In 1978, the Indiana Data Center began as a cooperative agreement between the State of Indiana and the U.S. Bureau of the Census, with the Indiana State Library and the Indiana Business Research Center as the state level partners. This nationwide program works to make Census and other state and federal demographic and economic statistics available through a statewide network of affiliates and through online access via STATS Indiana. Our affiliates are located in state agencies, universities, libraries, local planning agencies, small business development centers, and nonprofit organizations..


The Indiana Data Center Program consists of two state level partners: the Indiana State Library Data Center and the Indiana Business Research Center at Indiana University's Kelley School of Business Indianapolis Campus and two coordinating agencies, the Indiana Department of Workforce Development and the Indiana Geographic Information Council.

WHAT WE DO

We provide data and services to all sectors of the community including government agencies, businesses, academia, nonprofit organizations, and private citizens. Our products and services are used in marketing, economic development, community planning and analysis, grant writing, business start-ups, and much more.

WHAT WE HAVE

We maintain a collection of current and historical statistical resources with emphasis on Census and other federal and state agency statistics and answer questions regarding demographic and economic statistics, accessing the most current data publicly available through agency Internet sites. We also provide training workshops on accessing and using Census electronic products and provide private consultations on data use and data definitions.
