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Evansville Attorney Diane L. Bender Appointed to Supreme Court Disciplinary Commission

Attorney Diane Louise Bender of Evansville, Ind. was appointed to the Disciplinary Commission of the Supreme Court of Indiana, Chief Justice Randall T. Shepard announced today.

She will serve a five-year term beginning on July 1, 1999. She replaces attorney Barbara Williams, of Evansville, who was originally appointed in 1989.

"It is vital that the Disciplinary Commission have members who are of high moral character but who also understand the challenges faced on a daily basis by Indiana lawyers. Ms. Bender is well qualified on both counts," said Chief Justice Shepard.

Ms. Bender earned her law degree in 1980 from the Notre Dame Law School. She is a solo practitioner. Her practice includes estate planning, probate matters and trust administration. In 1992 she became the first woman to serve as president of the Evansville Bar Association.

The nine-member Disciplinary Commission investigates complaints against attorneys and prosecutes them when there is a reasonable belief an attorney has engaged in misconduct. All members of the Disciplinary Commission are appointed by the Court, which has the final say in all attorney discipline matters. At least two of the nine members of the Disciplinary Commission must be non-lawyers. Members receive no salary for their service.

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High Court to Broadcast Argument Via Internet and Satellite

For the first time in its history, the Indiana Supreme Court will webcast an oral argument over the Internet and broadcast it via satellite, Chief Justice Randall T. Shepard announced today. Chief Justice Shepard said the Court is hosting this project on a trial basis to determine if the Court should make these broadcasts available on a regular basis.

"All five of us on the Court are very excited about this project. We feel it can extend the reach of the Court tremendously and bring the work we do closer to the people. For three years now, television news cameras have been a regular part of our courtroom. It only makes sense to try this technology as well," he said.

The argument to be broadcast will be held in the Supreme Court Courtroom on July 14, 1999. It will begin at 9:30 a.m. and last about one hour. Broadcast will be delayed until 4 p.m. The case, *Indiana Bell Telephone Co., et al. v. Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission, et al.*, involves a recent Commission decision. The Commission ruled it had the authority to review and approve a proposed stock exchange and merger between Ameritech and SBC Communications, Inc. Both companies have challenged the Commission's decision and have asked the Supreme Court to resolve the dispute.

INTERNET ACCESS

There will be two webcasts: 4 p.m. and 6 p.m. C.S.T. After the first two webcasts, archived versions will be available on demand. It is recommended that users download the viewing software well in advance of the 4 p.m. and 6 p.m. webcasts to avoid system delays. 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Supreme Court Justice Myra C. Selby to Step Down from Bench

Myra C. Selby, Indiana's 103rd Supreme Court Justice and the first African-American and the first woman to serve on Indiana's highest court, will step down from the bench later this year, Indiana Chief Justice Randall T. Shepard announced today.

Justice Selby, who was appointed to the Supreme Court in 1995 by Gov. Evan Bayh, will leave the bench to pursue a career in Indianapolis in the private practice of law. Chief Justice Shepard said he and his colleagues deeply regret Justice Selby's coming departure but they remain unanimous in their support for her decision.

"This is a very sad time for the four of us. We will miss her friendship, her insight, and her sense of humor. But it is an even greater loss for the people of Indiana who have been so splendidly served by her dedication to the Court and to the principles of justice. As a justice on our Court, she has always been elegant, thoughtful, and energetic. Every one of us wishes her the very best."

Justice Selby is a 1977 graduate of Kalamazoo College and a 1980 graduate of the University of Michigan Law School. Upon graduation, she practiced labor and employment law in Washington D.C. After she moved to Indianapolis, she practiced health law for the firm of Ice Miller Donadio & Ryan, where she was named a partner. In 1993 she was appointed Director of Health Care Policy by Gov. Bayh. She is married to Bruce Curry and they have two children.

The seven-member Indiana Judicial Nominating Commission will search for Justice Selby's successor. Chaired by Chief Justice Shepard, the Commission will interview candidates in late summer and send the names of three candidates to Gov. Frank L. O'Bannon. He will select Indiana's next justice.

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Supreme Court to Hold Oral Argument in Kokomo

The five members of the Indiana Supreme Court will travel to Indiana University-Kokomo on September 22, 1999 to hear oral argument on a case pending before the Court.

Beginning at 10 a.m., the Court will hear arguments in *Oman v. State of Indiana* in the Kresge Auditorium in the Kelley Center in Kokomo, Ind.

Oman v. State of Indiana is a LaPorte County criminal case involving the suppression of a laboratory test in an impaired driving case. Firefighter Ronald Oman was driving a fire truck which collided with another fire truck in Michigan City in 1998. After the accident, Mr. Oman submitted to a drug test as required by the terms of his employment. The county prosecutor's office later subpoenaed the test results and charged Mr. Oman with operating a motor vehicle with a controlled substance (marijuana) in his blood. Before trial, the judge denied Mr. Oman's request to keep the results out of court. But the Indiana Court of Appeals, in an interlocutory appeal, reversed that decision and ruled the results should be kept out because they were improperly obtained. The State of Indiana is now asking the Indiana Supreme Court to vacate the Court of Appeals' decision. Each side will have 30 minutes to present their side of the case.

This event is hosted by the School of Public and Environmental Affairs and the Student Criminal Justice Section.

The Supreme Court will permit electronic recording devices into its oral arguments. A broad-based effort by the Indiana Supreme Court to comprehensively address race and gender fairness in the justice system begins today.

The Indiana Supreme Court Commission on Race and Gender Fairness will meet at 5 p.m. today in Room 317 of the State House. The newly created Commission is chaired by Myra C. Selby, the first female and the first African American to serve on the Indiana Supreme Court. She recently left the Indiana Supreme Court to reenter private law practice. The vice chairman of the Commission is Indiana Court of Appeals Judge Ezra Friedlander.

The Commission's mission is to study the status of race and gender fairness in Indiana's justice system and investigate ways to improve race and gender fairness in the courts, legal system, and state and local government, as well as among legal service providers and public organizations. The Commission will consist of 25 members representative of the Indiana judiciary, the practicing bar, academia, state and local government, public organizations, law enforcement and corrections.
