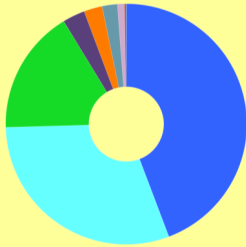
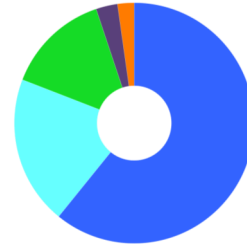

LSTA grants fund library technology programs

In 2019, Library Service and Technology Act sub-grant funding totaling \$235,001 was distributed to 29 Indiana libraries and partnering organizations. Of those funds, \$115,548 was distributed to 17 recipients in the form of technology sub-grants. The Indiana State Library was able to administer full or partial LSTA funding to 93.5% of statewide applicants. Some of the projects funded by these sub-grants include mobile computer labs, virtual reality programming, maker labs, digital skills development and laptop and hotspot circulation. The purpose of the grants is to increase the use of technology in libraries, foster better resource sharing among libraries and target library services to special populations.

Interactive Gaming

The Butler Public Library in Northeast Indiana used a \$5,000 sub-grant to purchase an interactive gaming table, creating an opportunity for children and teens to use emerging technology and to interact with peers. As anticipated, the table has spawned new artists, puzzle masters, game champions and trivia wizards, but it's also been used by social service agencies as a means of meeting with young clients in a casual, engaging and fun way. "Thank you, Indiana State Library and the U.S. Institute of Museum and Library Services for giving us the opportunity to offer this to our community. We are so grateful," said library director Sarah Dempsey.



Nature Viewing Technology

Located in Columbia City, the Peabody Public Library has the distinction of being the only public library in Indiana that sits on wetlands. The 15-acre wetlands include Canadian geese, migrating swans, deer, herons, turtles, groundhogs, foxes, snakes and frogs. In order to facilitate nature programming, the library used their \$7,997 sub-grant to purchase binoculars, a microscope, night vision scopes, compasses and an underwater drone. This technology will provide children with opportunities to learn more about the world around them.

Mobile Laptop Lab for Training Patrons and Staff

Central Indiana's Gas City-Mill Township Public Library used an \$8,000 grant to fund a mobile computer lab. The lab, consisting of 16 laptop computers, is used for public programs and classes. However, the lab is also used to train library staff on current technologies, so they are prepared to aid patrons with tech questions. "We are in a Carnegie Library with clusters of computers throughout the building. This makes it difficult to hold computer classes. With the mobile computer lab, funded by the LSTA grant, we are now able to take the laptops to our meeting room. So far we've utilized them for staff training, coding programs and an intro to G Suite," said former library director, Jessi Brown.

Indiana libraries engage their communities

Community engagement has been a long-standing cornerstone of public library service. Whether it's providing story time for children or offering genealogy research for adults, public libraries are constantly reaching out - and looking for new and inviting ways to reach out - to their community stakeholders. In 2019, public libraries across Indiana displayed a vast range of community outreach, including providing outreach technology training, starting a podcast and engaging teens and adults in virtual reality programming.



Outreach Technology Training

The Vigo County Public Library in Terre Haute wants everyone, from youth to retirees, to be comfortable trying new technology. With that in mind, they created their “Blended Learning: Osmo Kits” program as a way to take new technology into the community - including stops at adult day cares and nursing homes - so that people could get hands-on experience with the digital world via the familiar physical world. A \$5,616 sub-grant allowed users to interact with an iPad while using tangible items like blocks; participate in problem-solving skills with tangrams; learn coding basics through gaming; and even practice spelling through letter tiles. The library even took the training program to the state capital for a Statehood Day demonstration.

Virtual Reality @ Your Library

“We pursued our program because the community showed interest,” said Fulton County Public Library director Andrea Stineback. Thus was born “Virtual Reality @ Your Library.” Citing a particularly strong interest from preteen and teen patrons - and armed with \$6,113 a sub-grant - Stineback opted to bring virtual reality to her library in an effort to bring together members of the community. It worked. While adults have enjoyed trying something new, it's the teens and preteens who have fostered a sense of community around the program. “The virtual reality program has given the preteens and teens common ground, and the shared interest has started to create friendships among unlikely people,” Stineback said.



Westfield Starts a Podcast

In late 2019, the Westfield Washington Public Library, located just north of Indianapolis, received all the equipment they needed to start their own podcast. With a \$3,050 LSTA sub-grant administered by the Indiana State Library, the Westfield library was able to purchase a mixer, headphones, microphones, cables, microphone screens, a multitrack recorder and an iMac computer. With a podcast committee in place and a recording room set up, the library has set out to deliver a bi-weekly podcast that will update the community on library news and events. Additionally, the podcast will feature interviews with members of the community. “We are really excited to get this going. We think it will be a great way to communicate with our community about library happenings and other community events,” said library director Sheryl Sollars.

These projects were made possible in part by the Institute of Museum and Library Services.
