This year, many returning, as well as several new vendors and organizations, will be available for attendees to meet.

A new addition to this year's event is the game room. The room will be set up so participants of Vision Expo will be able to play some of the new accessible games that the Talking Book and Braille Library now has in its collection. These games include braille-adapted versions of Monopoly, Scrabble and Uno, in addition to large print and braille playing cards. Soon after Vision Expo, these games will be available for library patrons.

There will also be a door prize raffle and a Vision Expo tote bag giveaway.

Talking Book and Braille Library patrons are invited to join the library's all-ages - toddler to adult - summer reading program, themed "Color Our World." Books are available to borrow from the library in braille, large print and digital audio formats. Participants can also download digital audio books and braille files from the BARD website at nlsbard.loc.gov or via the BARD mobile app, available from the iTunes app store, the Google Play store or the Amazon App Store.

Any book borrowed from the library within the time frame will count toward a participant's summer reading total. Only books borrowed from the Talking Book and Braille Library or downloaded from BARD will count toward a reader's total.

Anyone interested in enrolling can complete and return the below application. Simply fold the application in half, tape it shut and put it in the mail. If an application is late getting to the library, the sender is still eligible to be a summer reader.

After enrolling, participants will be sent a game board of summer activities. Beginning Monday, June 9, participants should checkmark each activity once completed. The game board should be returned to Abby Chumin, librarian, at the below address by Friday, Aug. 1, in exchange for fun prizes.

The Talking Book and Braille Library will send out materials throughout the program, including prizes, activity sheets, crafts and more.

Books about famous Hoosiers

"When the Game Was Ours" by Larry Bird (DB070080)

Former NBA basketball players Larry Bird of the Boston Celtics and Earvin "Magic" Johnson of the L.A. Lakers describe their professional rivalry, which began in a 1979 college championship game.

"The Office BFFs: Tales of The Office from Two Best Friends Who Were There" by Jenna Fischer (DB108814)

An intimate, behind-the-scenes celebration of "The Office" co-stars Jenna Fischer and Angela Kinsey's friendship, and an insiders' view of Pam Beesly, Angela Martin and the iconic TV show.

"Skywriting: A Life out of the Blue" by Jane Pauley (DB058891)

Award-winning television news anchorwoman's autobiography, in which she pens her "personal process of discovery" from an upbringing in Indiana to success on the "Today" and "Dateline" shows. Discusses her adult-onset bipolar disorder and family life with husband Garry Trudeau and their three children.

"One Man's Vision: The Life of Automotive Pioneer Ralph R. Teetor" by Marjorie Teetor Meyer (DBC12167, BR010592)

Inventor of cruise control, member of the Automotive Hall of Fame, Ralph Teetor was one of Indiana's great industrial pioneers. He had been blind since the age of five.

"Fighting for Equality: A Life of May Wright Sewall" by Ray E. Boomhower (DBC13510)

A biography aimed at young readers, showcases Sewall's important contributions to the history of Indianapolis, Indiana, the United States and the world.

"Madam C. J. Walker: The Beauty Boss" by Janel Rodriguez. (DB115427) Madam C. J. Walker was an entrepreneur, philanthropist and political and social activist. She is recorded as the first female self-made millionaire in America.

"Major Taylor: World Cycling Champion" by Charles R. Smith, Jr. (DBC29256)

A biography-in-verse of legendary African American cyclist Marshall "Major" Taylor from Indianapolis and the Six-Day Race. For grades two through four.

"Miss Colfax's Light" by Aimee Bissonette (DBC11088)

The true story of Harriet Colfax, who became the Michigan City Lighthouse keeper at the age of 37 and kept the job for the next 43 years.

Books set in Indiana

"The Bookseller's Promise" by Beth Wiseman (DB123034, LP021936) The first novel of Beth Wiseman's new Amish Bookstore series, set in Montgomery, Indiana, promises love and rare books.

"Home to Harmony" by Philip Gulley (DB059650, LP014529)
Set in fictional Harmony, Indiana. Quaker minister Sam Gardner and his family move back to Sam's small Midwestern hometown where Sam becomes the new minister.

"In God We Trust, All Others Pay Cash" by Jean Shepherd (DB048446) Ralph returns to the Indiana mill town of Hammond where he grew up. When he walks into his childhood friend's bar, the two reminisce about their boyhood, which included Red Ryder BB guns, fishing, the Chicago World's Fair, Fibber McGee and Molly.

"The Rabbit Hutch" by Tess Gunty (DB109788, BR024629)

The automobile industry has abandoned Vacca Vale, Indiana, leaving the residents behind, too. In a run-down apartment building on the edge of town, commonly known as the Rabbit Hutch, a number of people now reside quietly, looking for ways to live in a dying city.

"Turtles All the Way Down" by John Green (DB089542, BR022186) Set in Indianapolis, Indiana, 16-year-old Aza never intended to pursue the mystery of a fugitive billionaire Russell Pickett, but there's a \$100,000 reward at stake, and her best and most fearless friend, Daisy, is eager to investigate.

"The Mighty Miss Malone" by Christopher Paul Curtis (DB078108, BR02422) With the love and determination befitting the "world's greatest family," 12-year-old Deza Malone, her older brother Jimmie and their parents endure tough times in Gary, Indiana, and later in Flint, Michigan, during the Great Depression.
