sponsor or consultant can send INDOT's Cultural Resource Office (INDOT-CRO) a project description and aerial map, and INDOT-CRO will provide guidance on any actions that should occur concerning state preservation law compliance. Contact Anu Kumar, Cultural Resources Manager, at 317-234-5168 if you have questions.

A project's federal permits are actually a **separate federal action by the permitting agency**, **and that agency (e.g. USACE) is the lead agency for that federal action**. Follow the federal agency's requirements for investigations and documentation to meet their requirements. This will likely include demonstrating compliance with Section 106 and Endangered Species Act, and possibly other federal laws. It is the project proponent's responsibility to identify the need for federal permits early in project development, demonstrate compliance with these federal laws, and execute any required mitigation. For correspondence that accompanies reports or other documentation, please submit simultaneously so we can combine reviews in the same time period. The purpose of this review is to ensure that the appropriate consulting parties are being reached and other facets of the correspondence adequately convey the appropriate project and procedural information as appropriate. This review step will help facilitate the process and avoid potential problems later in project development.

Please note that INDOT is currently developing an electronic web portal for posting Section 106 documents for all INDOT and LPA projects. The web portal will be a tool for disseminating Section 106 documents and reducing administrative time and costs associated with mailing paper copies. As we transition to this system, approval of correspondence will be a necessary component to posting to the web portal.

Please email Early Coordination correspondence to: <u>culturalresources@indot.in.gov</u>. A reviewer will be assigned to the project and respond after their review. Once you have an assigned reviewer on the project, you may proceed to email them follow-up correspondence, reports and other documentation directly.

1. NCHRP Report 723: A Model for Identifying and Evaluating the Historic Significance of Post-World War II Housing

The Transportation Research Board's National Cooperative Highway Research Program (NCHRP) has published (NCHRP) Report 723: A Model for Identifying and Evaluating the Historic Significance of Post-World War II Housing provides an approach to the identification and evaluation of postwar housing resources that can be used within the framework of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act and Section 4(f) of the Department of Transportation Act. The report includes a methodology for identification and evaluation of the National Register eligibility and non-eligibility of single-family housing built between 1946 and 1975. The report also includes a national context to understand the development of postwar housing and to help guide the evaluation of postwar residential types.

The report is now available in the TRB bookstore: http://www.trb.org/Finance/Bookstore.aspx. The cost is \$68 for hard copies (unless you are with a state DOT) or it can be downloaded for free. If you want to order copies it is recommended to *call* the TRB Bookstore at 202-334-3213 and place your order that way. For QP historians/architectural historians, please familiarize yourself with the report as you survey and evaluate post-WWII houses. Please It us know I you have any questions or recommendations concerning utilizing the report for INDOT/FHWA surveys.

2. Historic Property Report Guidance

When preparing HPRs, please limit overly detailed project descriptions and finding effect finding recommendations. In consultation with SHPO, they have pointed out that later changes in the project or effect findings may cause procedural confusion if a HPR contains different or contradictory information than that of the eventual finding/800.11 documentation. Please focus the HPR on the identification and evaluation of properties, and not project and effects related discussions. A enough project information should be conveyed to support the APE delineation, but otherwise please keep the HPR targeted to identification and evaluation. Details concerning project scope, an update of where you are in the 106 process, your expectations for SHPO's review (your requesting SHPO's concurrence, etc.), can all be contained within the transmittal letter. Transmittal letters should convey the necessary information to aide in SHPO's review and keep the process moving on schedule.

A reminder to archaeologists and historians: as stated in the INDOT Notice of Entry Letter, an attempt must be made to notify the landowner before entering private property; also, safety vests are required when performing work for INDOT.

Consultant contact with SHPO

INDOT Cultural Resources Office again reminds consultants to not contact DHPA/SHPO on behalf of FHWA/INDOT without prior coordination with INDOT CRO.

Consultation with Tribes

Authority to initiate or carry out any Sec. 106 consultation with tribes has not been delegated to FHWA/INDOT consultants. If you are contacted by a tribe, please do not consult but instead contact our office for guidance. If you are already working with tribes on behalf of FHWA outside of this restriction please contact CRO for further guidance.

