A rain garden is a landscaping feature using native perennial (a plant that normally lives more than two growing seasons and, after an initial period, produces flowers annually) plants. The garden is used to manage storm water runoff from improve local water quality while establishing a beautiful natural area that will attract birds, butterflies, and other waddle. Rain pardens allow rain and snowmelt to seep naturally into the ground. This helps recharge our groundwater supply, and prevents erosion and polluted storm water runoff. Rain gardens are an important way to make our cities and towns more attractive places to live, while benefiting the wildlife. (IASWCD Website - Pathway to Water Quality)

Cearborn County SWCD's business plan has the objectives of reducing erosion and non-point source pollution on urban sites, educating citizens on soil and water conservation and all natural resource protection, and enhancing and improving the wildlife habitat in Dearborn County. This cost-share program will met those objectives. The SWCD will offer a cost share program to all Dearborn County landowners with 75% paid through CWI and 25% paid by the landowner, with a maximum cost share of \$1000. Rain gardens collect storm water ranoff and remove pollutants through filtration. This is accomplished through absorption, attration, plant uptake, microbial activity, decomposition, sedimentation, and voiatitization (Indiana Storm Whiter Quality Manual). According to the Indiana Storm Water Quality Manual. Pan gardens remove 70% - 33% total physpherus. 93% - 98% of metals (Cn. 2n. Ph), 58% - 80% total Kjeldahl nitrogen (TKN), 90% of local suspended solids, 90% of organics, and 90% of bacteria.

Due to our part-time employee taking a job with FSA, we would like to request a change for our 109 CWI grant. Our part-time employee was in charge of carrying out this program. With him being no longer with us, we felt that we needed to review our grant proposal and decided we needed to change our grant request.

After much discussion and review, we have come to the conclusion that we would like to include a cost share program for cover crop installation to our original grant proposal. We do not feel that we will be able to generate enough interest in time to take full advantage of the first proposal by the time we are able to hire a new employee. Since we have already advertised in our Affiliate News that we were offering the buffer filter strip program, we felt that we could not just drop it, but felt we needed to add another option to use our funds and benefit more producers in our area.

This addition also addresses several of our local concerns listed in our Plan of Work. (Soil Erosion, Water Quality-Surface Water-Excessive Suspended Sediment & Turbidity, Water Quality-Ground Water-Excessive Sutrients and Organic.)

We already have a workshop set up for Feb. 26 with one of the topics being addressed. "Value of Cover Crops, Crop Residue & Nutrient Management", presented by Dr. Jim Camberato, Purdue Agronomy Dept.

We are submitting a revision of our proposal and hope that you will agree that this is a good addition to our previous grant. We strongly feel that this addition will help put more conservation on the land and help to promote the "We All Live Downstream" initiative.

White County SWCD proposes the offering of technical and financial assistance to landowners, both agricultural and non-agricultural, for the installation of vegetated barriers to control nutrient and sediment movement.

Fligible sites would be those which do not currently qualify for USDA or other programs, and might include field borders, drain inlet protection, roadside ditches and conservation cover plantings of cool season grasses, particularly at property lines.

Il maneial assistance would consist of the purchase of seed, and a \$200 per acre incentive to compensate for other installation costs, crop loss, etc. Technical assistance would be provided by existing SWCD staff, funded partially by CWI funds, matched by SWCD and County funds.

Key steps and benchmarks in the process would include publicizing the program to indentify willing landowners with eligible sites in addition to those already known, prioritizing sites, determining suitable seed mixes for sites selected, and assuring timely and effective planting. Incentive payment would be made at the time of seeding.

The ultimate desired outcome is to move water more effectively and with less harm to the land, in areas where practices such as grassed waterways are expensive and difficult to engineer and install, and where conventional filter strips are often ineffective, as along regulated drains, due to their high levees and spoil banks. Many of the known sites are along property boundaries, offering the opportunity for adjacent landowners to cooperate in managing drainage and runoff issues to mutual advantage.

This is a sediment and nutrient reduction and crosion control program and will be managed as such. Any associated wildlife benefits will be purely incidental.

