- **Spanned Heroin & Prescription Opioid deaths from 2008-2012**

Collecting Violent Death Information Using the National Violent Death Reporting System (NVDRS)

**CDC Grant Funding Opportunity
Application due June 24, 2014**

NVDRS grant opportunity

- **Purpose: To create and implement a plan to collect and disseminate accurate, timely, and comprehensive surveillance data on violent deaths**
 - **Suicide**
 - **Homicide**
 - **Undetermined Intent**
 - **Unintentional Firearm Death**
- **Goal: Understand circumstances of violent death for prevention purposes**

Four primary activities:

- 1. Create and update a plan to implement INVDRS in Indiana**
- 2. Collect and abstract comprehensive data on violent deaths from:**
 - Death Certificates
 - Coroner reports
 - Law enforcement records
 - Child Fatality Review (Optional Module)

Four primary activities:

- 3. Disseminate INVDRS data to stakeholders, the public, and CDC's multi-state database**
- 4. Explore innovative methods of collecting, reporting, and sharing data for improved timeliness and greater utilization of data for prevention efforts.**

Year 1 Pilot

- **Collect violent death data from Child Death Review & Vital Records**
- **Collect deaths that occurred in 6 counties:**
 - **Marion, Allen, Lake, Vanderburgh, St. Joseph, and Madison**
- **Link related violent deaths that occurred within 24 hours**
 - **Multiple homicides, suicide pacts, suicide/homicides**
- **Remaining years collect all violent deaths in IN**

Prescription Drug Overdose- Boost for State Prevention

CDC Grant Funding Opportunity

Funding Activities

- Enhance and maximize prescription drug monitoring program (INSPECT)
- Evaluate Laws, Policies, Regulations Implemented in Indiana
 - Medical Licensing Board's Opioid Prescribing rule
 - Liability Protection for Naloxone Prescribers and First Responders

Enhance & Maximize INSPECT

- **Support the Indiana Pharmacy Board's expansion for the capacity and application of INSPECT**
- **Activities:**
 - Increase number of linkages through Health Information Exchanges to electronic health records
 - Unsolicited reporting of PDMP data
 - Reduce data reporting interval to INSPECT
 - Maintaining INSPECT Data Integrity

Evaluate Laws, Policies, & Regulations

- Evaluate the change in physician prescribing practices as a result of the opioid prescribing rule and supporting educational initiatives
- Activities:
 - Evaluations to strengthen available evidence around RX drug laws and policies
 - Recommendations to strengthen policy implementation and impact to inform other states

Tentative IPAC Terms of Reference Document, June 2014

**Indiana Injury Prevention Advisory Council
Terms of Reference Document for 2014-2015**

ARTICLE 1 – NAME, VISION & MISSION

The name shall be the INDIANA INJURY PREVENTION ADVISORY COUNCIL. A short title shall be the “Indiana IPAC” for this document.

Our **Vision** is:

Working together to create a safe and injury free Indiana.

Our **Mission** is:

To reduce the number and severity of preventable injuries in Indiana through leadership and advocacy.

ARTICLE 2 – MEMBERSHIP, RESPONSIBILITIES & VOTING

Section 1. Membership:

Indiana IPAC shall consist of Council members and Chairperson(s). The members of Indiana IPAC shall include at least one member from each of the following categories:

- hospitals and trauma centers;
- physicians, nurses, and emergency medical services providers across the lifespan to include representatives with pediatric, adolescent, adult and geriatric focus;
- the university system, research facilities, and area health education centers;
- injury prevention advocacy groups and non-profit agencies;
- law enforcement;
- injury prevention specialists and health educators working in areas such as epidemiology, motor vehicle safety, water and boating safety, and poisoning prevention;
- state agencies, offices or commissions with responsibilities related to injury prevention; and
- two members from the Indiana State Department of Health, including one member from the Division of Maternal Child Health and one member from the Division of Trauma and Injury Prevention
- county health departments.

Section 2. Member responsibilities:

- Provide the Indiana IPAC with representation from their agency or organization.
- Promote the Indiana IPAC to injury stakeholders and colleagues as appropriate.
- Advocate for the Indiana IPAC, its vision, mission and its goals.
- Actively participate in meetings and events sponsored by the Indiana IPAC.
- Actively participate on committees based on member availability and interest.

Section 3. Voting:

- A simple majority of the members of the Indiana IPAC participating at the meeting shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE 3 – PURPOSE, GOALS & OBJECTIVES

Section 1. Purpose

Recognizing that, because of the incomparable cost and the disabling and disrupting consequences, injury and violence remain major public health problems in Indiana, this Council is committed to strengthening and sustaining effective injury and violence prevention and control measures that reflect the significance of the problem.

Section 2. GOALS

- Assess needs and increase availability and quality of injury data in Indiana including improving external cause of injury coding (e-codes).
- Build infrastructure and sustainability for injury prevention in Indiana.
- Promote injury prevention as a public health priority in Indiana.
- Promote evidence-based injury prevention programs throughout Indiana.
- Increase statewide collaboration around injury prevention in Indiana.
- Build the capacity of communities, especially underserved populations, to develop and implement effective injury prevention programs (and to emphasize diversity)
- Build community capacity to reduce and prevent injuries to high-risk groups and effectively address injury priorities
- Strengthen advocacy for public policies that impact injury prevention
- Draft, implement, evaluate and revise the Injury Prevention Strategic Plan

Section 3. OBJECTIVES

- Create action steps for each recommendation
- Review injury surveillance data
- Identify existing effective state injury prevention programs and policies
- Identify and prioritize state injury problems
- Provide input to the Injury Prevention Strategic Plan
- Identify evidence based interventions, potential implementing partners, resources and funding sources.
- Participate as members on injury prevention boards and commissions.
- Establish a statewide resource system for injuries
- Generate income for injury prevention in Indiana

ARTICLE 4- SCOPE & BOUNDARIES

The Indiana IPAC will address intentional and unintentional injuries across the lifespan. The Indiana IPAC will address injuries without regard to race, color, creed, national origin, sex, age or physical or mental disability. Indiana IPAC will strive to decrease the injury health disparities that exist within the State.

ARTICLE 5- AUTHORITY

The Indiana Injury Prevention Advisory Council is an independent group of injury prevention experts and concerned citizens representing state and private agencies dedicated to moving injury prevention efforts forward in the State of Indiana.

ARTICLE 6- DELIVERABLES

Injury Prevention Strategic Plan

ARTICLE 7-BENEFITS of MEMBERSHIP

- Access to injury information
- Injury prevention education and training
- Visibility for injury prevention programs
- Involvement in support of better policy development
- Resources, funding and training opportunities
- Coordination of efforts
- Building effective advocacy groups
- Interaction with multi-disciplinary partners
- Building injury prevention capacity through shared goals, efforts and participation

ARTICLE 8- AMENDMENTS

A written recommendation to repeal or amend the Terms of Reference Document by five or more members of Indiana IPAC will be needed to bring the matter up for a vote by the Indiana IPAC .