New ACHP guidance on efforts to identify historic properties

The ACHP released new guidance to Section 106 users on meeting the regulatory requirement that federal agencies make a "reasonable and good faith effort" to identify historic properties as part of the Section 106 process. The guidance sets forth criteria the ACHP will use when it is asked to provide its advisory opinion on whether a specific identification effort was both reasonable in terms of intensity and scale, and carried out in good faith through its development and execution. Good morning!

We have several items for you today from the Environmental Policy Office of INDOT Environmental Services.

Additional Early Coordination Request: We would appreciate it if you could include a "cc" list on all early coordination letters. This helps verify that all appropriate stakeholders are being contacted, and can cut down on redundant or conflicting responses from different agencies.

Section 4(f) for Reacquired Right of Way: We have had further discussions with the Federal Highway Administration regarding applicability of Section 4(f) to reacquisition of apparent right of way. As a result, we need to revise our policy on how to handle those situations. When it is necessary to reacquire land from a property which is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places, Section 4(f) will apply, although in most cases a de minimis finding will be appropriate. When it is necessary to reacquire land from a publicly-owned recreational property, you should take a look at the usage of the affected acreage. In most cases the area to be reacquired will not be in recreational use, and Section 4(f) will not apply. Please feel free to contact us for project-specific interpretations.

One announcement today, in response to questions from multiple sources, about the heavily restricted use of Google Earth and Google Maps in INDOT documents. We're concurrently providing this interim guidance to our legal group for review, and we'll revise it if necessary.

Appropriate Use of Google Earth and Google Maps for INDOT Projects

In general, Google Maps (and other related online spatial content such as Bing Maps, Yahoo Maps, etc.) are appropriate for simple searches, driving directions and uses that are not printed/published material. Examples of printed or published material include using a copy of a map in an electronic or printed document (ex. Waters Report, CE Document, Historic Property Report, etc.), a poster, electronic or printed communication and other similar uses. Per Google's "Permission Guidelines for Google Maps and Google Earth,"

(www.google.com/permissions/geoguidelines.html<<u>http://www.google.com/permissions/geoguidelines.html</u>>) Google does not permit most static, extracted or copied versions of their maps without licensing for those specific uses. In addition, unless a licensed copy of Google Earth has been purchased for business use, its use is prohibited on State computers.

The only situation in which a map from Google could be used in a print publication is if the material was derived from a purchased/licensed copy of Google Earth, in which case, it would need to be noted in the attribution that the data was derived from a licensed copy of Google Earth. This would apply only to consultant derived material, as there are no known instances of the State participating in any single use or enterprise licensing from Google at this time.

There is a "Special Use Cases" caveat in Google's guidelines for "contractors' or environmental consultants' reports," however, the stipulation that they impose on this specific use eliminates it from INDOT projects falling under this "Special Use Case." The last sentence states:

"You may not extract Content for derivative uses that do not relate to the products, such as for further editing within another drafting, desktop publishing, or GIS application."

Since maps are typically used as part of a larger document, and often with added notation to the maps to indicate site specific information, INDOT's use would no longer qualify under this "Special Use Cases."

As alternatives, ESRI, the State's GIS software standard, has several software and web options for use, including ArcExplorer

(www.esri.com/software/arcgis/explorer<http://www.esri.com/software/arcgis/explorer>), with a variety of data sources, including the State GIO Library of GIS Data. The IndianaMap (indianamap.org<ht/>http://indianamap.org/>) also has online mapping software to use with their extensive database of spatial information, most of which is also available for download. In addition, the GIO SharePoint Site is a one stop shop for templates, Agency server connections, layer (.lyr) files and other GIS news and events (myshare.in.gov/gis<http://myshare.in.gov/gis>). Please note that proper attribution as to the source of data used should be included in every map document.

This information is being provided as general guidance and is based on interpretation of the end user agreements for the respective websites. Please consult the end user agreements and permissions for any websites that are used for further information and specific legal limitations of data usage.

