Indianapolis Public Library

Visitors to the Indiana State Library's Young Readers Center can now see a startlingly accurate recreation of one of the most cherished and iconic monuments in Indianapolis.

The 7-foot-tall Lego replica of the Soldiers and Sailors Monument that resides in downtown Indianapolis will be on display until Feb. 14, 2025.

Indiana artist Jeffrey Allen Smythe, of Center Grove, used in excess of 75,000 Lego pieces to build the replica monument. The initial construction back in 2017-2018 lasted 15 months, including three months of planning and sketching. Pieces used to create the sculpture, which includes a roughly 6-foot circular base area, were obtained from existing kits, Goodwill stores, auction houses and via online retailers and resellers. The piece was constructed at a 1:48 scale to accommodate Lego minifigures. Smythe, who attended the Herron School of Art and Design and graduated from IUPUI with a degree in interior design, said, "I rediscovered a passion for Lego when my nephew outgrew his Lego sets and they ended up unassembled in storage tubs. I began sorting through the storage tubs and seeing which of his old sets I could rebuild from scratch."

Since the initial build, Smythe has tweaked the design and grouped



"If you do not know the names of things, the knowledge of them is lost, too." – Carl Linnaeus

When it comes to naming things, no one is more associated with the endeavor than Carl Linnaeus, the 18th century physician and biologist. Indeed, the thoughtful Swedish scientist undertook the task of naming, well, every living organism. He is regarded as the father of modern taxonomy and his book, Species Plantarum, (ISLM QK91.S6) first published in 1753, continues to be used in the naming of plants today. The Indiana State Library houses the 1763 second edition of the work along with numerous biographies of Linnaeus.

Known for promoting the exploration of the relationship between an organism and its environment. Linnaeus was also an early ecologist.

While neither appellation is much bandied about today and his formal names for plants are used less frequently than their common ones, perhaps he will come to mind this December when decorating with ilex verticillate (winter berry) or kissing under the phoradendron leucarpum (mistletoe.) Even if Linnaeus remains in the background of one's thoughts, it is worth remembering that though a rose by any other name would smell as sweet - it must still be named!

Libraries selected for round three will receive \$10,000 or \$20,000 to support costs related to their community engagement project; virtual training to assist project directors in developing their community engagement, facilitation and disability service skills; a suite of online resources developed to support local programs; and technical and project support from the ALA Public Programs Office throughout the grant term.

Up to 300 libraries will be awarded in this application period. Previous awardees from round one or two are eligible to apply. Note that prioritization will be given to applicants not previously awarded.

The opportunity is open to libraries serving small and rural communities in the U.S. and U.S. territories. To be eligible, a library must be located in an area that's more than, or equal to, five miles from an urbanized area and with a population of 25,000 or less, in keeping with Institute of Museum and Library Services definitions of small and rural libraries.
