- Jewish-themed twin-view children's books and kits of a print copy with large print or audio accompaniment
- Delivery of all materials by mail all over the world - available in English, Russian, Yiddish, Hebrew, Hungarian, Romanian, Polish, and Spanish!

Free Telecommunications Equipment for Eligible Individuals with Combined Hearing and Vision Loss

iCanConnect is a Federal Communication Commission (FCC) funded program, also referred to as the National Deaf-Blind Equipment Distribution Program (NDBEDP). iCanConnect provides free modern equipment and training for distance communication purposes to people with both significant vision and hearing loss, who meet disability and income guidelines.

iCanConnect is a nationwide program with local contacts to help people stay connected with friends, family, their community, and the world.

People eligible for iCanConnect services receive a personalized assessment to identify solutions to support their distance communication needs. Then, participants are provided with equipment and training that meets their

specific situation. Examples of equipment might include smartphones, tablets, computers or laptops, large print screen magnification software, and refreshable braille devices.

In Indiana, Easter Seals Crossroads is responsible for the National Deaf-Blind Equipment Distribution & Program services. Contact Belva Smith for any questions about applying for the program.

Spooky Good Reads for Adults:

Ghost Story by Peter Straub (BR004623, DB013843)

Four old men gather to tell each other stories—some true, some made-up, all of them frightening. A simple pastime to divert themselves from their quiet lives. But one story is coming back to haunt them and their small town. A tale of something they did long ago. A wicked mistake. A horrifying accident. And they are about to learn that no one can bury the past forever.... Some strong language. 1979.

The Haunting of Hill House by Shirley Jackson (DB021679, LP001158)

During his scientific investigation of the ghosts in an old, abandoned house, Dr. Montague invites a young man and two women to participate in his experiments. 1959

A Head Full of Ghosts by Paul Tremblay (DB082566)

Teenager Marjorie begins showing signs of mental disturbance. Her worried family calls in the Catholic Church for an exorcism and films a reality television show about it. But is Marjorie mentally ill, demonically possessed, or faking it all? Some violence, some strong language. 2015.

Meddling Kids a novel by Edgar Cantero (DB088386)

The teenaged members of the Blyton Summer Detective Club last solved a case together in 1977. Thirteen years later, they return to where their adventures began, to confront their inner demons and the real monsters that are waiting for them. Unrated. 2017.

The Outsider by Stephen King (BR023150, DB092110, LP020820)

When the body of an eleven-year-old boy is found, all the evidence points to one of Flint City's local teacher Terry Maitland. Terry has an ironclad alibi, which leaves Detective Ralph Anderson wondering how a man could be in two places at once. Violence and strong language. 2018.

The Southern Book Club's Guide to Slaying Vampires by Grady Hendrix (BR023373, DB099550, DB106223 Spanish)

The one thing Patricia Campbell has to look forward to is her book club of Charleston women united by their love of true crime. When James Harris moves into the neighborhood, Patricia senses there is something not right about the man. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. 2020.

Salem's Lot by Stephen King (BR022530, DB016381, DB062402, LP010901, DBG18017- Spanish)

Chilling tale of exorcism set in the small town of Jerusalem's Lot. 'Salem's Lot, as the natives call it, is what appears to be a ghost town. Its streets, however, are deserted only in the daylight hours, for the villagers have turned into vampires. Some strong language and explicit descriptions of sex. 1975

Secondhand Spirits; A Cast-Off Coven; Hexes and Hemlines: Witchcraft Mysteries, Bks. 1-3 – by Juliet Blackwell (DB079913)

Books one through three, written between 2009 and 2011, featuring a San Francisco witch who solves mysteries and runs a vintage clothing boutique with her miniature potbellied pig, Oscar. Some strong language. 2011.

Something Wicked this Way Comes by Ray Bradbury (BR012583, DB050233, DB009245)

Will Halloway and Jim Nightshade, both thirteen, are fascinated by the carnival that comes to their small town. But after a series of frightening events, the boys realize there is something sinister about the show and its owner. 1962.

Tales of Ghosts from Indiana

Ghost Stories of Indiana by Edrick Thay (DBC13521).

A chilling collection of tales from the Hoosier State that includes not only the most famous tales of Indiana, but many little-known ones as well. (2001).

Haunted Hoosier trails: a Guide to Indiana's Famous Folklore & Spooky Sites by Wanda Lou Willis (DBC13563).

Wanda Lou Willis takes readers on a frightening journey across Indiana, exploring haunted houses, rivers, and other locations. Supplemented with excellent original maps, photos, and illustrations, Haunted Hoosier Trails is a collection of spooky tales and real-life horror stories that doubles as a Halloween travel guide. For high school and adult (2002).

Haunted Tales from the Region: Ghosts of Indiana's South Shore by Dorothy Salvo Davis (DBC13575).

South Shore lights blaze through the night, warding off restless spirits that slink among shadows. Join paranormal researcher and author Dorothy Salvo Davis as she reveals the legends and ghouls that haunt this generally peaceful

area. Cut the lights at your own peril because the ghouls of the South Shore won't soon find solace. (2010)

Chilly Children's Tales

Bunnicula: A Rabbit tale of Mystery by Deborah & James Howe (BR017165, DB065299)

Harold, the family dog, recalls the time the Monroes brought home a cute baby bunny they found at a Dracula movie and named Bunnicula. But Chester the cat tries to warn his human family that the rabbit is really a vampire. For grades 3-6. 1979.

The Dragon Halloween Party by Loreen Leedy (DB027806)

Ma Dragon and her ten children are having a Halloween party! directions for making costumes, decorations, and delicious treats; and suggestions for games and activities. For preschool-grade 2.

The Graveyard Book by Neil Gaiman (BR 018241, DB068027, LP017672)

A toddler enters a cemetery pursued by the knife-wielding stranger who just murdered his family. Resident ghosts Mr. and Mrs. Owens protect and adopt the child, naming him Nobody "Bod" Owens. Bod's graveyard upbringing serves him well, but why was his family targeted? For grades 5-8 and older readers. 2008.

House of Hollow by Krystal Sutherland (DB102984)

Something happened to Iris Hollow and her two older sisters, Grey and Vivi, when they were children that they can't remember and that left them with half-moon scars. When Grey goes missing, Iris must decipher the mystery of their past. For senior high and older readers. 2021.

How to catch a Monster by Adam Wallace (DB101002)

After being cast as the Ninja Master in his school's play, a boy decides it is time to catch the monster in his closet. For preschool-grade 2. 2017.

Took: A Ghost Story by Mary Downing Hahn (BR021192, DB082822)

Local kids taunt siblings Daniel and Erica with frightening tales of a witch called Old Auntie, who is said to lurk near their new farmhouse. Dismissive at first, Daniel quickly becomes a believer of the legend when his sister Erica vanishes. For grades 5-8 and older readers. 2015.
