



### **Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program**

- Work on the expansion of the CREP program is continuing:
  - These last two months I have been working to try and get a company lined up to complete the required Programmatic Environmental Assessment (PEA). There has been a delay on this.
  - ISDA's goal for the program expansion to start is in the first quarter of the calendar year 2024, but it will all depend on the completion of the required PEA and also on the approval of our contract with the FSA.
  - A letter was sent to all of the SWCD offices in early August to gauge the interest of the SWCDs in being a CREP Administrating District for the new CREP watersheds. Interest from the SWCDs around the state included 30 districts. The final selection of the Administrating SWCDs will be made at the discretion of the SSCB at the January Board meeting.
- Approximate acres signed up this calendar year are 1,504 acres.
- Attached to this report is the usual report showing the current status of acres and dollars in CREP, including total completed acres and total enrolled acres since the beginning of the program, and total dollars paid out through the CREP program.
- To date, the state has paid out more than \$10.9 million. For every state dollar that is spent, the federal match is approximately \$4-\$13 for every state dollar, which is currently between \$43.5 million and \$141.5 million of federal dollars depending on the practice.






### **SWCD Annual Financial Reports**


- The updated SWCD annual financial reporting process received a Best of Indiana Award at the Indiana Digital Government Summit.
- The Best of Indiana awards honor state and local technology projects that improve business functions/processes and citizen experience.
- ISDA was honored in the Best Application Serving the Public- State Government
  category, which is awarded to individuals and teams that have designed, developed, and
  deployed applications or improved existing applications that deliver services more
  effectively to the public or other external stakeholders. The award focuses on how
  applications effectively increase the transparency or accessibility of services.
- The award committee particularly appreciated that payments were processed more effectively, and that the data was used in multiple ways.

# October 24, 2023 Nutrient Stewardship Updates, Breegan Andersen

### **Program Updates**

### **Gulf Hypoxia Program (GHP)**

- Indiana's Mississippi River Basin Soil Sampling Program officially launched on September 22, 2023.
- This program covers Indiana watersheds within the Mississippi River Basin and excludes the WLEB and Lake Michigan Basins. This is due to federal statutory language associated with the funds.
- The program webpage has been published and can be found on the <u>ISDA website</u>.
- As of Oct. 19, 2023, there have been 85 farms sign up representing an estimated 6,200 acres across Indiana's potion of the Mississippi River Basin. Most participants have indicated they have never sampled before or haven't sampled in over 4 years.
- We continue working on developing a new procurement process with the State to reduce the burden
  of the contracting process. Making it more efficient for Ag Retailer and Certified Crop Advisor
  participation.
- We are anticipating pausing new sign-ups at the end of October because of the high volume of interest and sign-ups received.
- This is still all very fluid and subject to change as we continue to move forward.

#### **CWI Audit Report**

Each year Clean Water Indiana Grants are reviewed by ISDA staff to determine any issues the grant may be dealing with. This past year 7 grants were reviewed around the state with no major issues or findings. Among the 7 grants, \$512,000 of funded Clean Water Indiana Funds have been used to fund various projects around the state. An additional \$462,000 in cash match and in-kind have been used to get conservation on the ground in Indiana. Grant reviews will be discussed in February to conduct more audits in 2024. Thanks to all of the District Support Specialist and Resource Specialist who conducted these reviews this past year.

Comments from grant reports regarding what grantees like about the CWI Program include........

- -" Additional staffing positions are possible because of the CWI Program."
- -"Helps new employees learn various partners and their roles."
- -" It's much easier to work with than the Federal programs. The application process is easier. It fills in niches that other programs don't quite match. It's not a whole farm plan, but we can go in and make a measurable difference with one practice/relative small amount of cost share dollars."
- -" Puts conservation on the ground. Protect our water resources from nutrient runoff. It was a great way for us to meet grain farmers and guys with livestock."
- -" Fills in the gap for those not funded with USDA programs. CWI has the ability to have a quick turnaround from application to payment. Able to be creative with practices when applying for grants. Staff grant helped bring in several other grants and funds with the extra help."



Indiana Farm Service Agency issued a total of \$40,106,008.00 in fiscal year 2023 in Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) annual payments, cost share, and incentive payments. This is a \$189,592.00 increase from fiscal year 2022.

Due to the expiration of the 2018 Farm Bill, FSA, currently has no authority to process any CRP offers and approval of all CRP contracts for all signup types after September 30, 2023. FSA is currently awaiting new authority to deliver CRP when it becomes law. Effective October 1,2023, FSA will not approve any CRP contracts for all signup types and will not process offers for enrollment in CRP for all signup types. Contracts approved by COB September 30, 2023, will continue to receive annual rental and cost-share payments, and signing incentive and practice incentive payments, as applicable.

Unfortunately, with the expiration of the Farm Bill, our staff cannot discuss any policy about CRP practices which includes, incentives, technical specs, cost-share, etc. with any customer interested in new CRP. All Indiana COF's have been instructed to keep a register of interested persons with their contact information and a map showing the area they are interested in, and our staff will contact these customers as soon as possible when we receive a new Farm Bill or a Farm Bill extension. This will be extremely frustrating for our field staff and customers, but we cannot risk providing current policy to potential customers when it could possibly change with a new farm Bill.

FSA continues to work with ISDA regarding an updated Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) agreement. We are currently waiting for ISDA to complete the environmental requirements. Once this process is complete, Indiana FSA will work with ISDA to submit the final plan for National FSA Office approval. The goal is to allow all watersheds in Indiana to become eligible for CREP for a total of around 100,000 acres. The current CREP agreement has eleven designated watersheds for a total of 26,250 acres. If passed, this new agreement will increase the eligible acres in Indiana by 380%. Indiana FSA appreciates the commitment and partnership with ISDA during this process.

