Newspapers are historical documents of the highest order because they provide official records of cultural memory.

Usually, newspaper "short runs" in the digital collections fill in the gaps in the Indiana State Library's microfilm or print collections. Sometimes, however, the cultural importance of a title requires that a quality digital scan is publicly available in addition to film.

The Indianapolis Leader was initiated by the Bagby brothers, James, Benjamin and Robert, in 1879. Two other African American titles sprung up in the city after reconstruction: The Freeman in 1884 and the Indianapolis Colored World in 1883, Local communities were responding to the fallout from the battle between federal protections and state's rights.

At the end of Grant's presidency in 1877, it was decided that the national government - in the form of the U.S. military - would no longer force state governments to keep polls open to men of color. For this reason, the voting rights that had helped several African American office holders win their seats were creatively - or violently revoked in many states, and representatives of color were ousted. The Black community responded by moving north and conveying ideas for political redemption through journalism.

The Bagby brothers added their motto to their masthead: "An Equal

The Mock Newbery program is a collaboration aimed at librarians, teachers and adult patrons with an interest in children's literature. It offers participants the opportunity to explore new genres, delve into the history and criteria of the Newbery Award, and build connections within the literary community.

Running monthly from June to December, the program will feature meetings at each of the participating libraries. Each session will last approximately one hour and provide participants with the chance to earn continued education credits, with LEU approval from the Indiana State Library for meetings from June through November.

The program kicks off in June with an introductory session covering the history of the Newbery Award, its criteria, and expectations for the Mock Newbery program. From July to November, participants will read and discuss two children's titles per month, evaluating their suitability for the prestigious Newbery Award.

The culmination of the program will be held in December, where participants will cast their votes for the most deserving title. For those unable to attend in person, a virtual option is available, and recordings of all meetings will be provided to registered participants for later viewing.

Meeting times, days and locations will be determined once registration is complete. Schedules, including titles of books being considered, will then be finalized and communicated to all participants.

Registration is required. The registration deadline is May 13th, 2024. The registration form can be found <u>here</u> or on the library's website.
