

prepared to conduct and publish new research and scholarship with a focus on Indiana history, or a specific collection housed at the Indiana State Library, are encouraged to apply. The fellowship provides a \$1,000 stipend to support in-person research for five consecutive work days at the Indiana State Library in downtown Indianapolis.

Applicants must be emerging or established historians, researchers, authors, post-docs or graduate students with proven writing skills, a demonstrated passion for Indiana history and the ability to perform in-person research at the Indiana State Library for five consecutive days, Monday through Friday, between Jan. 6-Dec. 19, 2025. Applicants can be based anywhere in the U.S., but the committee particularly encourages Indiana residents outside of Marion County to apply.

Those interested should submit a completed <u>Indiana State Library</u> <u>Bicentennial Application</u> along with a one-page research statement or proposal, a resume or CV with a maximum of three pages, one letter of recommendation and up to three writing samples. The application should be submitted <u>via email</u>. Writing samples may be submitted as PDF or Word files and should be no longer than 20 pages each.

The application period opens on Tuesday, Sept. 3. The application deadline is Tuesday, Nov. 26. The Fellowship will be awarded by Tuesday, Dec. 31.

A Bicentennial Research Fellowship Review Committee composed of staff librarians and historians will convene to review all application documents and award the fellowship. All applicants will receive written TeachingBooks

Creative aging programming supported at 36 libraries across Indiana

Led by fiber artist Peggy Taylor, participants will explore natural fibers and the ins and outs of wool dyeing and will create a finished woven piece.