MPO Early Coordination: This is a reminder that you should include the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) in your early coordination for all projects within their boundaries. We understand there have been a few projects recently where the MPO was missed.

Cultural Resources Section

This is a reminder that consultants working on FHWA/INDOT projects must follow all DHPA guidelines for Phase 1a survey. In particular, any decisions about survey and testing must recognize and document the type of disturbance, surface visibility, and survey conditions:

- 1) The new DHPA guidelines for shovel probing state that probes should extend into "undisturbed soils," or else to a maximum depth of 50 cm. Archaeologists working on FHWA/INDOT shall interpret "undisturbed soils" to mean sterile subsoil.
- 2) "Residential use" is not a type of ground disturbance, and is not by itself an adequate reason to avoid shovel probing an area.
- 3) DHPA guidelines for Phase Ia surface survey require both adequate surface visibility and adequate survey conditions for detecting archaeological sites. Survey conditions are inadequate when "cultural materials would not be expected to be readily exposed on the surface" (typically the case in unplowed, freshly plowed, or no-till fields). If surface

visibility and survey conditions are not both adequate, then "shovel probing must be employed."

Hello - INDOT OES has the following updates. The first concerns changes in the documentation for 4(f). The second contains a clarification of earlier guidance on the use of the Historic Property Short Report. The final is an a release of the draft Project Development Process (PDP) for historic bridges, and an invitation to review and comment by March 23, 2010. Please direct any comments or questions to the contact listed within each update.

4(f) Documentation Change:

At the request of the Federal Highway Administration, all environmental documents with any 4(f) involvement should now be managed as a CE-4. This is a change from the previous policy, under which projects with de minimis or programmatic evaluations could proceed as a CE-3 document. As a result, it is no longer necessary to produce stand-alone 4(f) documents for those projects. The necessary information may be included in the text of the CE, and turned in for review at the time of environmental document submittal. However we do encourage you to seek a preliminary review and concurrence on the type of 4(f) evaluation to pursue. This can save surprises late in project development when the project timeline may be tighter.

This change only applies to documents which have not yet received 4(f) approval. If you have a project which has already been reviewed and approved, it is not necessary to rewrite or resubmit that portion of the document again.

Historic Property Report Guidance

The Cultural Resources Section would like to make a clarification to the updated historic property report guidance announced on this listserve on February 11, 2010. We have reworded the guidance to be sure it is understood that we are not intending to ignore historic properties that are less than 50 years of age (i.e., eligible under National Register Criteria Consideration G).

The guidance has been updated and the additions are provided in all caps below.

In addition to the scenarios currently described in the Cultural Resources Manual, an abbreviated historic property report may be prepared under the following circumstances:

*The only above-ground resource fifty years old or older within the APE is a bridge that has been evaluated in the latest historic bridge inventory.

*The only above-ground resource fifty years old or older present within the APE that warrants at least a Contributing rating in the Indiana Historic Sites and Structures Inventory system is a

bridge that has been evaluated in the latest historic bridge inventory. (If resources other than the bridge warrant at least a Contributing rating, or if a property is less than 50 years old but meets National Register Criteria Consideration G (properties that have achieved significance within the last fifty years), a full report must be prepared in order to properly evaluate those resources).

*The only above-ground resource fifty years old or older within the APE is a property that is listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

*The only above-ground resource fifty years old or older present within the APE, that warrants at least a Contributing rating in the Indiana Historic Sites and Structures Inventory system is a property that is listed in the National Register of Historic Places (If resources other than the National Register listed property warrant at least a Contributing rating, or if a property is less than 50 years old but meets National Register Criteria Consideration G (properties that have achieved significance within the last fifty years), a full report must be prepared in order to properly evaluate those resources).

Please note that some properties less than fifty years old may be eligible or listed on the National Register of Historic Places under National Register Criteria Consideration G (properties that have achieved significance within the last fifty years).

In the text of the report, the following considerations should be given:

*For bridges evaluated in the latest historic bridge inventory, provide appropriate references to the inventory and the recommendations made in the inventory.

