# Application Changes: Parental Signatures now required for patrons under age 18!

Effective October 1, 2024, the Library of Congress has implemented a new policy that applies to both new applicants for NLS services and existing patrons under the age of 18. Following is a summary of the changes:

- To receive braille and talking-book service, all new applicants will be required to provide their date of birth.
- To be considered valid, new applications for persons under the age of 18 must include a **Parental Acknowledgment** for NLS Services and Devices, signed by the applicant's parent or legal guardian.
- Patrons enrolled prior to October 1, 2024, who are under the age of 18 and wish to continue to receive braille or talking-book service beyond January 1, 2025, will be required to provide a signed supplemental Parental Acknowledgment form.

#### Perkins Braillers are now available for check out

What is a Perkins Brailler? It is a small metal device made to type braille. It is very similar to a typewriter but much smaller.

In November 2024 the Indiana Talking Book and Braille Library purchased two new Perkins Braillers. The purpose of this purchase was to make them available for our patrons to check out. Starting on January 2, 2025 they will be ready to circulate. Each brailler will come in a metal case with padding to protect the brailler during transit.

The standard check-out period will be two months with an option for one renewal of two more months. In order to check a Brailler out you will need to have an Evergreen Indiana library card. If you are a member of the Indiana Talking Book & Braille Library, you will automatically have an Evergreen Indiana card created for you if you would like to check-out a brailler. If you are not a member of the Talking Book & Braille Library, you will have to work with the circulation department at your local library or the Indiana State Library to have an Evergreen Indiana account created for you.

The Braillers will not be circulated with any type of supplies. Getting these is the responsibility of the patron checking out the brailler. The Braillers are able to type 42 cells per line and 26 lines per page. With a max paper size of 29.2 cm x 35.6 cm.

#### **The Indiana State Library turns 200**

Did you know the Indiana State Library will be celebrating its Bicentennial in 2025?

The first official mention of a state library for Indiana is made in the Journal of the Constitutional Convention, when on June 28, 1816, the following resolution was adopted: "That it be recommended to the general assembly of the state of Indiana, to appropriate the money voluntarily given by the citizens of Harrison county to the state, to the purchase of books for a library for the use of the legislature and other officers of government; and that the said general assembly will, from time to time, make such appropriations for the increase of said library, as they may deem necessary."

The State Assembly did not take formal action until the first session after the capital was moved to Indianapolis. By an act approved February 11, 1825, the State Library was definitely established, an appropriation made, and the secretary of state designated as librarian. At this point the library was in the State House. In 1841 a law was approved making the library a separate institution, and in 1867 an act provided that the law' section of the library be placed under the control of the judges of the Supreme Court, an arrangement still in force. By an act of 1925 the State Library and the Public Library Commission were united and placed under one director, and the State Library thus formed, together with the Historical Bureau and the Legislative Reference Bureau, placed under one board called the Indiana Library and Historical Board.

It was the Library and Historical Board that engaged in securing an appropriation for a Library and Historical Building. The General Assembly in 1929 authorized a special levy in the expectation of raising about one million dollars for the cost of site and building. Governor Leslie appointed the Building Commission, and a site at the corner of Senate Avenue and Ohio Street was acquired in the summer of 1931. Pierre and Wright of Indianapolis were the architects selected, and plans were ready in March, 1932.

The original conception of the State Library as an institution for the use of legislators and state officials has never been lost, but a multitude of activities have gradually been added throughout the years to meet new needs and changing conditions. \* from Indiana.gov/library