#### INDIANA STATE CONSERVATIONIST

We are pleased to announce Mrs. Damarys Mortenson as the newest Indiana State Conservationist. Mrs. Mortenson is a native of Mayaguez, Puerto Rico where she earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Agricultural Mechanization (Engineering) Technology from the University of Puerto Rico, Mayaguez campus. Before being selected as state conservationist for Indiana, Mrs. Mortenson served as the assistant state conservationist for management and strategy, headquartered in West Virginia.

Mrs. Mortenson began her career with NRCS in 1992 as a soil conservationist trainee in Iowa and quickly moved through the ranks. She served as district conservationist in Iowa and Wisconsin and later moved to Michigan to become an area resource conservationist. In 2012, Mrs. Mortenson moved back to Iowa as assistant state conservationist for field operations. Mrs. Mortenson went on to serve as the state resource conservationist in West Virginia in 2016 before transitioning into the assistant state conservationist for management and strategy. Mrs. Mortenson has been with USDA-NRCS for 31 years.

In her free time, Mrs. Mortenson likes to travel, sew and quilt. She and her husband of 30 years, Kevin, have three adult children. Her start date is still being finalized.

### **CONSERVATION INNOVATION GRANTS (CIG)**

CIG is a competitive grants program. Through creative problem solving and innovation, CIG partners work to address water quality, water quantity, air quality, soil health and wildlife habitat challenges, all while improving agricultural operations. Two separate CIG funding opportunities are now available on grants.gov: \$50 million through CIG On-Farm Trials and \$15 million is available through CIG Classic.

For CIG On-Farm Trials, this year's funding priorities are:

- Irrigation water management technologies
- Nutrient management
- Feeding management and enteric methane reduction
- Grazing lands
- Soil health demonstration trials

For CIG Classic, this year's funding priorities are:

- Forestry
- Habitat conservation and restoration for wildlife and invertebrates
- Managing agricultural lands to improve local water quality
- Energy conservation
- Economics
- Strengthening conservation through indigenous knowledge

This opportunity is open to all domestic non-federal entities and individuals based in the United States. Strong consideration will be given to proposals that include Historically Underserved entities and individuals. Applications are being accepted now through October 30, 2023.

#### AGRICULTURAL CONSERVATION EASEMENT PROGRAM

### Agricultural Land Easements (ALE)

ACEP's Agricultural Land Easements (ALE) not only protect the long-term viability of the nation's food supply by preventing conversion of productive working lands to non-agricultural uses, they also support environmental quality, wildlife habitat, historic preservation and protection of open spaces. State and local governments, non-governmental organizations and Native American Tribes that have farmland or grassland protection programs are eligible to partner with NRCS and individual landowners to protect farmland through easements. Eligible entities must submit applications for ALE's current funding pool on or before January 17, 2024.

### Wetland Reserve Easements (WRE)

Wetland reserve easements (WRE) allow landowners to successfully restore, enhance and protect habitat for wildlife on their lands, reduce damage from flooding, recharge groundwater and provide outdoor recreational and educational opportunities. Eligible landowners can choose to enroll in a permanent or 30-year easement. This announcement include ACEP-Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (ACEP-GRLI) Eligible entities must submit applications for WRE's current funding pool on or before November 17.

### Wetland Reserve Easement Program (WREP)

WREP is part of the Wetland Reserve Easement (WRE) component of the Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP). WREP enables local conservation partners to provide leadership and expertise to assist NRCS with acquiring and restoring private wetlands that have been previously altered for agricultural production. WREP easements can be enrolled as 30-year or perpetual, based on the landowners desired management of the offered property. Compensation rates are based on county location.

The Lower Wabash River and White River Oxbow project, led by The Nature Conservancy (TNC), seeks to enroll 1,000 acres into wetland easements in parts of Knox, Gibson and Posey counties in Indiana and Gallatin, White, Edwards and Wabash counties in Illinois. This project aims to build on existing efforts of local partnerships between NRCS, TNC and the Conservation Law Center to enroll historically underserved landowners in areas like Lyle's Station, which was settled in the early 1800's and is one of the last remaining Black American settlements in the state. The project focus is to reduce nutrient export from the Wabash River and to improve important habitat around priority oxbow lakes for monarch butterflies, migratory birds and large river fish species.

WREP applications may be submitted at any time to NRCS; however, applications for the current funding round must be submitted on or before the closing date – <u>November 17.</u>

### NATURAL RESOURCE INVENTORY DATA COLLECTION

NRI is the National Resources Inventory, a statistical survey of land use and natural resource conditions and trends on U.S. non-Federal lands. Information collected includes the status, condition, and trends of land, soil, water, and related resources on the non-federal lands. The sampling units are areas of land called "segments", within which detailed data on soil properties and land use are collected at a random sample of points. Indiana's NRI data collection will begin on <a href="September 1">September 1</a>, 2023, and run through until the end of <a href="January 2024">January 2024</a>. The soils staff at the state office will collect the data. Field office staff and FSA may be contacted to provide producer-specific information, such as, tillage practices, conservation plans, cropping history, etc.

During the summer, a Pasture NRI study is also done. The main difference between the pasture NRI and the regular NRI is points are only on active grazing land and a lot more detailed information is collected at each point. Producers are usually interested in the statistics of forages and plants found on their site.