*For properties listed in the National Register of Historic Places, provide appropriate references to when the property was listed and under what criterion. Provide a brief analysis of whether maintenance of the National Register listing is appropriate.

This new guidance will be included in an updated Cultural Resources Manual, to be released later this year.

We have one update for you today from the Office of Environmental Services:

Cultural Resources

The Cultural Resources Section is pleased to announce updated historic property report guidance to aid in streamlining the Section 106 process. This guidance, which outlines new circumstances under which a short format historic property report can be produced, is due in part to consultant feedback and in anticipation of the finalization of the Indiana Historic Bridge Inventory project and full implementation of the Historic Bridge Programmatic Agreement. In addition to the

scenarios currently described in the Cultural Resources Manual, an abbreviated historic property report may be prepared under the following circumstances:

- * The only above-ground resource fifty years old or older within the APE is a bridge that has been evaluated in the latest historic bridge inventory.
- * The only above-ground resource fifty years old or older present within the APE that warrants at least a Contributing rating in the Indiana Historic Sites and Structures Inventory system is a bridge that has been evaluated in the latest historic bridge inventory. (If resources other than the bridge warrant at least a Contributing rating, a full report must be prepared in order to properly evaluate those resources).
- * The only above-ground resource fifty years old or older within the APE is a property that is listed in the National Register of Historic Places.
- * The only above-ground resource fifty years old or older present within the APE that warrants at least a Contributing rating in the Indiana Historic Sites and Structures Inventory system is a property that is listed in the National Register of Historic Places (If resources other than the National Register listed property warrant at least a Contributing rating, a full report must be prepared in order to properly evaluate those resources).

In the text of the report, the following considerations should be given:

- * For bridges evaluated in the latest historic bridge inventory, provide appropriate references to the inventory and the recommendations made in the inventory.
- * For properties listed in the National Register of Historic Places, provide appropriate references to when the property was listed and under what criterion. Provide a brief analysis of whether maintenance of the National Register listing is appropriate.

This new guidance will be included in an updated Cultural Resources Manual, to be released later this year.

Archaeological Short Report: In an effort to reduce time and paper, the DHPA archaeological staff, with the assistance of the INDOT CRS archaeological staff, has developed an Archaeological Short Report format. This format may be used for archaeological records checks

It has been brought to our attention that occasionally consulting parties are not always copied when consultants communicate with SHPO. Please remember to keep Consulting Parties abreast of any changes in the project. The goal is to keep Consulting Parties involved as decisions are being made, not after they are made. This includes responses to SHPO comments or other substantive discussions with SHPO. Please see p. 28 of the INDOT Cultural Resources Manual for additional guidance on this topic. The manual can be found on the INDOT Cultural Resources website.

Cultural Resources Section 106 Tips and Reminders:

- Feel free to run any correspondence and documents related to the process by the INDOT Cultural Resources Section for review before sending them out. INDOT-CRS review of certain items first, such as historic property and archaeology reports, is required, but we are always available to provide comments on other documents as the process unfolds. We try to provide input on how to make the review as smooth as possible.
- Always clearly inform INDOT-CRS and the SHPO which consulting parties are receiving the information for review either through a cc list on the letter or an attachment of names of all parties that received the information.
- All correspondence should clearly indicate the current step of the Section 106 process. If you would like INDOT-CRS, the SHPO, and/or consulting party comments on an APE, eligibility determinations, or effect (or even all three in one submission on simple projects), the letter should ask for comments on those specific items.
- Public notices to fulfill Section 106 public involvement requirements should state the appropriate agency undertaking the project, either INDOT or the LPA. Notices for LPA projects

should not state that INDOT is undertaking the project. We realize the public notice template in the Cultural Resources Manual might not be clear on this point, and it will be revised in 2009.

• The contact person for public notices should be the consultant conducting the Section 106 process. INDOT-CRS or the District environmental sections should not be listed unless you have arranged with these offices first for them to be the contact person. The contact person should be someone familiar with the project that is able to answer questions related to the Section 106 process.
