

## FIGG Volunteer Testing Information

Forensic Investigative Genetic Genealogy (FIGG) is an investigative technique to generate leads in unsolved violent crimes or unidentified human remains cases where DNA is present but remains unidentified. The unidentified DNA profile is searched in public databases accessible for law enforcement searching to attempt to identify a person of interest. Lists of potential relatives of the individual are generated and a genealogist builds family trees utilizing public records to potentially identify the person of interest. There are situations when obtaining a DNA profile from a member of the potential family lineage can aid in building family trees and identifying or eliminating potential persons of interest. A volunteer DNA sample is collected to potentially aid in this process.

FIGG is reliant on trust, support and participation by members of the public. The following information is provided to help the volunteer understand how their DNA data is used and what steps are taken to ensure their privacy.

#### Common Questions and Concerns:

1. What will the volunteer's profile be used for? The volunteer's profile will be used to aid in the genetic genealogical investigation of an unsolved violent crime or unidentified human remains case. The profile will be uploaded to a public genealogy database accessible for law enforcement searching to determine how they are related to the person of interest; this may aid in building family trees and identifying or eliminating potential candidates in a case.

The profile will <u>not</u> be entered into the Combined DNA Index System (CODIS) or any other law enforcement databases.

What options are available for testing?A direct-to-consumer DNA testing kit may be provided

A direct-to-consumer DNA testing kit may be provided by the investigating agency. It is recommended that the investigative agency provides a Family Tree DNA (FTDNA) Family Finder™ kit. It is also recommended that the investigator assist in completing the kit and mailing it to FTDNA. Instructions are provided with the FTDNA Family Finder™ kit for collection and account creation. The volunteer must opt-in for

"Investigative Genetic Genealogy Matching (IGGM)" during account set-up for their profile to be searched by law enforcement. The volunteer must share their email



used for upload or FTDNA Family Finder™ kit number for future identification in any match list.

If FTDNA Family Finder™ kits are unavailable, another direct-to-consumer genetic testing kit can be utilized such as AncestryDNA®. Law enforcement can contact the FIGG team at the laboratory if help is needed to acquire a kit.

If another testing company is utilized, the volunteer MUST upload their genetic profile to GEDmatch and opt-in for law enforcement searching (see #4). Individuals testing with FTDNA Family Finder™ kits are highly encouraged to also take this step. (See GEDmatch Download and Upload Instructions.)

3. Are there any concerns the volunteer should be aware of if submitting a kit to FTDNA?

If the volunteer would like to learn more about their ancestry, ethnicity, or potential genetic relatives, they can access their results after FTDNA has completed processing their kit. It should be noted, however, that this type of DNA testing can reveal previously unknown information about their genetic relatives that could potentially be traumatic and may cause difficulties within a family (e.g. adoptions, non-paternity, gamete donation, illegitimacy, etc.). The volunteer can choose to submit a kit to FTDNA and then never access the results of the testing.

- 4. What if a volunteer has already tested with DNA?

  If an individual has already taken a DNA test through a direct-to-consumer company like AncestryDNA®, etc., they must download their data and then upload it to GEDmatch to assist law enforcement. (See GEDmatch Download and Upload Instructions.) It is recommended that the investigator assists in this process if possible. The GEDmatch kit number and/or email address should be provided for future identification in any match list. When uploading to GEDmatch, the individual MUST opt-in for law-enforcement searching for their DNA data to be accessible.
- 5. Is there any follow-up that should happen after a volunteer has mailed their Family Finder™ kit to FTDNA?

Yes! It is recommended that the investigator follow-up to confirm the kit number and to ensure that the individual did opt-in to "Investigative Genetic Genealogy Matching (IGGM)." The volunteer may also be encouraged to upload their data from FTDNA to GEDmatch as described above.



6. What identifying information will be associated with the volunteer's DNA data, and who has access to that identifying information?

An individual that collected their own FTDNA Family Finder™ kit (with assistance from the investigator) will be able to determine what information is associated with that kit number in FTDNA when setting up their account. Please remember that another user of that database will view contact information such as the associated email.

No identifying information or contact information will be released by the Indiana State Police to anyone outside of the investigation except pursuant to court order or as required by law.

7. What happens to a volunteer's data after a case is complete?

Any individual who voluntarily uploaded their own DNA testing results to GEDmatch and/or FTDNA and opted-in to law enforcement is in control of these results.





#### 2 Download DNA Data

- Find section "Test Management" and click "Download DNA
   Data"
- check the box and enter your password





#### 3 Confirm Data Download

- Go to your email inbox and click the Ancestry email you just received. Simply select "Confirm Data Download"
- Clicking the link takes you to your Ancestry page select "Download DNA Raw Data"







#### B. Family Tree DNA (FTDNA) Download


IMPORTANT! Individuals who have tested with FTDNA can choose to opt-in for law enforcement searching through FTDNA. Individuals may also download their data from FTDNA and then upload to GEDmatch as shown below.

- 1. Opt-in for law enforcement searching through FTDNA
  - a. Navigate to "Privacy & Sharing" under "Account Settings."
  - b. Toggle "Opt in to IGGM" to "On."






- 2. Download data from FTDNA for upload to GEDmatch
  - a. Log into FTDNA.
  - b. Click on "Results & Tools," "Autosomal DNA," and "Download Raw Data."



c. Click on "Build 37 Concatenated."

- click "submit request"

Sometimes they take a little bit of time to arrive so don't worry if you don't get one right away! Once you do, click on the link and download the zip file.








## 2 Download Data

• The link will take you to the MyHeritage site. Enter your password and click 'Download' Please note: MyHeritage Files only download on Android and PC devices.






## Part II- Upload Existing DNA Data to GEDmatch

#### A. Create a GEDmatch account

IMPORTANT! The individual should be encouraged to share their GEDmatch kit number for future identification in any match list.

1. Click on "JOIN FOR FREE" at https://www.gedmatch.com/.






2. Click on "Sign up."



3. Fill in information to create an account. Accept the Terms and Conditions and Privacy Policy.

## How to Upload Your DNA to GEDmatch

1 Log into GEDmatch



2 Click on "Generic uploads (23andMe, FTDNA, AncestryDNA, most others)"

## Provide as much information as you can in the form

If you're not familiar with your mitochondrial haplogroup or Y haplogroup, don't worry – you can leave these fields blank. However, do provide the name of your testing company. This is really useful when working with shared matches, as you may be able to glean good information from their family trees on the source site.





## 4 Fill in your consent

You can choose what level of privacy you would like for your DNA kit. Simply select the option you prefer.

After that, scroll down a bit and follow these steps:

- Click on the "Browse" or "Choose File" button at the bottom of the page
- Find the title of the raw data you just downloaded from the testing company (23AndMe or Ancestry etc)
- · Hint: look for the correct download date
- Find the title at the bottom of the page; highlight it and then click on "open" You can now see the title next to your GEDmatch browse button



IMPORTANT! For DNA data to be accessible to help narrow a search for a potential candidate in a criminal case, "Opt-in" <u>must</u> be selected. DNA data can still be used to help narrow a search for unidentified human remains if "Opt-out" is selected.

5 Click the upload button and wait until you see the word "Finish"





6 Wait for the processing to finish

It may take up to 24 hours for all the features and functionality to become available after you upload your DNA. Please give the website some time to finish processing your data.