We would also like to offer cost-share assistance for the establishment of cover crops. We have already set up a soil workshop with a session on the value of cover crops. We plan to use NRCS job; sheets and standards to assist us in setting up the criteria for this program.

We hope by offering two choices, we will be able to meet more producers' needs






CREP Landowner Contracts August 2006 - February 2009

CWI-ECAP Decisions made by the SSCB "CWI Grant Sub Committee"

The Clean Water Indiana Grant Sub Committee would like to report on their decisions regarding the open round of Clean Water Indiana-Emergency Conservation Assistance Program (CWI-ECAP). Thirty-one districts applied for over \$2.3 million dollars in assistance. This amount of interest shows the board that there is still need for disaster assistance throughout the state. As a side note the subcommittee would like to recognize the 11 districts that sent letters of intent but did not go ahead and submit full applications as this demonstrates to the board their understanding of the limited amount of funding, and that other districts may be in need of more funding than they are. The sub-committee appreciated those 11 districts consideration in ensuring funds were utilized where they needed the most.

The CWI Grant Sub Committee meet and decided to award funds to 14 SWCD's in addition to the 3 awards already made to Elkhart, Porter and LaPorte counties. A total of 17 SWCD's will receive CWI-ECAP funds ranging from \$600-\$28,189.28 Decisions were made based on ISDA's internal assessment of damage and needs yet to be addressed and compared that information with what districts were proposing in their applications. In order to maximize the use of funding the CWI grant Sub-Committee did go through and make some line item decisions on applications. To be consistent the sub-committee is not allowing those districts awarded CWI-ECAP funds to use funds for Administrative purposes, Education/Outreach activities, new cover crops, and practices that would prevent future potential disasters. The sub-committee also determined that awarded districts should not offer cost shares or reimbursements over 50% and districts should ensure all eligible ECP landowners receive funds through ECP and not CWI-ECAP.

Contracts and memos regarding this information on the use of awarded funds will be sent out to the 17 CWI-ECAP awardees.



Farm Bill Update

USDA released several conservation program regulations that reflect changes made in the 2008 Farm Bill (The Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008). The regulations are effective immediately, and NRCS is soliciting comments and recommended changes over the next few weeks. Regulations are available for review and comment for the following programs:

- State Technical Committees, comments by 1/26
- Healthy Forests Reserve Program, comments by 2/13
- Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), comments by 3/16
- Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP), comments by 3/16
- Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP), comments by 3/17
- Farm and Ranchland Protection Program (FRPP), comments by 3/17
- Technical Service Provider (TSP), comments by 3/17
- Grasslands Reserve Program (GRP), comments by 3/23

NRCS has issued a Request for Proposals for the **Agricultural Water Enhancement Program** (**AWEP**). AWEP was established in the new farm bill to promote ground and surface water conservation and water quality improvement. NRCS has announced that up to \$58.4 million in financial assistance is available for AWEP nationally. Proposals must be submitted by March 2, 2009. The AWEP Request for Proposals can also be viewed at the Federal Register Web site.

NRCS has issued an Announcement for Program Funding for the FY2009 Conservation Innovation Grants (CIG) Program. The purpose of these grants is to stimulate the development and adoption of innovative conservation approaches and technologies, and \$20 million is available for nationwide competition. The CIG program does not fund research projects, and requires a 50 percent match. Proposals must be received by March 2, 2009. Additional information on the program is available at http://www.nrcs.usda.gov/programs/cig/.

SWCDs are encouraged to bring their Local Working Groups together in preparation for including local resource concerns in Farm Bill program rankings. In addition, as NRCS provides news releases on individual programs, we appreciate SWCD assistance in getting the word out to local media and landowners.

NRCS Excellence in Conservation Award

NRCS has achieved many conservation successes through the work of its partners. In order to acknowledge their good work, the annual NRCS Excellence in Conservation Award was developed to recognize the valuable contributions that non-federal government individuals or groups make to conserve natural resources on private land. Any non-federal individual, group, tribe or organization is eligible for nomination by a NRCS employee, and this year's applications must be submitted by **February 23, 2009.** Anyone interested in submitting an application should contact Jill Reinhart, ASTC for Outreach & Communications, at jill.reinhart@in.usda.gov.
