Dear Mr. McClarren:

I am glad to acknowledge receipt of your statement of acceptance as a regional depository for the State of Indiana. A countersigned copy of the acceptance of designation is enclosed for your files.

We suggest that you notify all depository libraries in the State of your new status, outlining the services you are able to offer them, what their relations with your library should be, how they should address requests for loan or reference service, and what they should do in case of publications retained for over five years that they no longer want to keep. A copy of special instructions is enclosed.

Beginning tomorrow July 31, your daily depository shipments will include all items listed on the shipping lists. It will therefore not be necessary for you to submit item cards for the publications not selected or for new items being added to the Classified List.

This Office is fully cognizant of the responsibility your organization is assuming and if we can assist you in any way do not hesitate to ask. We wish you every success in your new role.

Dear Mr. McClarren:

We are in receipt of a letter from the Honorable Vance Hartke naming your library as a regional depository for the State of Indiana. In accepting this designation the full import of the duties and responsibilities should be taken into consideration.

The law requires that depositories serving as a regional depository receive all new and revised Government publications authorized for distribution to depository libraries. It will be necessary to amend your selections to include all item numbers not currently included in your selections.

The law also requires that regional depositories, in addition to fulfilling the requirements of depository libraries, will retain at least one copy of all Government publications either in printed or microfacsimile form, except superseded publications and those issued later in bound form.

A regional depository must also, within the area it serves, provide interlibrary loan, reference service, and assistance for depository libraries in the disposal of unwanted Government publications as provided by Public Law No. 87-579.

If you desire that your library become a regional depository under these conditions, please sign both copies of the enclosed Acceptance of Designation and return them to this Office immediately.

A countersigned copy of the Acceptance will be returned to you together with suggestions in regard to your new status.

I certify that with the approval of the head of the library authority in the State and upon designation as a regional depository library by Senator R. Dear Mr. McClarren:

Thank you for your telephone inquiry earlier this week about the regional depository libraries provided for by the new Depository Library Act.

The provision for two regionals in each State was designated primarily to give adequate coverage to such States as New York, Illinois and perhaps others where there is a large metropolitan area, such as Chicago or New York City, which would be better served by a separate regional depository from that serving other areas of the State. Where this situation prevails, or in any other case as well, the two regional depositories may wish to split up the State, agreeing between themselves as to the areas in which each will provide the interlibrary loan and other assistance provided by the law to the other depositories. Designation of regional depositories by a Senator shall be after approval by the head of the library authority of the State.

When a library becomes a regional depository, we will automatically amend its selections to include thereafter all publications made available for depository distribution. At Chicago last week, it appeared that a few of my visitors (to whom I enjoyed talking) were under the impression that only the regional libraries would receive the non-Government Printing Office material to be made available under the new law. This is, of course, not the case, as this material will be offered for selection to all depositories, just as are the presently distributed publications. The only difference will be that regional depositories must accept and retain permanently all of the material, while other depositories may select any part and dispose of it as the law provides.

Regarding a number of requests I have had for the issuance of instructions to regional depositories, we feel that these libraries are assuming a real responsibility, which might even be a burden on them. We have no desire to add to their problems by being unduly restrictive. As you and all of the other librarians know, we are always ready to offer suggested courses of action and to help in any other way possible.

I enjoyed our meeting in Chicago and the opportunity to talk further with you by telephone. The desire of all of us to do the best possible job and the fine spirit of cooperation evidenced by all of those I have met, makes us more hopeful that we can provide the same good service under the expanded program as we have under the old law.

Please call on us whenever we can help.

Dear Mr. McClarren:

Thank you for your letter of October 24, 1962.

In order to be designated as a regional depository a library must make application for such designation to one of the two United States Senators from the State. Before doing so you must have the approval of the head of the State library authority (unless you are in that position yourself) who must first ascertain that the library is willing to fulfill all the requirements for regional depositories as given in Public Law 87-579. This approval and your own agreement to serve as a regional depository should be sent to the Senator as part of your application. The Senator then forwards them to this Office with a letter stating that he wishes to designate your library to be a regional depository for the State of Indiana. We will then write to you reiterating the requirements and enclosing an acceptance form in duplicate for you to sign. Upon return of the signed acceptance we will return a countersigned copy together with a list of the depositories in your State and suggested actions for you to take.

We hope this provides the necessary information. A committee print on the depository system is enclosed.
